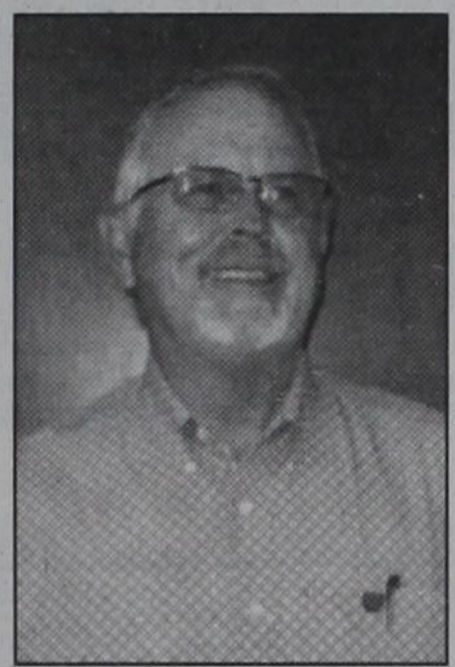

Turcotte Cemetery Is Recorded

The Texas Historical Commission (THC) recently designated Turcotte Cemetery as a Historic Texas Cemetery. The distinction means the cemetery has been legally recorded through the THC's Historic Texas Cemetery Program, an important step in ensuring its preservation.

This designation is reserved for cemeteries that are at least 50

years old and documented through the Historic Texas Cemeteries process to record their historic association and significance. “This designation is a tool that will increase public awareness of these important cultural resources,” said Mark Wolfe, executive director of the THC. “Knowledge and education are among the best ways to guarantee the preservation of a historic cemetery.”

Suzanne Lohberger, member of the Wheeler County Historical Commission, would like to give special thanks to Wheeler County Precinct 1 Commissioner, Eimer “Bubba” Harrison, Jr., who saw that a tombstone was placed there to honor those buried in the cemetery. Without Commissioner Harrison's gesture, the cemetery's location could have been lost for all time. The Turcotte Cemetery is located approximately nine miles north of Wheeler.

Cemeteries hold valuable historic information and they are often the last reminders of early settlements' historical events, religious beliefs, lifestyles and genealogy. While the Historic Texas Cemetery designation encourages cemetery preservation, it cannot guarantee that a historic cemetery will avoid destruction. Threats to historic cemeteries include urban expansion and development, vandalism, grazing animals and long-term deterioration from weather and uncontrolled vegetation.

The THC developed the Historic Texas Cemetery designation to address the destruction of historic cemeteries and the illegal removal of cemetery fixtures. Any individual or organization is eligible to submit an application for

