GROOM NIPS MUSTANGS 14-6

The Groom Tigers were jumpy on the spot and were quick to capitalize on what few mistakes the Mustangs made and rode them for a 14-6 victory last Friday night in Groom.

It was a hard defeat for the charges of Coach Jake Cottrell as the Mustangs seemed able to move the football consistently but a couple of penalties stopped two drives and an intercepted pass stopped another at the Groom 3.

The Mustangs completely dominated play in the first half but were unable to get a yard. Groom kicked off to the Mustangs and the Mustangs appeared to be headed goalward when a red flag wiped out a Mustang first down at the Tiger 38. Unable to overcome the 15 yard fine for holding the Mustangs were forced to kick.

The first quarter ended with both teams sparring near midfield but the Tigers put up a mild threat early in the second period. Driving from their 43 to the Mustang 33, the Tigers had a first down and had their first good march of the night going.

Only six yards were garnered in four plays as the Mustangs took over at the 27 to kill the threat. Moving to the Groom 47, the Mustangs were hit with the flag again, this time on a clip call that wiped out a first down jaunt by Chick to the Tiger 37. Once more, the Mustangs were forced to punt.

Wheeler got the ball rolling again late in the quarter

after getting the pigskin on a punt at the Mustang 45 with 4:21 to play. Roy Don Chick and Dave Britt pounded the Tiger line for a couple of first downs to the Tiger 30 but time got short on the Mustangs. Only 36 seconds remained in the half as Rod Weatherly's pass was intercepted by Dal Howerton at the Groom 3 yard line. Having moved the ball well the first half, the Mustangs had to go into the halftime break with a goose egg on the board.

The Mustangs came out with a vengeance in the third quarter and rammed to their first TD after taking over at the Groom 49 following a punt return and a personal foul call against Groom.

Once more the Mustang strategy was to use Chick and Britt on alternate carries and they ripped the Tiger line behind the excellent blocking of the entire Mustang forward wall for a couple of first downs to the 22. Britt got 6 at left guard and then smashed off left tackle for 9 more to the 7 and another first down. Chick rammed down to the 3 and then burst into the end zone on third down after a quarterback sneak failed to gain. Keith Wood's kick was wide and the happy Mustangs finally saw their efforts rewarded.

If at any time during the game, the Mustangs had things going their way, it was at this point. The Tigers seemed to be down and couldn't get but one first down after the kickoff.

The Tigers were forced to punt and Simmons fielded the ball at the Wheeler 19.

The ball popped free and after the wild scramble, the Tigers had recovered at the Wheeler 17.

It was now time for the Mustangs to lose a little of their composure and the Tigers got the tying touchdown in just four plays. Howerton got the final 7 yards as he broke free from the grasp of several Mustangs. Britten kicked the extra point and the Tigers had the lead after having made only 60 yards total for the game to this point.

The Mustangs were unable to move following the kickoff but got the wind to their backs as the quarter ended.

Wheeler made their big move with 8:36 to play in the game as Blackwell's punt was killed at the Mustang 31. Wheeler stuck to their bread and butter smashes inside the Tiger ends to move smartly to the Tiger 34. Jim-

me Cole made a fine reception of a Weatherly pass and stepped out at the Tiger 20 for an apparent first down, but an official ruled that Cole had caught the ball out of bounds. Chick got the first down on the next play, but the aroused Tigers now were able to blunt the Mustangs drive and forced an attempted field goal try which fell way short of the mark.

Only 1:34 remained in the game when the Tigers took over at the Groom 20. The Mustangs swarmed the Tigers on their first two attempts to get more running room and called time after each play. The Tigers got their last big break on the next play as Dan Blackwell appeared to be trapped on the sidelines but broke free as Simmons and Chick got their feet tangled and fell to the ground as Blackwell sped by on his way to the Mustang goal 79 yards away.

FOUR SPECIALIST WILL ATTEND TOUR

Four specialists from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, two from Texas A&M University and two from the Lubbock Texas A & M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center, will be in Wheeler County Oct. 16. They'll be featured speakers at the twelfth annual Wheeler County Crops and Livestock Tour Day beginning at 9:00 a. m. at the Kelton School and ending with a free barbecue for Wheeler County farmers and businessmen at 1:00 p. m.

