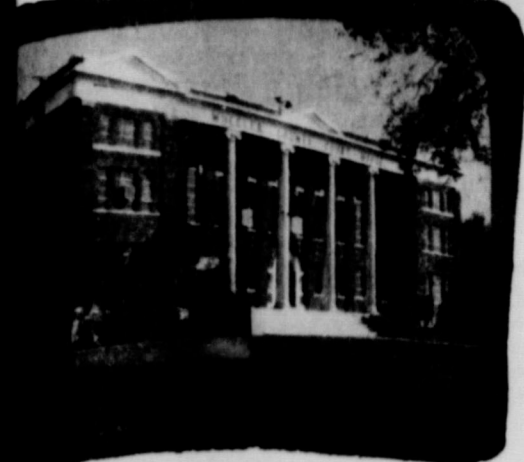

WATER FOR TEXAS

Texas has before it a plan for the most extensive and complex water system yet devised by man. The Texas Water Plan provides for constructing 67 major reservoirs and hundreds of miles of canals to make certain water is available for those who need it, and at the same time, to offer flood protection to many of those who have been endangered. Enough water to cover 13 million acres with 12 inches of regiving moisture will be pumped from the lower Mississippi River to Texas and New Mexico, if current feasibility studies are completed as expected, and Texas votes yes on Constitutional Amendment No. 2. The vote on August 5 will determine whether or not Texas is willing to show the world that our planning is sound - that we are willing to put our money where our mouth is. While it is a \$3.5 billion bond authorization, funds will be used during

the next 40 to 50 years, not all at once. The money will be used for temporary financing, with none for gifts or grants. Those who use the water will have to pay for it, with interest.

The entire state requires and will benefit from the Texas Water Plan. It is designed to take care of our population in the year 2020, which will be about 30.5 million. At the present rate of growth, some areas of Texas will be facing a water shortage in 1980 and by 1985 many wells in some areas will be dry.

Plenty of water has brought Texas from the days of wide open spaces, cattle and prickly pear to a position of sustaining the nation's largest group of metropolitan areas and a major share of its industry. The supply and demand figures for water are dangerously close now. If we are to continue our trend of growth, we must develop new supplies. Without enough water, we face disaster in vital areas of our economy.

Passage of the Texas Water Plan Bond Issue - Constitutional Amendment 2, on August 5 will show all concerned that Texas is ready to meet our future water needs. Each and every Governor of Texas during the last twenty years has agreed on this issue, and it is supported almost unanimously by the House of Representatives and the Texas Senate. Be sure to cast your vote in favor of Water For Texas.

9 CONSTITUTIONAL AMMENDMENTS ON THE BALLOT FOR TUES, AUG. 5

Texas voters will go to the polls Tuesday, August 5, to decide the fate of nine Constitutional Amendments. The polls will open at 8:00 a.m. and close at 7:00 p.m.

The following is a list of the amendments as they will appear on the ballot.

PROPOSITION 1
"The Deadwood Amendment"
You will be asked to vote FOR or AGAINST: "The constitutional amendment to repeal the obsolete, superfluous and unnecessary sections of the Constitution."

PROPOSITION 2
Authorizing \$3.5 billion in Water Development Bonds.
You will be asked to vote FOR or AGAINST: "The constitutional amendment broadening the powers of the Texas Water Development Funds; eliminating the interest limitations on Texas Water Development Bonds; raising the authorized amount of Texas Water Development Bonds by \$3,500,000,000; extending the maturity schedule on Texas Water Development Bonds; eliminating the procedures for curtailment and the curtailment date of financial assistance to be provided by the Texas Water Development Board."

PROPOSITION 3
Raising salaries of the Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House and members of the Legislature.
You will be asked to vote FOR or AGAINST: "The constitutional amendment providing that the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of House of Representatives



shall receive a salary fixed by the Legislature, not the exceed one-half the salary of the Governor; providing that the Legislature shall fix the salary of the other members, not to exceed that received by a district judge from state funds; and removing the 120-day limitation on per diem for regular sessions."

PROPOSITION 4
Exempting property of nonprofit water supply companies from taxation.
You will be asked to vote FOR or AGAINST: "The constitutional amendment to exempt nonprofit water supply corporations from taxation."

PROPOSITION 5
Raising State welfare ceiling from \$60 million to \$80 million annually.
You will be asked to vote FOR or AGAINST: "The constitutional amendment providing for assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of..."

PROPOSITION 6
You will be asked to vote FOR or AGAINST: "The constitutional amendment providing for assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of..."

PROPOSITION 7
You will be asked to vote FOR or AGAINST: "The constitutional amendment providing for assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of..."

