Larry Robinson sped 90 yards with an intercepted

pass in the second quarter and that touchdown killed the Mustangs and the Wellington Skyrockets proceeded to give Wheeler a 38-12 pasting last Friday night.

Gamely fighting back from a quick two touchdown deficit early in the game, the Mustangs saw their hopes vanish on the flying feet of Robinson and were never able to stem the tide although they did narrow the margin in the fourth quarter on a 7 yard dash by Roy Don Chick.

The host Skyrockets were quick to get on the scoreboard as they took the opening kickoff and drove 75 yards through and around the Mustang defense in nine plays with Danny West skirting the Mustang right side for the final five yards. Charles Mauldin, Skyrocket quarterback, followed the same route for the two pointer.

Wheeler had hardly recovered from this initial blast from the Rockets when dame fortune turned her head on the Mustangs. A low snap from center on fourth down gave the Skyrockets new life as Dave Britt was unable to get the kick off and Wellington

had control of the pigskin at the Mustang 22. Wellington garnered noth-

ing in three trys but on fourth down from the 22, Mauldin hit Robinson with a screen pass and Robinson went over untouched to give the host Skyrockets a 14 point bulge with still 5 minutes remaining in the first quarter.

The Mustangs got new life late in the first period when a high snap sailed over Danny West's head as heattempted to punt from his 20 yard line. West recovered at the Wellington 15 and the Skyrockets were penalized half the distance for clipping on the play as the Mustangs took over at the Wellington eight yard line.

The Mustangs pounded the Wellington right side for four funning plays with Chick getting 4 and then Britt adding 1 more down to the 3. Chick then hit for 2 and sliced over the goal for the final yard to paydirt.

The pass for two points was no good and the Mustangs were back in the game trailing by 14-6.

Wheeler began to carry the fight to Wellington and forced the Skyrockets to punt after kicking off and had the ball at the Skyrocket 42 as Mustang fans hopes began to rise.

The Mustangs moved for a first down on a pass from Rodney Weatherly to Darrell Hanks, who caught the ball in a crowd of Wellington defenders at the Skyrocket 26. On second down, Weatherly's pass was picked off by Rob-

Shamrock had the ball three times in the opening quarter and each time they put points on the board and it looked like the Colts could do nothing to stop the Irish offense or get one of their own going.



ectly ahead is going to be formidable, For example, the population of the United States will require over twice as much production from its agricultural land by the year 2000. We now use about 350 billion gallons of water daily; by 1980 we will need 600 billion gallons of water per day. Each year more than a million acres of land are taken out of agriculture and used for highways, housing projects and other urban uses. By the end of the century the demand for recreation will double. We are still losing some 500,-000 acres of land a year as the result of erosion and other damage, both rural and urban.

Soil eriosion affects the happiness and the welfare of the individual farmer and his family, and through them the welfare of the community of which they are a part and the town where they buy and sell. From decreased business in the towns, the influence of soil losses widens and spreads until it is felt by manufacturers and mill workers in distant states.

A trip across almost any state will furnish one the opportunity to observe the relationship of the soil and the well being of people. In areas where conservation has been practiced, one may see good crops, good fences, good buildings, painted and well cared for, a happy and prosperious people living on the land, and thriving towns or cities serving those who live there. In regions where soil conservation has not been practiced one finds poor crops, poor fences, dilapidated buildings, bad roads, poor chools, poor churches and a low level human well being. How does erosion affect you? It affects everyone, directly or indirectly whether farmer, merchant, eacher, lawyer, doctor, banker, old or young.

It influences not only the United States, but touches, sometimes quite tangibly, the interests of foreign countries with whom we do business. Soil is the basic source of wealth and no one, however remote from the farm, is entirely unaffected by soil erosion.


