to a six inch layer of topsoil
 and the fact that it rains.

Wheat planting will be in
 full swing again when weather
 allows it. Armyworms pose a
 real threat to newly planted
 wheat. We have received num-
 erous calls and visits from
 ranchers in our area indicat-
 ing their volunteer or newly
 planted wheat was being pick-
 ed clean. Harrison Hall of
 Wheeler tells us that their
 volunteer wheat in Oklahoma
 has been hard hit. John Mc-
 Dowell, Lela, also reports
 damage. The armyworms usu-
 ally start along the edge of
 a field and gradually move
 across it. Often times only
 a limited amount of a field
 may need to be treated for
 control. Homeowners with
 lawns should be on the alert
 since lawns can be picked

clean too.

One of the most serious
 threats in the cattle business
 is a disease known commonly
 as "grass tetany." It is cau-
 sed by a lack of the mineral
 element magnesium in the
 cow's system. Some ranchers
 feed a mineral or mineral
 block containing magnesium
 but we're still losing cattle.
 The affected cattle just seem
 to waste away. Folks have
 reported to us losing several
 head in a herd.

We have visited with veter-
 inarians and medical research-
 ers who tell us that evi-
 dence indicates that nitro-
 gen fertilizers are tying up the
 phosphates in the soil. Tet-
 any occurs with a cold spell
 and the cold is supposed to
 change nitrates to nitrites
 which poison cattle.

It is believed (research
 does not reveal it but top
 cowmen indicate it is true)
 that a fertilizer containing
 18% magnesium will unlock
 the phosphates in the soil
 and help prevent grass tet-
 any. The fertilizer containing
 22% potash, 22% magnesium
 and 18% sulfur (called
 K-Mag) is put out at the rate
 of 100-125 pounds to the acre
 and sells for about \$40 a ton
 bulk. We know that it is mined
 in New Mexico. This product
 should be priced reasonable
 in our area since the freight
 would be at near the minimum.

I personally have no vested
 interest in the fertilizer busi-
 ness, but if this information
 will help one cowman with
 this problem, I'll be well
 pleased. If you're having
 trouble, you might want to
 consider contacting your lo-
 cal fertilizer dealer to see if
 he can get his product for
 you. If he does, you may wish
 to apply it as a fertilizer on
 newly planted wheat you
 plan to graze your cattle on.

Our Secretary of Agricul-
 ture, Clifford Hardin, plans
 to hold the fifth of a series
 of "listening Conferences"
 at Texas A&M University on
 Sept. 18. Farmers and farm
 industry leaders from Texas
 and four other southwestern
 states, Arkansas, Louisiana,
 New Mexico and Oklahoma,
 will have an opportunity to
 tell him what's on their minds.
 It will be held in G. Rollie
 White Coliseum on the Texas
 A&M University campus.

Such subjects as farm pro-
 grams, how to maintain and
 increase farm income, rural

urban balance, proper nutri-
 tion and diets, development
 of natural resources and
 conservation are due to get
 major attention during the
 day.

While plans for the confer-
 ence are not yet complete, it
 is known that every person
 who attends will have an
 opportunity, either through
 oral presentation or written
 brief, to present his ideas.

As plans are finalized,
 details on the conference
 will be released. Several of
 the Secretary's senior staff
 members are expected to at-
 tend and also members of the
 Agriculture Committee of the
 House of Representatives,
 headed by Congressman
 W. R. Poage from Waco will
 attend at least a part of the
 conference. Dr. H. O. Kunkel,
 Dean, College of Agriculture
 at A&M, will serve as presid-
 ing officer. Land-Grant univer-
 sities in the five states are
 cooperating in staging the
 event.

We have no indication yet
 as to whom will be represent-
 ing Wheeler County. It is
 supposed that our farm orga-
 nizations will send representa-
 tives.

**Texas Hog Cholera Pro-
 gram:** Texas will advance to
 Phase 3 of the National Hog
 Cholera Eradication Program
 August 1, according to the
 Texas Animal Health Commis-
 sion. Phase 3 is a contin-
 uation of immediate report-
 ing of cholera outbreaks and
 more vigorous inspection of
 garbage cooking and feeding
 facilities. Infected herds will
 be quarantined and premises
 depopulated by marketing
 healthy hogs in a federally
 inspected slaughter plant.
 Diseased animals will be
 destroyed under supervision
 of regulatory veterinarians
 with indemnity payment.

are on the road or in the fields.
 If you intend to plant small
 grains, winter pastures, or
 wheat better give considera-
 tion to fertilization.