PROPOSITION 8
You will be asked to vote FOR or AGAINST: "The constitutional amendment providing for assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of..."

PROPOSITION 9
You will be asked to vote FOR or AGAINST: "The constitutional amendment providing for assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of..."

Former Residents Buried in Amarillo

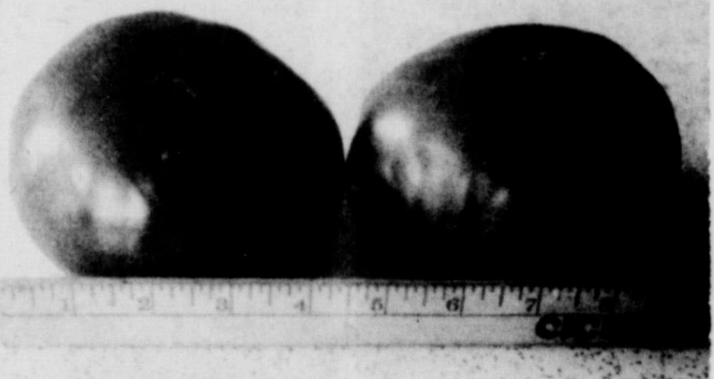

Janice Ware Is Queen Candidate

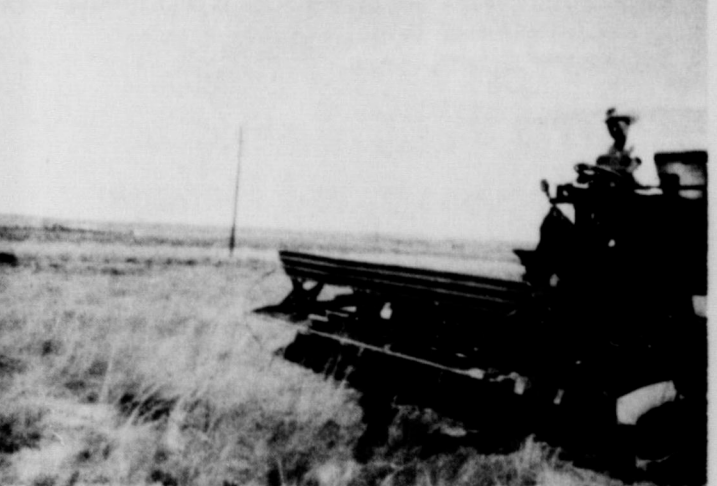

Among the queen nominees are Janice Ware of Wheeler and Charlotte Dickey of Mobeetie.

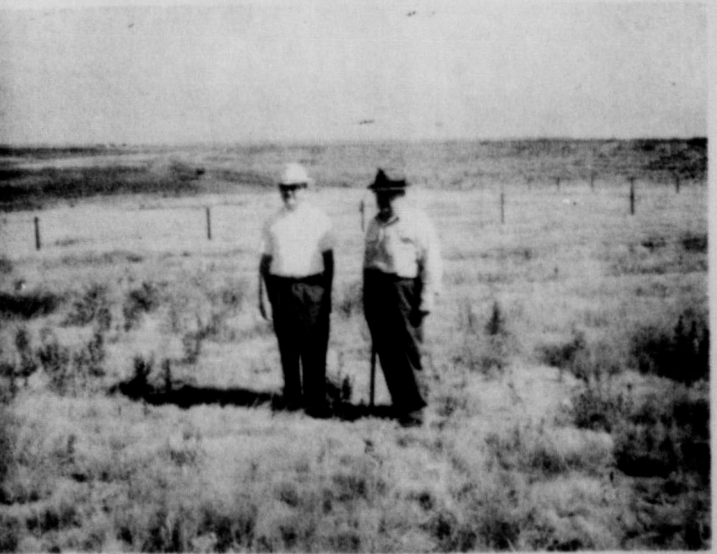
There will be various activities for the queen nominees and their parents. Playing on the Greenbelt football teams from Wheeler will be Tommy Cole and James Tucker.

Wind Erosion At Record Low

Temple, Texas: Air pollution from dust storms was at a near record low in Texas this spring, according to a wind erosion report released this week by Clyde W. Graham, State Conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service. Graham credited favorable moisture conditions and the work of conservation farmers in the western part of the state with reducing the dust storms.

"Reduced dust pollution benefits a lot more people than you might think," Graham said. "Dust hurts people with asthma, emphysema, hay fever and other respiratory ailments. It ruins electric motors, cars, buses, trucks, tractors and anything else with moving parts. And it settles in homes, grinding furniture, floors and carpets."

