The 90 year history was divided into three parts. Mrs. Margaret Trout of Mobeetie gave a brief history of the first 30 years of Wheeler County. In keeping with the first years of the county's early history, a boy scout group from Berger entertain-

ed the group with a series of indian dances. They were directed by Mr. Paul Cooper of Berger. Hymns and World War I songs were used by Shamrock citizens in presenting the second thirty years of the county's history. Mrs. Clyde Whittle, Mrs. Claude Montgomery and Mrs. Everett Smith were in charge of this portion. Narrator for the second period of history was Rhonda Smith and pianist was Candy Dodgen. The period 1939 through 1969 was covered by Wheeler. Cara Hyatt directed this segment of the program. A mens quartet, Bill Brooks, David Britt, Bob Patterson and Dick DeArment, sang several songs popular during this period and led the group in the closing song, America. The Wheeler County 4-H Texans presented the parade of the Wooden Soldiers. The drill was written and directed by Mrs. Bus Freeman. The youths wore red, white and blue uniforms.

Sallie Harris, county historical survey committee chairman, was introduced. She expressed her thanks to everyone for all the work they did in preparing the historical part of the program. Mrs. Sam Pagan, 93 of Pagan, was recognized as the oldest person in attendance. Irvin Bedrova of Lyons, Ill. came the greatest distance. He came 990 miles to attend the reunion. He was visiting relatives in Pagan. The 1200 persons in attendance were served barbecue, brown beans and onions donated by businesses and individuals from Mobeetie, Wheeler, Shamrock and Briscoe. Salads and deserts were brought by several citizens. Mobeetie School students sold homemade ice cream and cold drinks. Meads Bread furnished the bread for the feed. The back drop scene (J. J. Long General Merchandise Store) was painted by Margaret Newman of Mobeetie and Bill Setzler of Shamrock.

New Telephone Facilities Complete

Installation of the new central office equipment in Wheeler has been completed according to Sherron T. Lee, Division Manager for General Telephone Company. Testing the new equipment has been underway for about two weeks. Crews are also installing ringers in telephones where required for the new office and making other tests for the conversion. The new telephone numbers and central office equipment will be placed in service on September 10, 1969 at approximately 6:30 A. M., Lee said. New telephone directories and numbers for telephone dials will be distributed by the conversion date.

Bids for New Post Office Facilities Are Accepted

The Post Office Department is seeking competitive bids to build and lease the new post office building at Wheeler, Texas. Postmaster General Winton M. Blount has announced. Competitive bidding encourages the most attractive and economical offer to the Government, Mr. Blount noted. This will help the Department to improve postal service while keeping expenditures low, he added. Under the lease construction program, the site located at the northeast corner of intersection of Canadian and Sixth Streets, will be assigned to the successful bidder who will control the property, construct the building to Department specifications and

lease it to the Department for a basic period of ten years and options of twenty years. The land and building will remain on local tax rolls. The building will contain 2592 square feet. The Department's capital investment will be limited substantially to postal equipment.

Bidding documents may be obtained from Mr. V. E. Bell, Real Estate Officer, P. O. Box 1886, Lubbock, Texas 79408. The Real Estate Officer will supply bidding forms, building specifications, lease provisions and other information. Bids must be submitted to the Real Estate Officer by 2:00 p. m., November 3, 1969 at Lubbock, Texas.

Today my daughter, who is seven years old, started school as usual. She wore a dark blue dress with a white collar. She had on black shoes and wore blue socks. 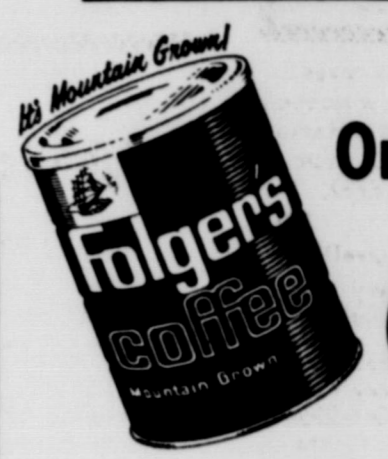
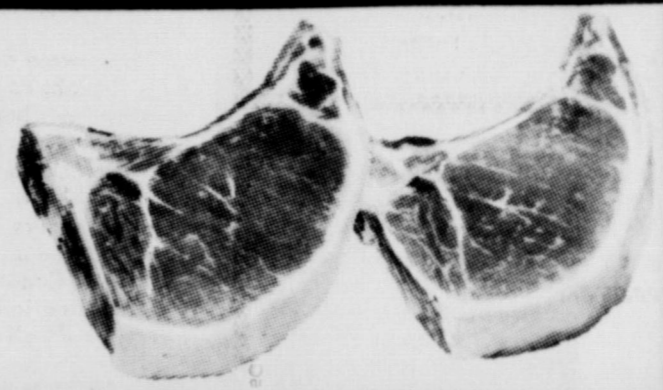

