



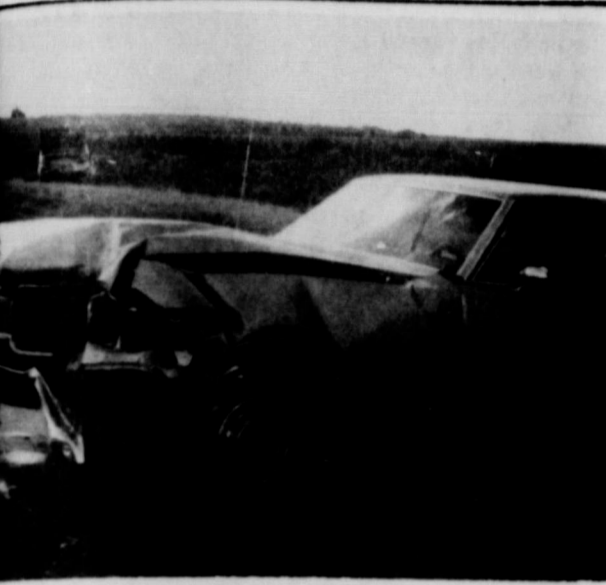

1250 SERVED BARBECUE BEFORE RODEO



Twelve hundred and fifty people were served barbecue Thursday night, July 17, the first night of the 14th Annual Wheeler Riding Club Rodeo. The huge success of the parade, barbecue and rodeo was the result of the combined efforts of the Riding Club, Chamber of Commerce and a host of willing other workers.

The afternoon parade was very enjoyable for the crowd gathered along the parade route. The Little Wranglers of Sayre took first place honors for the riding clubs in the parade. Second place went to the Berlin Riding Club and White Deer Riding Club placed third. Also in attendance were the Leather and Lace of Pampa and the Wheeler County 4-H Texans.

Three trophies were given the wagon trains in the parade. The Reydon wagon train placed first, with Pampa wagon train and a pickup from Pampa taking second and third place honors respectively.

McIntire's Sweetwater and Briscoe Grain of Briscoe entered the commercial float division. McIntire's antique cars took first place honors.

Also participating in the annual parade was the usual

amount of cowboys and cow-girls.

The Rodeo Clown, Bill Thorp appeared in the parade and rodeo. Hack Webb of Strong City, Okla., announced the parade and rodeo.

The serving of the barbecue by Wheeler Chamber of Commerce and the Wheeler Riding Club began at 6:00. The 1250 who went through the line received generous helpings of barbecue, sauce, beans, pickles, onions, peaches, bread and coffee, iced tea or cokes.

The merchants of Wheeler, as they have done for eleven years, furnished the food for the barbecue. Required for the feed were 1547 lbs. of beef, 144 lbs. of pinto beans, 29 gallons of peaches, 12 gal. of Pickles, 10 gal. of barbecue sauce, 50 lbs. onions, 2 lbs. coffee and 10 jars of instant tea.

As they have done in the past, Mead's Fine Bread, Earl Jolly, distributor, furnished the bread for the feed.

Coca-Cola Bottling Co. of Shamrock was on hand furnishing free cokes to all in attendance at the barbecue.

Dan Luttrell furnished a milk truck filled with water for use at the barbecue.

The Wheeler Riding Club extends their thanks to all who made donations and worked with the preparing and serving of the barbecue.

K. D. Ford was recognized for hauling stockwater and soaking the parking areas and rodeo arena to keep down the dust.

Doyle Hanks, E. J. Meadows and Truman Bradstreet handled the stripping chutes.

Bob Hutchison was in charge of the concession and had the help of a number of hard workers.

In charge of the gate was Jim Montgomery.

Sheriff Bus Dorman, Deputy Doyle Ramsey and a number of highway patrol did an excellent job of policing the activities.