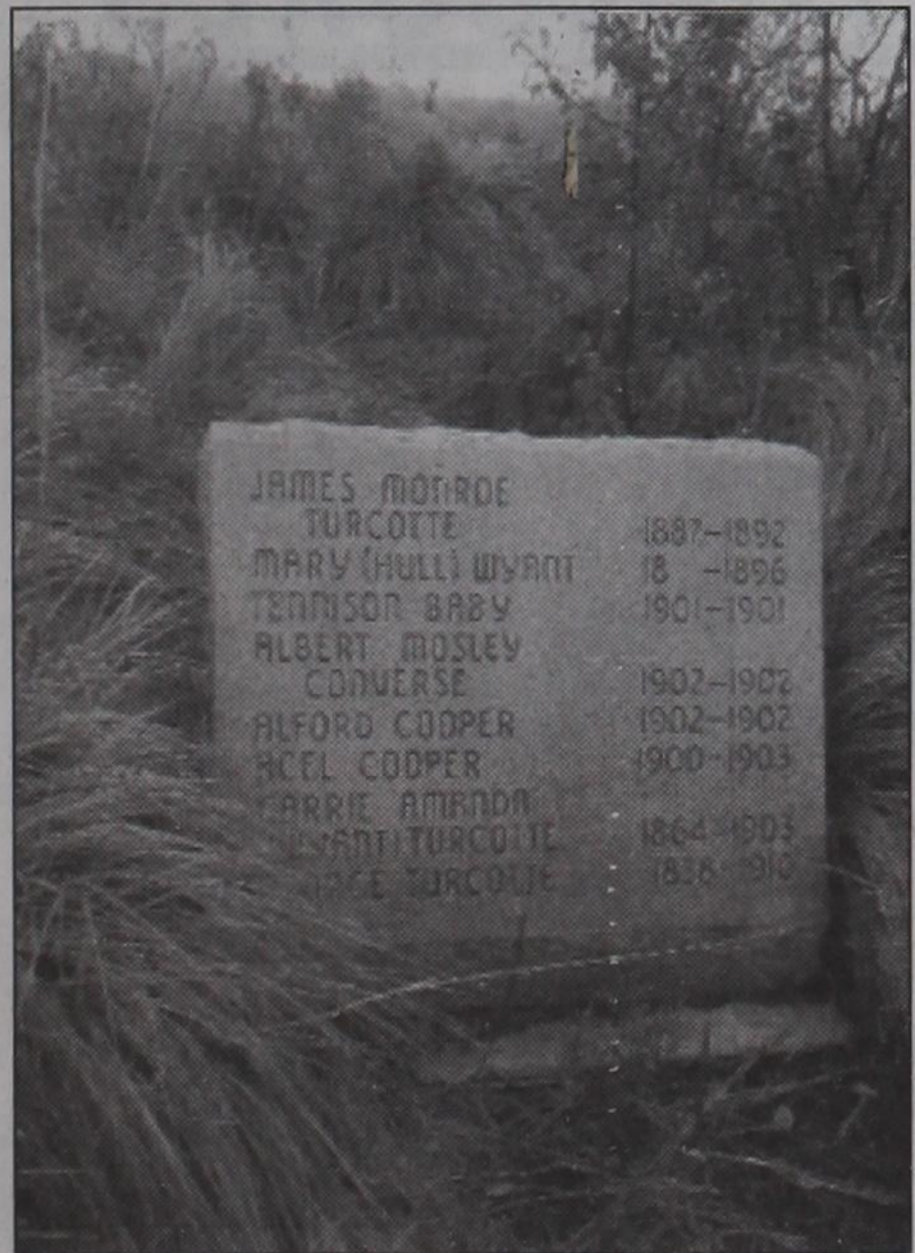

OLD TIMES NOT FORGOTTEN

WASH DAY

As I've said before, our ancestors sure were a hardy bunch of folks. Every job they did was labor intensive. Back in the old days, when farmers worked horses, most plows didn't have seats to ride on. The man would just walk behind the plow. After a long, hard day of plowing, he'd still have to take the harness off of the horses, feed them, then maybe milk a cow or two, before he could go to the house. The women didn't have it any better either. After fixing breakfast on the wood-stove, she would get the kids ready for school. Most of the time, there'd be a little country school within five miles, so the kids would walk to and from it.

In the summer, some women would help hoe weeds in the cotton fields, then in the fall, pull bolls, or pick cotton. I'm sure they'd have to devote pretty much a whole day of the week to do their washing. A monstrous job! Heating water on a wood stove, then using a "rub board" to help scrub the clothes clean, must have been a back-breaking chore. When all was washed, she'd go hang them on the clothesline. Even after that, it wasn't the end of the story. Some of the clothes had to be ironed. This was a huge job in itself. The irons had to be heated on the stove. Yes sir, that was a

hard way to live.

Things started to improve a lot by the time my parents were grown. Tractors had started to replace horses to plow with, and some primitive washing machines had been invented. Most people didn't have one though, but would go to town every week to the "wash-house," or "washateria." These places usually had ten or twelve washing machines that you could rent. Each work station had a "top-loading washer. Overhead, were hot and cold water hoses to use when filling the washer. There were three galvanized tubs arranged in a square configuration, with a "wringer," that could swivel around between the tubs. The first two tubs had clean water in them for rinsing, and the last tub was to hold the rinsed and "wrung out" clothes. First, they'd take the clothes out of the washing machine and run them through the wringer. The rollers would mash the water out of the clothes and drop them into the first "rinse-water" tub, then the wringer would be rotated to the second rinse tub, then finally, through the wringer and into the final tub. By that time... you were ready to get out of that hot, humid, sweaty place, and be on your way home. (Today, people pay to sit in this type of environment to "cleanse" their skin.) All of this may sound like a lot of work, but it beat the heck out of the "rub board" and heating your own water. It was also, a lot faster. One other good thing, while the first load was washing, the women could visit a little with each other.

Inventive minds have made life a lot easier on all of us. So much for the "good old days."

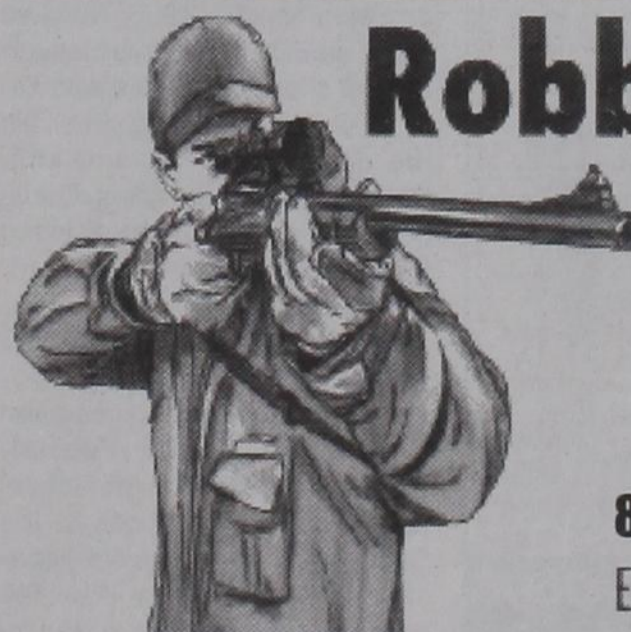

City of Mobeetie Gets New Water Well

The City of Mobeetie, like many small communities in the Texas Panhandle has had to struggle to keep a viable water system and supply. We needed a new water system, so the city obtained a loan from Farmers' Home Administration in 1982 for a new well, standpipe storage tank, water lines and improvements.

