### **ACROSS the FENCE**

We're pretty close to having a full-fledged drouth. Because we've had so much dry, hot weather, several counties south of us have sent in a recommendation to the State Disaster Committee asking that some relief be considered for their counties. As of this date, none of the applications have received approval. Louis Grayson, ASCS Office Manager, tells us that our forms have been ordered and await action by our County Disaster Committee. No acreage of diverted land, no acreage in the Soil Bank Program may be grazed or hay harvested without a penalty being incurred right now.

The Grain Sorghum is burning up. There is a possibility that later moisture would salvage some of it. However, many farmers have been discussing the probability of baling their maize for

Well, Greenbugs on maize have been about as popular as Ted Kennedy after his midnight car accident. But we have noted an increase of greenbug activity over the area. Some farmers have reported good control with Systox, a newly cleared chemical that is supposed to get into the sap of the plant and kill that way instead of by contact as Parathion does. Once a field has been treated for greenbugs, virtually all beneficial insects will be eliminated. Therefore, reinfestation and a buildup of greenbugs to damaging levels

could occur again. That's whay it's so important to inspect fields at frequent intervals and to begin a spraying program only after the insect pests have reached damaging levels.

#### 512 Voters Cast **Ballots Tuesday**

Voting was light Tuesday in Wheeler County with voters passing only three of the nine proposed State Constitutional Amendments. Proposition No. 2 - 3.5 billion in Water Development Bonds to bring water to Texas from the Mississippi River met with the approval of county voters. County voters also agreed to up the State welfare ceiling from \$60 million to \$80 million annually. The third and final amendment getting the approval of county voters was the Proposition No. 8 which ups the bonds available for financing student loan programs \$200 million.

512 voters cast ballots in Tuesday's elections. The number voting in each precinct is as follows: Prect. 1 - 45; Pct. 2 - 73; Prect. 3 -66; Prect. 4 - 21; Prect. 5 -35, Prect. 6 - 26; Prect. 7 - 17; Prect. 8 - 156; Prect. 9 - 76; and Absentee - 6.