High crop yields or inten-
 sive grazing cannot be real-
 ized without adequate soil
 fertility and most soils in
 Wheeler County are low in
 one or more nutrients. The
 level of available plant nu-
 trients cannot be determined
 by visual observations.

Soil tests, on the other
 hand, will indicate what nu-
 trients are available and which
 are in short supply and
 should be the basis for devel-
 oping fertilizer usages. Some
 fertilizer companies offer
 free analysis.

A number of soil testing
 facilities are available but
 one should be selected which
 used procedures suited for
 your soils. The soil sample
 must be carefully taken if the
 test results are to be reli-
 able. A core or slice of soil
 should be taken from 10 to
 15 spots in the average field.
 The cores or slices should be
 placed in a clean container
 and thoroughly mixed before
 taking out the sample to re-
 present the field.

Cartons for mailing the soil
 samples are available from
 the offices of county agricul-
 tural agents as are instruc-
 tions for taking samples, crop-
 ping history blanks for re-
 porting past uses of the tested
 area as well as crops to be
 planted in the immediate future.

Samples should be taken
 and submitted to a testing
 laboratory as soon as possible
 so the lab recommendations
 for fertilizer use can be used
 for fall planted crops.

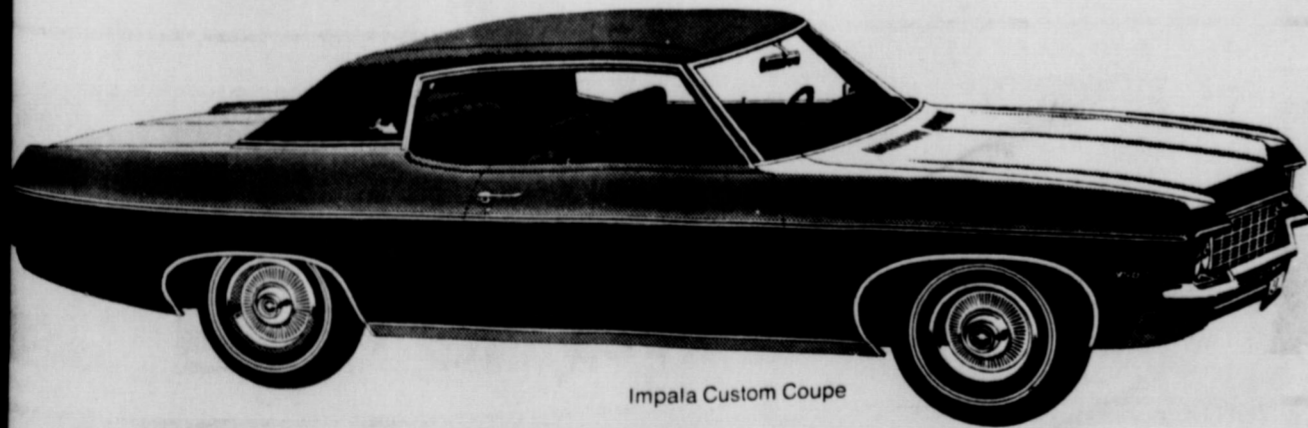

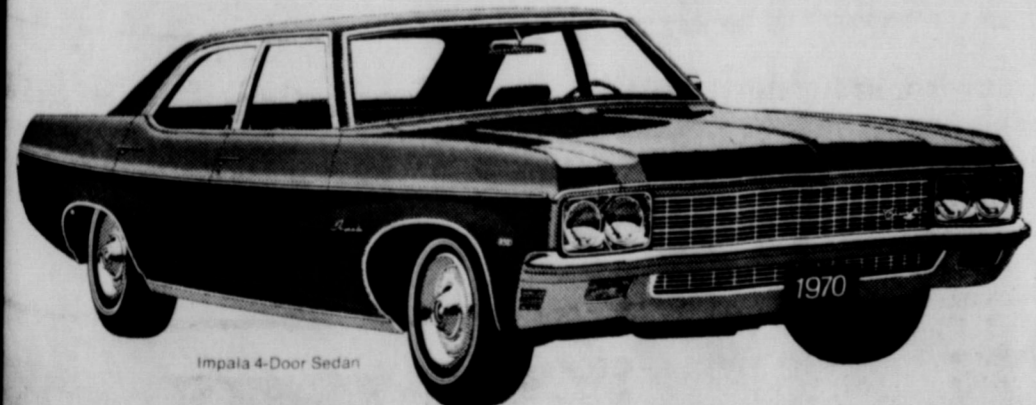