Less than 500,000 acres or about half the 5-year average were damaged in Texas by wind erosion this year, Graham said. His report was the result of an annual survey made by SCS offices in the 34 million acre area of west Texas subject to severe blowing during the November 1 to May 31 blow season.

Graham noted that during the dust bowl days in the "dirty 30's", dust blown from several million acres of Texas land darkened the skies along the eastern seaboard and out into the Atlantic Ocean.

Of the land damaged this season, 460,000 acres were cropland and 9,600 were rangeland. Some 17,000 acres of non-farm land, such as roads and bare city land, were also damaged by blowing.

Graham said work done under the popular Great Plains Conservation Program in the northwest one-third of the state has been a big factor in reducing Texas dust storms. He pointed out that in the last 10 years in this 99 county area, soil-protecting grass has been planted on 700,000 acres of rangeland; 463,000 acres of highly erosive cropland has been retired from farming and planted to grass; and strip cropping, stubble mulching, cover cropping and other conservation measures have been applied to some 2.3 million acres of cropland. Vast areas of grassland have also been improved.

SCS conservationists help farmers, ranchmen, city officials and other users of land plan and apply measures to prevent wind and water erosion. This work is done through 187 locally run soil and water conservation districts in Texas, Graham concluded.

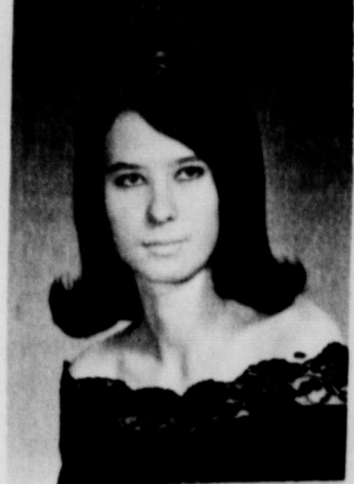

 You will be asked to vote FOR or AGAINST: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for payment of assistance to surviving spouses and minor children of governmental officers, employees, and agents, including members or organized volunteer fire department and certain organized police reserve units, who have hazardous duties and are killed in the performance of those duties."

PROPOSITION 8
 Authorizing an additional \$200 million in bonds to finance student loan program.
 You will be asked to vote FOR or AGAINST: "The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for additional loans to

Beaned by Baggage
 Wheeling around a corner bus driver cut so sharply the suitcase fell out of the overhead rack. It landed squarely ahead of an unsuspecting passenger, inflicting painful injuries.

In due course, she sued the company for damages. At the time the company protested that should not be held responsible such an unlikely accident.

But the court felt otherwise and ordered the company to pay the woman's claim. The judge said it was part of a driver's job to be his bus with full regard for the dangers of falling luggage.

As it does on all common carriers, the law imposes substantial responsibility on a bus company for the safety of the traveling public. This responsibility extends only to the way the driver has the bus but also to the way the baggage is placed—either on the overhead or in the seats and aisles.

Consider this case:
 A passenger set his suitcase on the floor, where it protruded more than two feet into the aisle. Another passenger, coming through the aisle, stumbled over the suitcase, suffering a broken leg.

Here, too, a damage suit against the bus company was successful. The victim won his case on the ground that the suitcase had been placed in that obstructive position—enough for the bus driver to have been reasonably alert—to notice it and taken action.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR1)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 51-d, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: Section 51-d. The Legislature shall have the power, by general law, to provide for the payment of assistance to the surviving spouse and minor children of a person who dies while in the service of the state of any city, county, district, or other political subdivision because of the hazardous nature of their duties, suffer in the course of the performance of those official duties. Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature. Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for payment of assistance to surviving spouses and minor children of governmental officers, employees, and agents, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and members of organized police reserve or auxiliary units with authority to make an arrest, of the state of any city, county, district, or other political subdivision because of the hazardous nature of their duties, suffer in the course of the performance of those official duties. Should the Legislature

