MUSTANGS WIN HOMECOMING TILT 24-12

Shocked by fired up Canadian, the Wheeler Mustangs fought back from an early deficit and went on to win their final non-district game 24-12. The win gave the Mustangs a 3-2 record going into the district race which gets started next Friday against Silverton.

The visiting Wildcats were quick to put a big scare into the Mustangs as they scored on their second play but fortunately, for the Mustangs, the 84 yard run was called back and a clipping fine was assessed the Wildcats. Ricky Berry broke through the center of the Mustang forward wall and no one touched him but an official spotted the clip at the Mustang 41.

The aroused Wildcats were not to be denied on their next possession and when the first quarter ended, the Wildcats had a 6-0 lead and the Mustangs had yet to make a first down.

Harold Pack was the big gun in the Wildcats 86 yard march to paydirt as he got the Wildcats out of a deep hole with a 16 yard scamper to the Canadian 23. Just three plays later, Pack found clear sailing around the Wheeler right end and the foot race was on with Jimmie Cole in hot pursuit. Finally catching Pack at the Mustang 10, Cole was able to trip him up at the Wheeler 6. Three plays were needed to get the TD and Berry reminded it in from the 1. Steve Simmons broke through to down the ball carrier shy of the end zone on the extra point try.

On the first play of the second period, Danny Stone punted into the strong north breeze and the ball settled only four yards upfield and the Mustangs had good field possession at the Wildcat 40. The Mustangs finally got their offense in gear and marched to the tying touchdown in eight plays with Roy Don Chick and Dave Britt lugging the leather. Chick skirted his left end for the final ten yards. The host Mustangs were guilty of interlocking on the extra point kick and then failed to make the two pointer after the penalty to leave the game deadlocked.

Wheeler pounced on a Wildcat fumble at the Canadian 17 to get their next scoring jaunt launched. Chick got a first down as he pounded off his left tackle on successive carries to the Wildcat 7. Rodney Weatherly used the quarterback keeper for four more. After Chick was held to no gain, Dave Britt slammed through right guard and bounced into the end zone for the Mustangs go ahead touch-

down with 3:05 remaining in the half. Chick took a Pitch-out around his right end for the two points. Steve Carter fumbled the ensuing kickoff at his 10 and

pigskin bounded into the end zone. Carter picked the ball up but chose to hesitate and Steve Simmons downed him and the Mustangs had another two points on the safety.

Wheeler marched goalward from their 23 early in the third period and it looked like the knockout punch was on the way. Britt and Chick "Cont'd Page 3"

Mustangs Face Silverton Fri.

With the five non-district games under their belt and sporting a 3-2 record, the Mustangs take their first step this Friday night in defending their district crown.

The Silverton Owls will furnish the opposition in the 7:30 contest and the Mustangs face no easy task in this first district game.

The Owls, and few fans have forgotten, gave the Mustangs one of their hardest games of the season last year and reports have it that the Owls will consider their season a success if they can defeat the Mustangs. The Mustangs defeated the Owls last year and it was the stepping stone for their championship.

Silverton will bring an experienced club to Wheeler with a lot of size and toughness. The Owls are led by their two big running backs, Bill Strange 190 lb. halfback, and Marvin Self, a 200 lb. fullback. These two fine runners are given running room by a big line paced by Thurman May and Max Weaver, senior tackles.

The Mustangs defense will be put to perhaps their toughest test Friday night as the Owls have moved the ball well against all foes although they have only one win to their credit. The Owls punctured the Groom defense for 400 yards rushing but were stopped by costly fumbles.

Wheeler came out of the Canadian game without new injuries and should be in the best shape they have been for several games.

B-Team Wins, Face Bonham

The Wheeler B Team rode the flying heels of Dale Stevens to their first win of the year last week as they put down the Childress Bobcat freshman team 24-22.

It was a comeback victory for the B Team and they put the game on ice with just over 4 minutes to play in the contest.

The B Team rushed the ball 58 times and Dale Stevens was the youngster lugging the pigskin on 44 of those carries.

Childress stormed to a 14-0 lead in the first quarter but the B Team rallied for two touchdowns in the second period but gained little as the Bobcats scored their final TD with 4 seconds to play in the half.

Wheeler marched 76 yards in 13 plays after the Bobcats second touchdown and Gary Fischer sneaked over from the 1.

The big play in the drive was a 20 yard run by Stevens after faking a punt on fourth down.

Stevens climaxed a 56 yard drive in the second period as he rammed it in from 4 yards out. A 36 yard pass play from Stevens to Jerry Beatty put the ball at the Bobcat 20.

Childress gambled on fourth down at their 42 following the second half kickoff and lost and the Mustangs took advantage and drove for their third TD. Fischer passed to Beatty for the score and the play covered 19 yards.

