MUSTANGS TO OPEN FOOTBALL SEASON

A young, eager band of Mustangs will take the field at Lefors Friday night at 8 p. m. and the 1969 football season will get its start.

Graduation dealt the Mustangs a big blow and Coach Jake Cottrell and his staff is faced with a rebuilding task after the loss of ten lettermen. Pride, tradition, and defending their district championship will be added incentives for this year's squad.

The Lefors Pirates are always a formidable foe and this year is no exception. The Pirates will start only one senior on defense and offense and like the Mustangs, will be out to get the season off on a winning note.

"We needed about two more weeks to get ready for Lefors," Coach Cottrell said when asked about this first game. "Our defense is coming along pretty good but we are way behind offensively.

We are playing boys at new positions and some of the youngsters have little if any game experience," the coach added.

Coach Cottrell has two new assistants this year to work along with the one holdover assistant, Richard Gaines, who is also head Jr. High Coach. Jim Bateman and Bill Wiggins are the new faces on the staff. Coach Bateman comes to Wheeler from Breckenridge and Coach Wiggins was on the Silverton staff last year.

There are 33 boys currently on the Mustang squad and the coaching staff has a B Team schedule to give the younger players some added experience.

Three players are on the injured list with one boy, Randy Hanks, being out for the season with a broken collar bone. James Vise is out indefinitely with a broken arm and Terry Lewallen is hampered by a twisted knee.

Mrs. Bailey Whiteley, 68, a long time former resident of Kelton, and now of Wheeler, was dead on arrival at Shamrock General Hospital about 11 a. m. Sunday.

Car, Truck Collision Kills R. S. Holt

A 26 year old Shattuck, Okla. man was killed instantly about 10:15 p. m. Friday when the car he was driving collided with a semi-trailer truck on U. S. 287 about ten miles west of Childress.

Ronald Stephen Holt was a driver for the Milk Producers Association of Amarillo out of Shattuck. He was traveling east on the highway and was attempting to pass a line of three eastbound trucks, when the fourth truck approached from the opposite direction. He attempted to

avoid the collision by swerving to the left side of the highway. The maneuver caused

the vehicle to skid sideways and the big truck just ran over the car, a witness said.

Holt was thrown from the vehicle by the impact. His car was ripped in half and part of the car body was still attached to the front of the truck, which managed to stop after traveling an estimated 400 feet.

The driver of the truck said he applied his brakes and swerved to the left to avoid hitting the oncoming car. His truck sideswiped one of the three trucks that Holt was attempting to pass.

Neither the driver or his driving partner were injured. Funeral services for Holt were pending with the Totten Funeral Home of Electra. He was born June 19, 1943 in Wichita County.

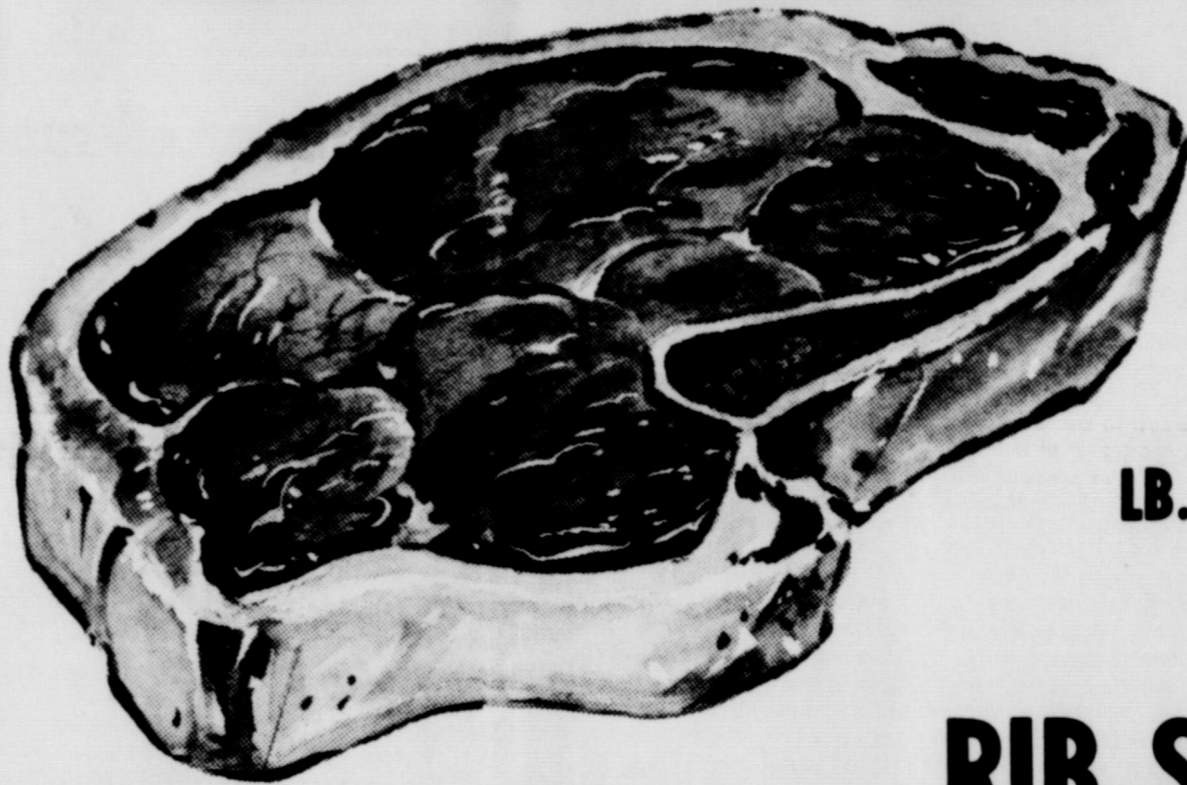

ACROSS THE FENCE
By Max Hatter, CAA

The drought is broken! Welcome rains were worth a million dollars for the agricultural community. One farmer commented that the rain was a month late. Prospects for making a maize crop are good, especially in later plantings that appear not to be affected by the prolonged dry spell. Dryland cotton crops prospects were boosted from "nothing" to promising. Several counties south of us had been declared disaster areas and some ranchers had turned back diverted acres money to graze those acres. Noticed that work on the Wheeler feedlot is still coming along. The N. F. O. News letter from Hereford says that a 15,000 head feed lot will consume an average of 15,000 acres of grain sorghum. Another interesting item quoted was that if the price of cattle had gone up in equal proportions to wages that fat beef would be bringing \$52.75 per hundred.

Demand for pork has been phenomenal, pushing prices higher than we guessed possible. At the same time, local demands for feeder pigs has been very good. A man from Perryton contacted me last week wanting to locate 3,000 feeder pigs a month. We look to see hogs fed feedlot fashion in the Panhandle similar to cattle feedlots. Jim Montgomery, Ben Westmoreland and Jerry Killingsworth are but a few folks in our county who are gearing up to produce a large quantity of feeder pigs. Right now the profit margins have been unbelievable. With present prices, a new hog feeder, a few days ago, was quoting profits of \$30 a head on hogs. An old timer, told us that a few \$15 per hundred hog markets might stabilize their enthusiasm.
