When I was a youngster in Central Texas we could tell how dry it was by how large the cracks were in the heavy clay soil. Our soil here doesn't have cracks in but the crops and pastures are really suffering for moisture. Maybe we'll get that rain we missed a few days

Corn leaf aphids, a form of green bugs are beginning increase over much of our county. We encourage farmers to inspect their fields frequently to detect damage. Plants under a moisture stress like we're having now can't support as many greenbugs as plants in a healthy growing condition. Our own surveys have shown us that beneficial insects are beginning to increase also, but the greenbug buildup may occur at a paster pace. Regular field inspections are very important in keeping abreast of the current situation and in deciding whether or not

Watering Grain Sorghum: Irrigation applied during

the high water use periods of booting, heading and grain filling are consistent yield boosters. In a three-year study at the Southwestern Great Plains Research Center at Bushland, irrigations applied at heading increased yields an average of 1,925 pounds per acre while the increase from milk stage applications boosted yields an average of 1740 pounds. Increases from irrigations when the plants were 15 inches tall averaged 630 pounds. However, in 1964 when early rainfall was below normal and a similar year to this season, yields were pushed up 1100 pounds by this



lopment, Berkley, Calif. Microteaching is a new concept in education dedicated to the improvement of teacher competence by reducing teacher participation in classes and raising the level of student participation. Microteaching relies heavily on the use of the videotape recorder.

A simple breakdown of the micro-teaching technique

1. Plan and teach a short lesson to a small group of students: Concentrate on one teaching skill. (The lesson is filmed and recorded on videotape.) 2. Critique the lesson.

3. Replan and reteach the lesson to another small group of students (Film and record on videotape.) 4. Critique the lesson

(Film is viewed on monitor.)

New film is viewed on monitor) This process may be repeated until the teacher feels a skill has been well

established. The microteaching teachinaprocess was developed at Stamford University under the direction of Dr. Dwight Allen

and Robert Bush. Dr. Camill Bell of Texas Tech studies the microteaching method of Stamford. She returned to to establish a research pro gram using microteaching in the Home Economics Edu Department. At this time Bell is theoutstanding res cher of microteaching in Home Economics field in

United States. Dr. Bell stated, "The basic philosophy that learne will not set themselves eff. ciently to work until they feel that there is an all inpr ant part which they must pe form for themselves is a fun damental part of this work. shop." By the second day class, participants were teaching microlessons, taking the role of students, doing the filming and operating the vide otape recorder.