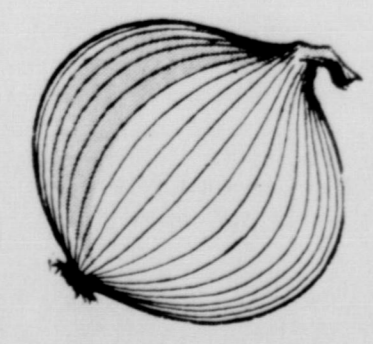

Saving Bonds Total for July

July 1969 sales of United States Savings Bonds and Freedom Shares in Wheeler County totaled \$9,379.00, according to a report from R. J. Holt, Chairman of the Wheeler County Savings Bonds Committee. January thru July sales totaled \$72,784.00 and this is 33% of the 1969 goal of \$220,000.00.

"Bond holders should be aware of two facts and give consideration before redeeming for non-emergency or planned purposes," Chairman Holt stated.

"One-accrued interest on bonds must be declared on Federal Income Tax returns in the year Bonds are cashed and, two, The Department of The Treasury has proposed to Congress a new higher rate of 5 per cent on both E and H Bonds retroactive to June 1, 1969. The 5 per cent rate would also apply to all outstanding bonds" Mr. Holt said.

"People should remember too, that Savings Bonds are sold to be redeemed so there's a steady rate of redemptions

at all times for emergencies, planned expenditures, and education and retirement purposes. In addition the unique tax advantages of U. S. Savings Bonds make them especially attractive when fully understood by the bond saver.

"The \$52 billion outstanding is a major brake on inflationary forces and represents 23% of the publicly-held portion of the Federal debt," Mr. Holt said.

Texas sales during the first seven months of 1969 totaled \$104,261,845 - a decrease of 2.4% from 1968 when sales were \$106,830,122. Sales during the month totaled \$15,058,788 compared to \$15,862,130 during the same period of 1968.

Nationwide, investments of United States Savings Bonds were 3% below a year ago for the first seven months; however, July investments set a 13-year record for the month, totaling \$419 million.

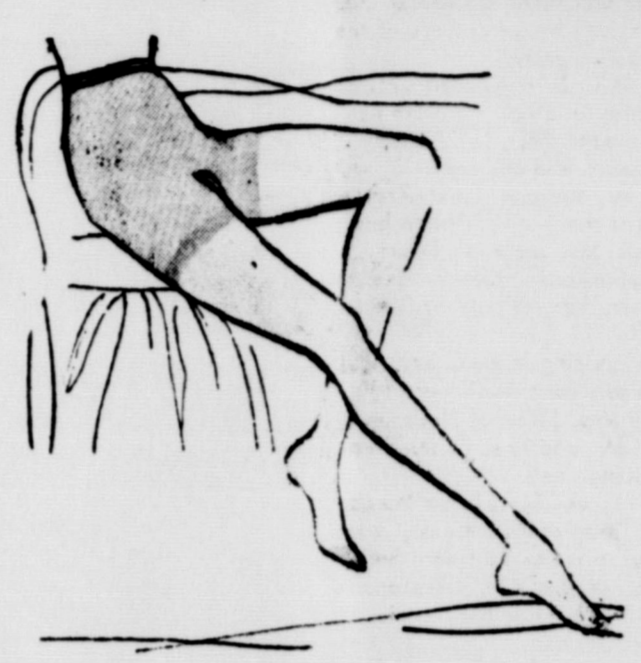
