Oil & Gas Add \$9.1 Million To Wheeler County Economy In 1968

Wheeler County oil and gas wells pumped some \$9.1 million into the county's economy last year, according to a study just released by the Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association. Production from wells was \$5.7 million from natural-gas wells and \$3.4 million from oil. The U. S. Bureau of Economic Geology figures compiled by the association. The county is the 102nd in the state in production.

ACROSS the FENCE

We're pretty close to having a full-fledged drought. Because we've had so much dry, hot weather, several counties south of us have sent in a recommendation to the State Disaster Committee asking that some relief be considered for their counties. As of this date, none of the applications have received approval. Louis Grayson, ASOS Office Manager, tells us that our forms have been ordered and await action by our County Disaster Committee. No acreage of diverted land, no acreage in the Soil Bank Program may be grazed or hay harvested without a penalty being incurred right now.

The Grain Sorghum is burning up. There is a possibility that later moisture would salvage some of it. However, many farmers have been discussing the probability of boling their maize for hay.

Well, Greenbugs on maize have been about as popular as Ted Kennedy after his midnight car accident. But we have noted an increase of greenbug activity over the area. Some farmers have reported good control with Systox, a newly cleared chemical that is supposed to get into the sap of the plant and kill that way instead of by contact as Parathion does. Once a field has been treated for greenbugs, virtually all beneficial insects will be eliminated. Therefore, reinfestation and a buildup of greenbugs to damaging levels

78 Blocks Released For Paving, Curb, and Gutter

Wheeler's new look is moving on. The City Council met Monday to give the final word on the number of blocks to be paved with curb and gutter.

The original plan called for the paving of 84 blocks. Wheeler citizens will see the completion of 78 of these blocks. This high percentage is very unusual according to Lewis Construction Co., the firm hired for the paving. On an average, cities will complete only 50 to 75% of the original project.

The construction of curb and gutters has been underway since June 23. As of Monday, 20 blocks remained to be curbed. Completion of the curb and gutter will be August 20.

Workmen began Tuesday working on the yards which is one of the final steps before the paving. No definite date to begin the paving has been set, but work is expected to begin around the middle of the month.

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Baptist Summer Revival Planned for Aug. 17 - 24

a Church in Waco, where he is enrolled as a student at Baylor University. He will complete his studies and be graduated in August. Listed in Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities two years, he has sung lead roles in Baylor Opera productions.

512 Voters Cast Ballots Tuesday

Voting was light Tuesday in Wheeler County with voters passing only three of the nine proposed State Constitutional Amendments. Proposition No. 2 - 3.5 billion in Water Development Bonds tabling water to Texas from the Mississippi River met with the approval of county voters. County voters also agreed to up the State welfare ceiling from \$60 million to \$80 million annually. The third and final amendment getting the approval of county voters was the Proposition No. 8 which ups the bonds available for financing student loan programs \$200 million.

512 voters cast ballots in Tuesday's elections. The number voting in each precinct is as follows: Prec. 1 - 45; Prec. 2 - 73; Prec. 3 - 66; Prec. 4 - 21; Prec. 5 - 35; Prec. 6 - 26; Prec. 7 - 17; Prec. 8 - 156; Prec. 9 - 76; and Absentee - 6.

Wheeler Players Complete Roster

A complete roster of 44 players has been acquired for the 20th annual Greenbelt Bowl Football Classic in Childress August 16 and players have been divided into East and West squads, announced Weldon Hayes, Chairman of the player selection committee.

Players are to arrive in Childress August 11 for a week of workouts and activities. Greenbelt Queen candidates, nominated by the players, will participate in special activities Friday and Saturday, August 15 & 16.

The Greenbelt Bowl Classic's 20th anniversary is being observed this year and all former players, coaches and queens are extended a special invitation to attend the game.

Former participants are to register at a table set up at the entrance and will be recognized at halftime. Among ex-Greenbelters are pro-players, Jerry Tubbs, Frank Ryan, Bob Harrison, Robert McLeod and former coaches Frank Kimbrough, Ki Aldrich, Sammy Baugh, Dick Todd, Cheena Gilstrap, and many others.

Coaches for this year's classic are Grant Teaff, head coach and Buddy Horne, assistant both of Angelo State, who will guide the East Team; and Buddy Farnes, head coach and Ronnie Giles, assistant, both of McMurry, coaching the West. The West squad outweighs the East by one pound in team weight averages, 186 to 185.

Tommy Cole, 185 and James Tucker, 170 of Wheeler will play as Halfback and Center respectively on the West Squad.

The jury found for the plaintiff. He was awarded total and permanent disability.