One of the specialists is Fred Elliott, Cotton Work Specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. He is a keen student of cotton and makes it his business to keep up-to-date on changes which affect the industry. He earned statewide recognition for his work as a 4-H club member. Elliott has been an employee of Texas A&M for 30 years serving as County Agent in Guadalupe, Wilson and Gonzales Counties until he assumed his present position as cotton specialist in February of 1946. His contributions to Texas Agriculture have been made primarily through the seven-step cotton program initiated by the Extension Service in 1946. In that year, the average lint

yield per acre in Texas was 134 pounds; it was 348 pounds in 1961 and an estimated 408 pounds in 1965.

Another specialist who will talk on the tour is Al Novosad. He is a native of Brazos County; a graduate of Stephen F. Austin High School, Bryan and holds two degrees from Texas A&M University - BS and MS - in agronomy with a minor in plant pathology and physiology.

He is a veteran of the US Air Force - 1944-46, with service in the Pacific. He served as assistant county agricultural agent in Smith County from 1947-48 and as county agricultural agent of Bowie County from 1948-51. Novosad farmed for one year in Crosby Co.

He returned to Texas A&M University in 1953 for graduate study and became a member of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station's Foundation Seed Division in 1954. He served as manager of the Station's Foundation seedstock operation.

A pasture specialist since 1963, Novosad works closely with Texas county agents on educational programs dealing with pasture and turf improvement and with organizations, individuals and groups interested in this field of work.

Novosad is a member of the American Society of Agronomy. He is married to the former Martha Mae Freeman of Crosbyton and they have a daughter and a son.

One of the specialists who will speak on maize varieties on the Dean Tipps farm near Briscoe is Dr. Robert B. Metzger who was named area agronomist with headquarters at Lubbock, March 16, 1967. The area includes the High and Rolling Plains.

Metzger works closely with the county agricultural agents of the area on educational programs dealing with the important agronomic crops and is responsible for providing training needed to keep them up to date on subject matter. He also assists the agents with result demonstration programs and works with other specialists in the area on short courses and other teaching and training aids.

An area agronomist, he works closely with research personnel at the South Plains Research and Extension Center at Lubbock and other research stations in the area.

Metzger is a native of Brazos County and was an outstanding 4-H and FFA mem-

ber during his youth. He holds B.S. and M. S. degrees from Texas A&M University in agronomy and the Ph.D. from Iowa State University in seed technology.

He served in the US Navy from 1948-52 with service in the Pacific. He was employed by the Texas Seed Foundation Section at A&M and later as production manager for a commercial seed concern before enrolling at Iowa State.

Sharing the spotlight with Metzger on the Milo variety trial tour stop will be Dr. Frank Petr. On January 1, 1968 he became area agronomist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service with headquarters in Amarillo.

In making the announcement, Extension Director John E. Hutchison, said because of the increasing demands for assistance on the area staff at Lubbock, much of it from the Panhandle section, the new position was created to place a capable agronomist within the district.

Petr works closely with the county agents of the district on educational programs dealing with the important agronomic crops of the area and will be responsible for providing the training needed to keep them up to date on subject matter. He also assists the agents with their result demonstration programs and other area specialists and research personnel with current and planned programs.

The specialist is a native of Montana and grew up on a dryland wheat farm. He was an outstanding FFA member during his youth and was awarded the State Farmer degree. He holds both BS and MS degrees from Montana State University in Agronomy and the Ph.D. degree from Iowa State University with a major in crop breeding and minors in genetics and plant pathology.

He served in the US Army during World War II with two years of service in Europe. He and Mrs. Petr are the parents of three children and he is a member of the American Society of Agronomy and Sigma Xi.

A coffee break at the Smith farm will be sponsored by the Production Credit Association office in Wheeler.

On the Dean Tipps farm near Briscoe, twenty varieties of milo will be visited. Dr. Frank Petr and Dr. Bob Metzger, area agronomists for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will narrate this stop.

Demonstration plots were planted and set up by Duane Scott, Farm Demonstration assistant from Wellington. Other sponsors of the tour include: the Wheeler County Program Building Committee, the Farmers Home Administration, the Wheeler Soil and Water Conservation District, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, the ASCS office and the Kelton, Wheeler and Shamrock schools.

County Agricultural Agent, Max W. Hatter said, "this year's tour should be of real interest to those farmers and ranchers who wish to look at new grasses and are thinking about improving some old shinnery country. In addition, he said that specialists from the experiment stations and from Texas A&M would be available to answer individual questions."

John Daberry of Kelton is the president of the Wheeler County Program Building Committee. He pointed out that this year's tour is going to be interesting to the farmer who is improving or thinking about improving some land.
