Beef Cattle Co., Inc. is constructing a new 15,000 head feedlot to serve Wheeler County and the Eastern Panhandle. The construction is estimated to cost about \$450,000 and is located three miles Northwest of Wheeler on Highway 152. This will be a fully automated lot equipt to handle all classes of cattle.

The location for this lot has many advantages. The lot is being constructed on a high sandhill ridge. This will give both excellent drainage as well as good ventilation. The deep sand in this area will eliminate much of the mud problem and the variable levels in the pen areas will give better air circulation, this will make a more comfortable condition for the cattle. The plans call for paved feed allies and a flow through water system. In a flow through water system, the water continuously flowe through the water troughs. This helps prevent freezing of water facilities.

Beef Cattle Co. Inc. developed a complete conservation plan with the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District. Technical assistance, provided by the Soil Conservatio Y Service, includes retention of all drainage, prevention of erosion, and pollution control. Runoff water from the feedlots will be diverted by a diversion terrace into a waterway, which will carry the water into a large pond. The pond is designed to hold all runoff water. Grass will be established on the remaining land for erosion