During the construction of the new well, the old well, which produced only 40-50 gallons per minute was in use and the city planned to use it as a second well for backup, but it was out of service several times. The city spent over \$9,000.00 on the old well and decided to abandon it after the new well was in operation.

Dispatch to scene on rural calls was 9 minutes, giving an overall average of 4.8 on getting to the scene. Wednesdays were the busiest days of the month, receiving 7 calls; Thursdays and Fridays were tied with 5 calls each.

The Wheeler Sheriff's dispatchers have been taking special training for the past 2 weeks to teach them to give emergency medical instructions via telephone. This covers major trauma, major bleeding, obstructed airways, poisoning, cardiac arrest and O.B. Problems.

There is one major problem. It seems when the ambulance is paged, the phone with all the phones ringing is going to be hard to do. Most of these inquiries, but not all of them, are just citizens wanting to know what is happening; i.e., "Where is the ambulance going?" They could interfere with someone receiving life-saving instruction. The dispatcher is busy with the ambulance channel and does not have time for unnecessary phone calls. You are interfering with the emergency traffic and could cause problems for the dispatcher, the ambulance and the person needing help. All this to satisfy one's curiosity?

This could be a high price to pay just to find out what's going on; please don't jeopardize someone's life. The ambulance service and the Sheriff's office are striving to give the best service possible. We ask for everyone's help; it just takes one person to mess everything up.

Wheeler is fortunate to have four fine doctors serving the community. It was the original intention to recognize and honor Dr. Larry Barbour and Dr. Louie Mendiola, but they will both be out of town. Dr. Barbour came to Wheeler right after completing his medical training in 1964. He was gone from Wheeler for a time and returned.

Dr. Mendiola joined the staff in Wheeler in April, 1972.

Dr. Bob Galutia moved to Wheeler from Durant, Okla., in 1977. He moved to Shamrock for a time and returned to Wheeler to re-open his practice on September 15, 1986.

Dr. Gary Wofford began his practice in Wheeler on October 8, 1986. He is assisted in his practice by his wife, Barbara, a registered nurse.

The Bill Robertsons returned to Wheeler shortly after the first of the year for Bill to begin his work as administrator for Parkview Hospital. The couple left Wheeler to see the world after high school graduation and took advantage of the opportunity to return to Wheeler.

SPRING SNOW Roads Blocked, Electricity Off

Winter returned to the Wheeler area on the second day after the official arrival of spring. High winds and snow did not affect driving conditions in the immediate Wheeler area, but five miles to the north or 3.5 miles west was another world.

Wheeler received 0.65 inches of moisture from rain during the night Sunday and snow began falling in Wheeler around 9 a.m.; 0.16 inches of moisture was produced. Very little of the snow stayed on the ground in Wheeler.

The picture and driving conditions changed as one rounded the last curve on Highway 152 going into Mobeetie. Mobeetie received 12 to 15 inches of blowing snow, according to Paul Hathaway. This produced drifts between 5 and 6 feet and caused the closing of the road west out of Wheeler from 9:00 p.m. Monday until 1:00 p.m. Tuesday. The conditions worsened the farther west.

Georgia Tipps reported about a foot of snow between Briscoe and Allison. Travel is possible with 4-wheel drive vehicle.

Travel north out of Wheeler was also stopped at 9 on Monday evening with traffic unable to go any farther than Holland Hill, approximately 20 miles north on Highway 83. With the release of traffic out of Wheeler Tuesday, only one lane was open at Holland Hill. Some 30 vehicles were stalled at this point.

Electric power was lost at Wheeler, Mobeetie, Briscoe and Allison at 1:00 p.m. Monday. The power failure was due to downed lines, some caused by broken poles. Service was restored to Wheeler around 4:30 with short periods of failure continuing until 7 p.m. (Cecil Hess counted some 20 times the electricity turned off and on; his electric calculator was turned off and on that many times.) Power was to have been restored at Briscoe and Allison Tuesday afternoon, but Southwestern Public Service was not sure when they could restore service to Mobeetie. The power furnished to Wheeler was possible only through switching of lines.

The churches in Wheeler were opened for use by travelers stranded in Wheeler. An exact number of the people spending the night in these shelters is not known. One group of 33 young people from Fletcher, Okla., were enroute to Angel Fire to ski and had to spend the night at the First Baptist Church. An estimated 75 people were stranded in Wheeler by the storm.

Bill and Virginia Hext of Glazier were returning home from Stephenville with a load of roping calves. They were stopped at the Tindol place, 5 miles north of Wheeler and unloaded their animals at the Wheeler County Show Barn. They used the time in Wheeler to work the cattle.

Wheeler's temperatures stayed above freezing all day and only after dark did the temperature drop to freezing and below.

A number of local people were stranded away from home. Their accommodations ranged from M.K. Brown Auditorium to the courthouse at Panhandle, to their cars.
