## RODEO ACTIVITIES START TODAY JULY 17

### 500 lbs. BEEF BEING PREPARED FOR THURS

500 lbs. of beef was put to cook at the Wheeler Rodeo Grounds in preparation for the free barbecue which precedes the first night of the 14th Annual Wheeler Rodeo. The first event of the rodeo weekend will be the parade at 4:00. This year's parade will feature riding wagon trains and camel floats from Wheeler and surrounding communities. The parade will take the route as was taken last year. The parade will form in vacant gin lot. The parade will travel west to street and turn south. On street, the parade will turn east and go to Park Hospital. The paraders disperse after they pass out of the hospital. The barbecue is scheduled to begin at 6:00 p. m. at the grounds. John Hodges again is in charge of preparing and cooking the barbecue. Serving the barbecue will be Wheeler businessmen and riding club members. ## DINNER HONORS FEEDLOT DIRECTORS, INDUSTRIAL CO.

Beef Cattle Co., Inc., directors and Wheeler County Service Inc., directors were honored with a dinner Tuesday, July 15. The banquet was the night of the regularly scheduled Chamber meeting.

One hundred and seventy persons were in attendance at the dinner. Guests were present from Canadian, Pampa, Lubbock and surrounding communities. Speaker for the evening was Foster Whaley, Gray County Agent. Carl Lightner of Small Business Administration of Lubbock

was present at the meeting and expressed the hope that this feedlot would be the first of many loans made to Wheeler Industry.

Foster Whaley showed figures to the group which pointed out the benefits which Wheeler County will receive by having a feedlot in the area. Used were the comparisons of Gray County and Wheeler County agricultural incomes. Gray county figures showed an increase with the completion of the first feedlot and continued to climb while Wheeler County agricultural income showed only a small increase. Whaley foresees the in-

crease in the production of grain sorghums in Wheeler County. Wheeler in 1968 produced enough grain sorghum to feed 20,000 head of cattle. With a ready market for the feed, the price will increase and more farmers will turn away from the low-priced cotton.

Jim Wright served as Master of Ceremonies. James Verden introduced the guests. Serving the barbecue was the Pampa Shrine Association. Flowers for the head table were furnished by the Wheeler Flower Shop.

## ACROSS the FENCE

When I was a youngster in Central Texas we could tell how dry it was by how large the cracks were in the heavy clay soil. Our soil here doesn't have cracks in it, but the crops and pastures are really suffering for moisture. Maybe we'll get that rain we missed a few days ago.

Corn leaf aphids, a form of green bugs are beginning to increase over much of our county. We encourage farmers to inspect their fields frequently to detect damage. Plants under a moisture stress like we're having now can't support as many greenbugs as plants in a healthy growing condition. Our own surveys have shown us that beneficial insects are beginning to increase also, but the greenbug buildup may occur at a faster pace. Regular field inspections are very important in keeping abreast of the current situation and in deciding whether or not to spray.

Insecticides recommended include malathion (ground rigs only), Trithion Systox, Diazinon and Parathion. It'd be a real good idea to read the label carefully and to follow directions before using any of these spray materials.

Watering Grain Sorghum: Irrigation applied during the high water use periods of booting, heading and grain filling are consistent yield boosters. In a three-year study at the Southwestern Great Plains Research Center at Bushland, irrigations applied at heading increased yields an average of 1,925 pounds per acre while the increase from milk stage applications boosted yields an average of 1740 pounds. Increases from irrigations when the plants were 15 inches tall averaged 630 pounds. However, in 1964 when early rainfall was below normal and a similar year to this season, yields were pushed up 1100 pounds by this irrigation.

Part of this past week I attended an honorary banquet that the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce held for Beef Cattle Co., Inc. Foster Whaley, my neighboring County Agent

from Pampa, was speaker. We hope that the feedlot costing close to a half million dollars with a capacity of 15,000 head will boost the economy in our county. The feeding of 50,000 pounds of alfalfa hay daily should provide income to alfalfa growers in our county. James Verden, local PCA manager, worked tirelessly on this task and we think he deserves a large part of the credit for the location of this feedlot.

Six outstanding Wheeler County 4-H members have been selected to attend the District 14-H Leadership Electric Camp at Cloudercroft, N.M. on July 21-26. They are: Brenda McCasland, Scott Luttrell, Tanya Dunn, Dana Luttrell, David Smith and Rick Hefley. The County 4-H Council is paying their way out there with some of the funds made from their 4-H Junior Rodeo. It sure seems like a fine thing to allow these youngsters an opportunity to learn about leadership at this annual camp.