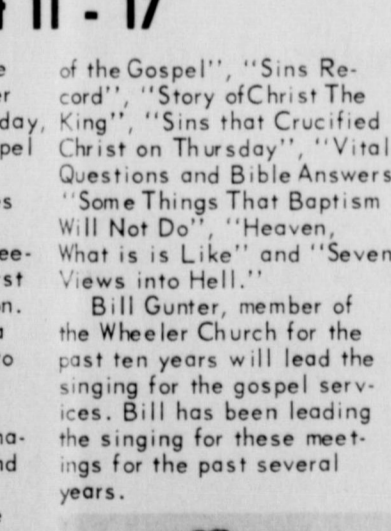

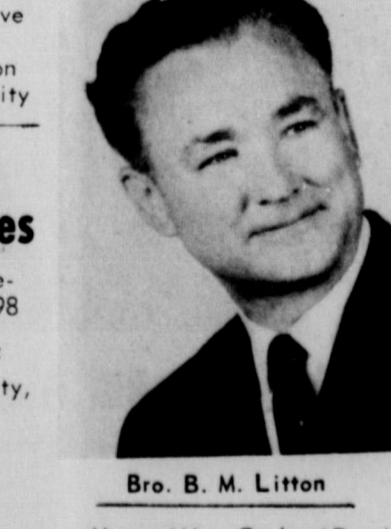

Food Is Primary Concern For All

The food we eat is of primary concern to everyone of us. We demand a large variety of foods, that must be of good quality, at least three times each day. There is some doubt that these demands will continue to be met.

Mr. C. P. Snow, an eminent British Scientist, says, "In many places and for many purposes, there are already too many people in the world. Within a generation there will be far too many, within two or three generations unless we show more sense, good will and foresight than men have ever shown - there will be tragically too many."

The emphasis here is put on population control. This is badly needed. But even with his control, we must improve the use of our basic resources. In introducing a bill to propose a commission on Population and the Environment, Rep. Morris K. Udall (Arizona) stated, "I am convinced that the link between population and environment is the very relationship on which the health and future of mankind as a species depend. Although man is much more than the other animals, he remains wholly dependant on the thin layer of air, water, and soil that comprises the surface of our earth, and acting in more ways delicate and complicated than the most sophisticated computer, makes all life possible on this earth. I believe man must rethink himself in terms of his natural environment if he is to thrive or even to survive."

A modern concept of conservation is that - "Conservation is much more than simply keeping what we have. It is much more than restoring what we once had. It is the development, protection use and management of all our resources for the needs

Frank Phillips College stresses the pursuit of sound values as well as the pursuit of knowledge.


Frank Phillips College upholds sound moral standards as well as academic standards.

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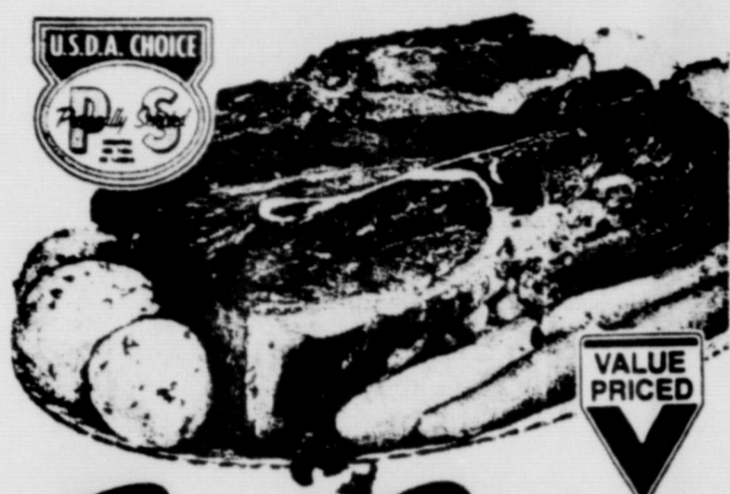

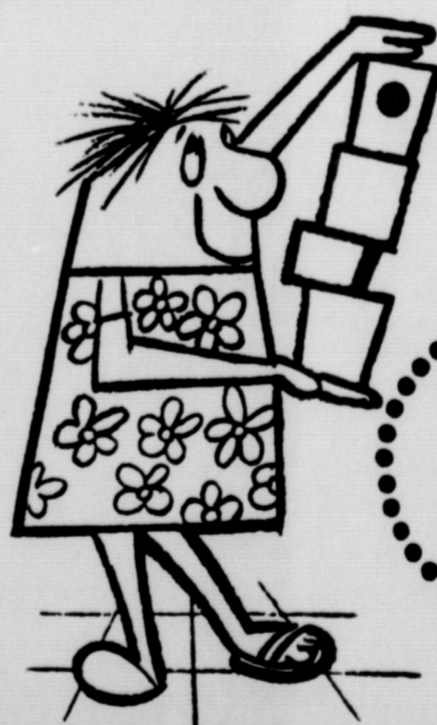