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (HJR7)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 64 to read as follows: "Section 64. All other provisions of the Constitution notwithstanding, bonds issued pursuant to constitutional authority shall bear such rates of interest as shall be prescribed by the issuing agency, subject to limitations as may be imposed by the legislature." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to remove the constitutional interest rate limitations, subject to limits imposed by the Legislature, for bonds issued pursuant to constitutional authority."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (HJR50)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 50b-1 to read as follows: "Section 50b-1. (a) The Legislature may provide that the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, or its successor or successors, shall have authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in addition to those heretofore authorized to be issued pursuant to Section 50b of the Constitution. The bonds authorized herein shall be executed in such form, upon such terms and be in such denomination as may be prescribed by law and shall bear interest, and be issued in such installments as shall be prescribed by the Board providing that the maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by such bonds may be fixed by law. (b) The moneys received from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited to the credit of the Texas Opportunity Fund created by Section 50b of the Constitution and shall otherwise be handled as provided in Section 50b of the Constitution and the laws enacted pursuant thereto. (c) The said bonds shall be general obligations of the state and shall be payable in the same manner and from the same sources as bonds heretofore authorized pursuant to Section 50b. (d) All bonds issued hereunder shall, after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under this Constitution. (e) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment such acts shall be void because of their anticipatory nature." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for additional loans to students at institutions of higher education under the Texas Opportunity Plan."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR3)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 24, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 24. The Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall each receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the annual salary of the Governor. Each other member of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed the annual salary paid to a district judge from state funds. Members of the Legislature shall also receive a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day during each Regular and Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days. Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on August 5, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing that the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall receive a salary fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the salary of the Governor; providing that the Legislature shall fix the salary of the other members, not to exceed that received by a district judge from state funds; and removing the 120-day limitation on per diem for regular sessions."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR6)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 2, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 2. All occupation taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax; but the legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used for public purposes; all real and personal property owned by a nonprofit water supply corporation which is reasonably necessary for, and is used in, operation of the corporation in the acquisition, storage, transportation and sale of water as authorized as its sole legal purpose; actual places of (of) religious worship, also any property owned by a church or by a strictly religious society for the exclusive use as a dwelling place for the ministry of such church or religious society, and which yields no revenue whatever to such church or religious society; provided that such exemption shall not extend to more property than is reasonably necessary for a dwelling place and in no event more than one acre of land; places of burial not held for private or corporate profit; all buildings used exclusively and owned by persons or associations of persons for school purposes and the necessary furniture of all schools and property used exclusively and reasonably necessary in conducting any association engaged in promoting the religious, educational and physical development of boys, girls, young men or young women operating under a state or national organization of like character; also the endowment funds of such institutions of learning and religion not used with a view to profit; and when the same are invested in bonds or mortgages, or in land or other property which has been and shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions under foreclosure sales made to satisfy or protect such

bonds or mortgages, that such exemption of such land and property shall continue only for two years after the purchase of the same at such sale by such institutions and no longer, and institutions of purely public charity; and all laws exempting property from taxation other than the property above mentioned shall be null and void."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional amendment to exempt nonprofit water supply corporations from taxation;" and "AGAINST the Constitutional amendment to exempt nonprofit water supply corporations from taxation."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election, and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (SJR8)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 51-a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows: "Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be deemed expedient, for assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws as they now read or as they may hereafter be amended, providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services to or on behalf of: (1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or non-citizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years; (2) Needy individuals who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps; (3) Needy blind persons; (4) Needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children. "The Legislature may prescribe such other eligibility requirements for participation in these programs as it deems appropriate. "The Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in the providing of assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons, in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws making matching funds available to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they now are or as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of state funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount of state funds to or on behalf of any needy person shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; provided that the total amount of such assistance payments only out of state funds on behalf of such individuals shall not exceed the amount of Eighty Million Dollars (\$80,000,000) during any fiscal year. "Supplementing legislative appropriations for assistance payments authorized by this Section, the following sums are allocated out of the Omnibus Tax Clearance Fund and are appropriated to the State Department of Public Welfare for the period beginning September 1, 1969 and ending August 31, 1971: Three Million, Six Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$3,600,000) for Old Age Assistance, Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) for Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled, and Twenty-Three Million, Nine Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$23,900,000) for Aid to Families with Dependent Children. Such allocations and appropriations shall be made available on the basis of equal monthly installments and otherwise shall be subject to the maximum amount of existing laws making allocations and appropriations for these purposes. "Provided further, that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate federal statutes, as they now are or as they may be amended to the extent that federal matching money is not available to

the state for these purposes, then and in that event the Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enacts such laws as may be necessary in order that such federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons.