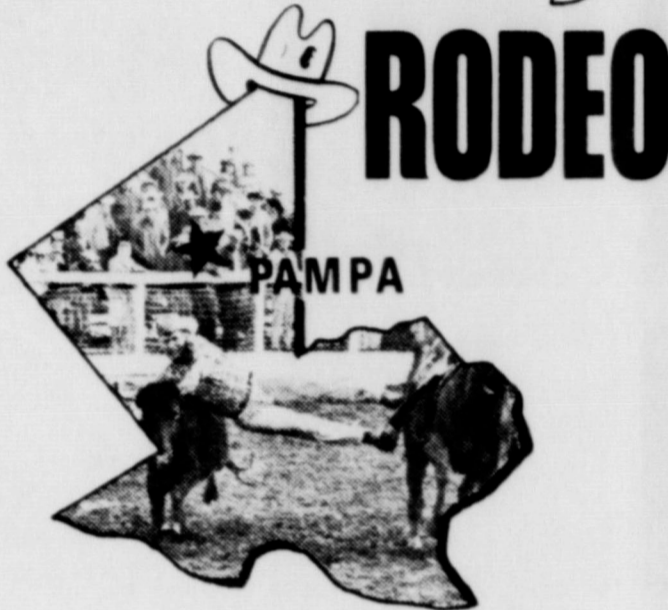

The visiting professor was Dr. Warren Galenbach, professor at the School of Education, San Jose State College, San Jose, Calif., and formerly associated with the Far West Laboratory for Educational Research and Development, Berkeley, Calif.

Microteaching is a new concept in education dedicated to the improvement of teacher competence by reducing teacher participation in classes and raising the level of student participation. Microteaching relies heavily on the use of the videotape recorder.

A simple breakdown of the micro-teaching technique is:

1. Plan and teach a short lesson to a small group of students; Concentrate on one teaching skill. (The lesson is filmed and recorded on videotape.)
2. Critique the lesson. (Film is viewed on monitor.)
3. Replan and reteach the lesson to another small group of students (Film and record on videotape.)
4. Critique the lesson (New film is viewed on monitor)

This process may be repeated until the teacher feels a skill has been well established.  
The microteaching teaching process was developed at Stanford University under the direction of Dr. Dwight Allen.

She returned to Texas to establish a research program using microteaching in the Home Economics Education Department. At this time Dr. Bell is the outstanding researcher of microteaching in the Home Economics field in the United States.

Dr. Bell stated, "The basic philosophy that leaves will not set themselves efficiently to work until they feel that there is an all important part which they must perform for themselves is a fundamental part of this workshop." By the second day in class, participants were teaching microlessons, taking the role of students, doing the filming and operating the videotape recorder.

"This Microteaching" workshop was considered one of the outstanding educational opportunities open to Home Economics this summer. Participants from fifteen states were enrolled. Among the enrollees was Mrs. Irma Dana Haile, consultant of home economics education, Area I, of the Texas Education Agency, Plainview, Texas.

Mrs. Haile named Mrs. Wiley and two teachers from the Lubbock Public Schools to a team to present a micro lesson at the Area I section meeting of the State In-Service Conference on Home Economics Education at Dallas on August 1.

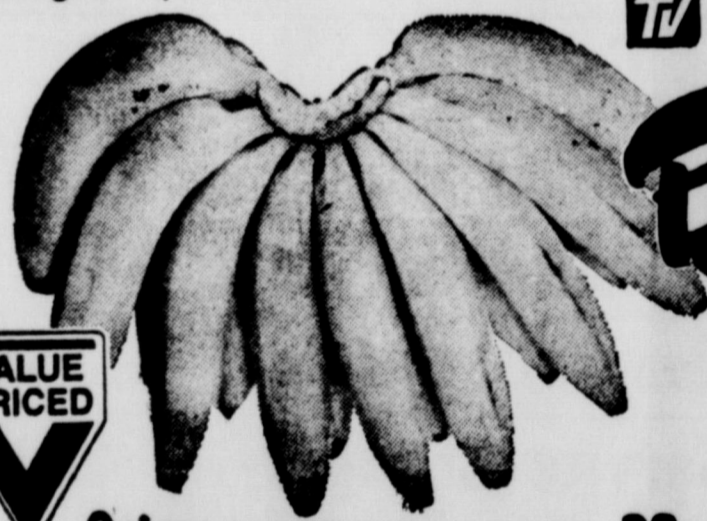