The Bobcats came right back but their drive bogged down at the Wheeler 21 as the fourth quarter opened. The B Team literally crammed the ball down the Bobcats on their final 79

Beef Cattle Co., Inc. is constructing a new 15,000 head feedlot to serve Wheeler County and the Eastern Panhandle. The construction is estimated to cost about \$450,000 and is located three miles Northwest of Wheeler on Highway 152. This will be a fully automated lot equip to handle all classes of cattle.

The location for this lot has many advantages. The lot is being constructed on a high sandhill ridge. This will give both excellent drainage as well as good ventilation. The deep sand in this area will eliminate much of the mud problem and the variable levels in the pen areas will give better air circulation, this will make a more comfortable condition for the cattle. The plans call for paved feed allies and a flow through water system. In a flow through water system, the water continuously flows through the water troughs. This helps prevent freezing of water facilities.

Beef Cattle Co., Inc. developed a complete conservation plan with the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District. Technical assistance, provided by the Soil Conservation Service, includes retention of all drainage, prevention of erosion, and pollution control. Runoff water from the feedlots will be diverted by a diversion terrace into a waterway, which will carry the water into a large pond. The pond is designed to hold all runoff water. Grass will be established on the remaining land for erosion control and grazing.

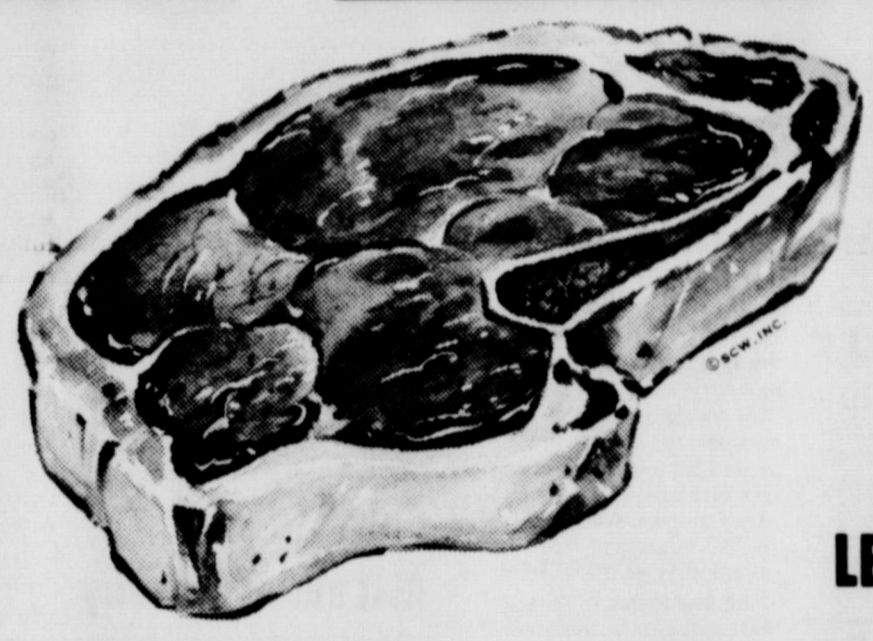

Across the Fence

We feel we have an interesting program lines up for the Annual Wheeler County Farm Tour next Thursday, Oct. 16. The tour will begin at 9:00 a. m. at the Kelton school and the barbecue will be at 12:30 at Kelton The Barbecue and tour usually give businessmen an opportunity to meet their customers who have farming and ranching interests. We know that the Wheeler and Shamrock Chamber of Commerce groups who are sponsoring the barbecue, along with the Wheeler County Farm Bureau would encourage this.

Of course, our hope is that we'll be able to provide farmers and ranchers with an idea or two on the tour. A couple of our tour stops concern grassland farming. If you feel as I do, that we're sitting on the top of a potential gold mine when it comes to growing grass, you'll not want to miss the tour this year.

We had the opportunity of seeing Virgil Simmon's new hay stacker at work in Fred Water's Alfalfa field last week. This new machine is attracting about as much attention as the self-propelled combines when they first came out. As we understand it, the feedlot is paying \$18. a ton for alfalfa in the field. Virgil then cuts and swaths the hay and stacks it with his hay stacker in a farmer's field. The feedlot doesn't pay for the hay until it is picked up to be ground but does leave a \$10 per acre deposit when the hay is stacked. If you haven't had a chance to see 5-7 tons of stacked hay in a trailer without a string around it, go out and see Virgil Simmon's rig in operation.

A lot of stocker cattle have been moving in the county recently. The "up and growing" wheat pastures should provide them a good start. Fantastic profits in many cases of \$70 to \$100 per head have most folks optimistic about the present prospects. We see stocker projects as profitable undertakings in many instances; but on the other hand, it may be a sad experience. A cattle trader with many years experience behind him who works closely with us says that "if any money were to be made on stocker cattle it had to be made when they were bought because an individual operator had little control over what he got when he was ready to sell."

We see that there is an excellent opportunity for the alert manager to increase his income from stocker operations provided he is willing to study the cattle business and build on a sound, well planned program; however, "impulse" cattler operations are