"Nothing in this Section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer or to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this state."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday in August, 1969. At the election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting "FOR" or "AGAINST" the proposition: "The Constitutional Amendment providing for assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of the needy aged, the needy blind, the needy disabled, and the needy dependent children and their caretakers; establishing Eighty Million Dollars (\$80,000,000) as the maximum amount that may be paid per year from state funds for assistance only; allocating and appropriating additional sums supplementing current legislative appropriations for assistance grants; and authorizing the Legislature to enact such laws as may be necessary in order that federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (HJR9)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 49-d-1 to read as follows: "Section 49-d-1. (a) In addition to Texas Water Development Bonds heretofore authorized to be issued by Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III of the Constitution, the Texas Water Development Board is hereby authorized to issue \$3,500,000,000 in aggregate principal amount of bonds. No part of such additional bonds shall be issued prior to approval thereof by the vote of two-thirds of the elected members of both houses of the Legislature. (b) The proceeds from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund. (c) The bonds herein authorized and all bonds authorized by such Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III shall bear such interest and mature as the Texas Water Development Board shall prescribe subject to the limitations as may be imposed by the Legislature. (d) The Texas Water Development Fund shall be used for the purposes heretofore permitted by and subject to the limitations in said Sections 49-c and 49-d and in addition thereto for the purposes of developing water resources and facilities for the State of Texas, both within the State and without the State of Texas. Provided, however, that financial assistance may be made pursuant to the provisions of such Sections 49-c and 49-d subject only to the availability of funds and without regard to the provisions in Section 49-c that such financial assistance shall terminate after December 31, 1982. (e) Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe, the Texas Water Development Board may receive grants and, in addition, execute contracts with the United States or any of its agencies, other states of the United States, foreign governments and others, for the acquisition and development of such water resources and facilities for the State of Texas. Such contracts when executed may be secured by the general credit of the state, and if so secured shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas in the same manner and with the same effect as Texas Water Development Bonds authorized herein and in said Sections 49-c and 49-d shall be reduced by the aggregate of principal payments committed under such contracts constituting general obligations of the state. The provisions hereof shall not be construed to limit the authority of the Texas

Water Development Board to execute contracts or issue revenue bonds when such contracts or bonds are not secured by the general credit of the state.

(f) Texas Water Development Bonds and such contracts secured by the general credit of the state shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas. (g) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on Tuesday, August 5, 1969, at which election all ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment broadening the powers of the Texas Water Development Board and the purposes of the Texas Water Development Fund; eliminating the interest limitations on Texas Water Development Bonds; raising the authorized amount of Texas Water Development Bonds by \$3,500,000,000; extending the maturity schedule on Texas Water Development Bonds; eliminating the procedures for curtailment and the curtailment date of financial assistance to be provided by the Texas Water Development Board."

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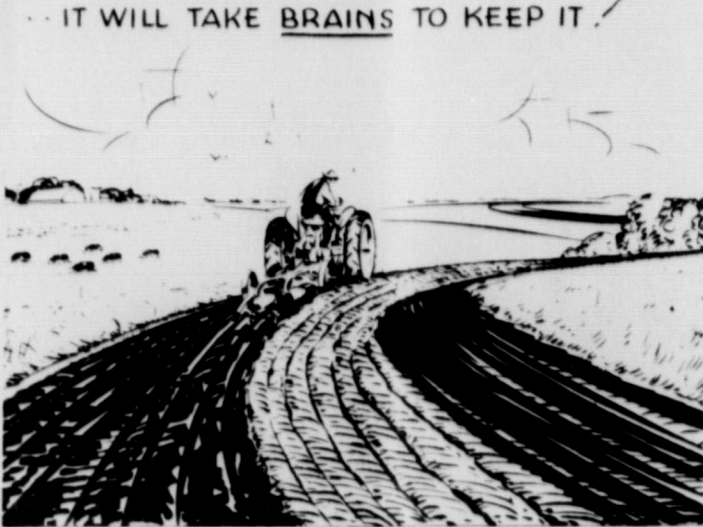

SOIL TRAFFIC IS MAJOR PROBLEM

As little as we may realize it, large cities and farmers in the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District have a lot in common - they both have traffic problems.

The number of vehicles isn't bothering the farmer, it's the increasing weight of the tractor, its plows and their many trips across the field.

Evidence shows that heavy tractor traffic compact the soil, slows or stops root growth and significantly reduces yields.

To avoid these problems, conservationists are seeking ways to farm with a minimum of tillage. They want to at least reduce traffic by proper equipment control.

The common systems for plowing, cultivating, spraying and harvesting often causes enough traffic to compress as much as 70% of the soil.

Some guidelines conservationists have given for designing and using farm equipment are:

* Read wheels should

move in the same path as front wheels

* The width of the wheel path, weight of equipment and number of passes should be as small as possible.

* The area treated by the operation should be as large as possible

* All units should follow the same path throughout the season.

* Fixed travel paths should be used year after year and not plowed.

The type soil you are farming and the kind of conservation cropping system you have is very important for the prevention and control of the plowpan, or compacted layer. Information on soil and proper cropping systems are available at your Soil Conservation Service office in Wheeler, Texas.
