SILVERTON DUMPED BY MUSTANGS

Silvertown Owls became the first district victim of the Wheeler Mustangs last night on a cold, windy night at Field and took an embarrassing home loss.

yards on the ground and another seven yards was added on a scoring toss from Chick to Steve Simmons in the second quarter.
Holding the Owls at their own 28 midway of the opening quarter, the Mustangs faced the strong south wind for the third time and this must have been a charm for the locals as Roy Don Chick spun off a tackler at the Wheeler 30 and left another grabbing air as he rambled 70 yards to paydirt. Choosing to run instead of kick into the wind, the Mustangs made the right choice as Chick got

the two points at right tackle. The Mustang defense, led by Gail Ledbetter and Gary Davis continually blunted the Owl offense and forced a punt after the Mustangs first touchdown.
Taking over at their 21, the Mustangs started the second quarter as if they were going to blow the Owls out of the park but the red flag had something to do with this.
Using the slants at tackle by Chick and traps up the middle with Britt, the Mustangs ground out 5 first downs to the Silvertown 6.
Dave Britt garnered three yards but on second down the Mustangs were guilty of being in motion and drew a five yard fine back to the 8. Offsides was detected on the next play and the Mustangs found themselves back on the 13 with goal to go. Chick got 2 and then the Owls deciphered the Mustang attack and threw Jimmy Cole for a six yard loss on a reverse at left end.

Keith Wood came on to boot a 25 yard field goal on fourth down to up the Mustang margin to 11-0.
The Owls were definitely down at this point and the Mustangs were quick to put more points which were to be their last, on the board.
Silvertown had to kick into the wind and the Mustangs had their best field position of the night at the Wheeler 48. The Mustangs moved smartly to the Owl 7 with no flags on this trip and the payoff play came on a halfback pass from Chick to Simmons who was one of two Mustangs wide open in the end zone.
Wheeler went for the one pointer and Keith Wood's toe was true and the Mustangs had their biggest margin of the game, 18-0 with 57 seconds remaining in the first half.
Chick intercepted an Owl pass at the Silvertown 34 right after the Mustang kickoff but a 15 yard clipping fine erased what chance there was of picking up another TD before

the halftime break.
The Owls came out after the intermission with new determination and took the kickoff and drove for their only score. Bill Strange made the big play for Silvertown in the drive as he got off a 31 yard gainer to the Mustang 36.
Fourth and seven faced the Owls at the Wheeler 14 but the Owls called the right number and scored on a pass from Trent Brown to Roger Younger. The run failed for the two points.
Early in the fourth quarter, the Owls made one more serious threat but the Mustangs

put up a stone wall and stopped the drive at the six yard line as Carroll Watson gathered in an Owl fumble.
The Mustangs had their last good drive of the game snuffed out by three five yard penalties when the Mustangs had a first down at the Owl 27.
A field goal try from the 32 fell short and just 54 seconds remained until the Mustangs had the victory.

In going over their win over Silvertown, Coach Cottrell said, "Although we moved the ball well, those penalties hurt us on several drives and we have been working real hard this week to overcome those mistakes." "We had several boys that played outstanding games for us. Steve Simmons, Gail Ledbetter and Gary Davis, all played real good games for us on defense and Dave Britt and Roy Don Chick did a good job of running the football. Although he didn't carry the ball much, Jimmy Cole ran well." "Gametime for the Tiger clash is 7:30 and all Mustang fans are urged to go to McLean and help the Mustangs "Get A Tiger."

One hundred and seventy people were served barbecue courtesy of the Wheeler and Shamrock Chamber of Commerce and the Wheeler County Farm Bureau. All of our sponsors, along with Dwane Scott, our farm demonstration assistant deserve a great deal of the credit for having a successful tour. This year, our theme was "Grasses." Next year, our theme will be "Livestock." In a few days we will begin making plans for next year's tour through the various subcommittees of our county program committees.

Correction: I have enjoyed writing this weekly column over the past three years. We take pride in passing on ideas in agriculture and pride in ourselves in reporting what we believe to be accurate information in hopes that an improved practice will be adopted that might result in increased profits for farmers, ranchers and homeowners. Every now and then we acknowledge our ability to misreport an item. A few weeks ago, we reported an item about Virgil Simmons' new hay stacker. In that article we reported that the alfalfa was bringing from \$17.50 to \$18 a ton and that it was our understanding that the farmer would be paid when the alfalfa was ground and carried to the feedlot. We understand this is still the way the hay will be handled. However, the price paid per ton will depend on the quality of hay varying with the amount of weeds and etc. in the hay. Also we reported erroneously that a small deposit per acre would be left with the farmer until the hay was picked up. This is not the case. We are sorry that we misinterpreted the deposit information and we hope Mr. Simmons has not been inconvenienced too much.
We had the opportunity last week to see Bed Eads sow and pig operation at Mobeetie. Ben has really got some healthy pigs on the ground now. Ben's daughter Tammy, is planning to feed a barrow for the Wheeler County pig show.

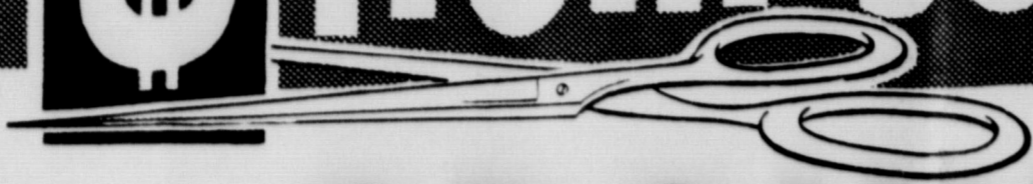

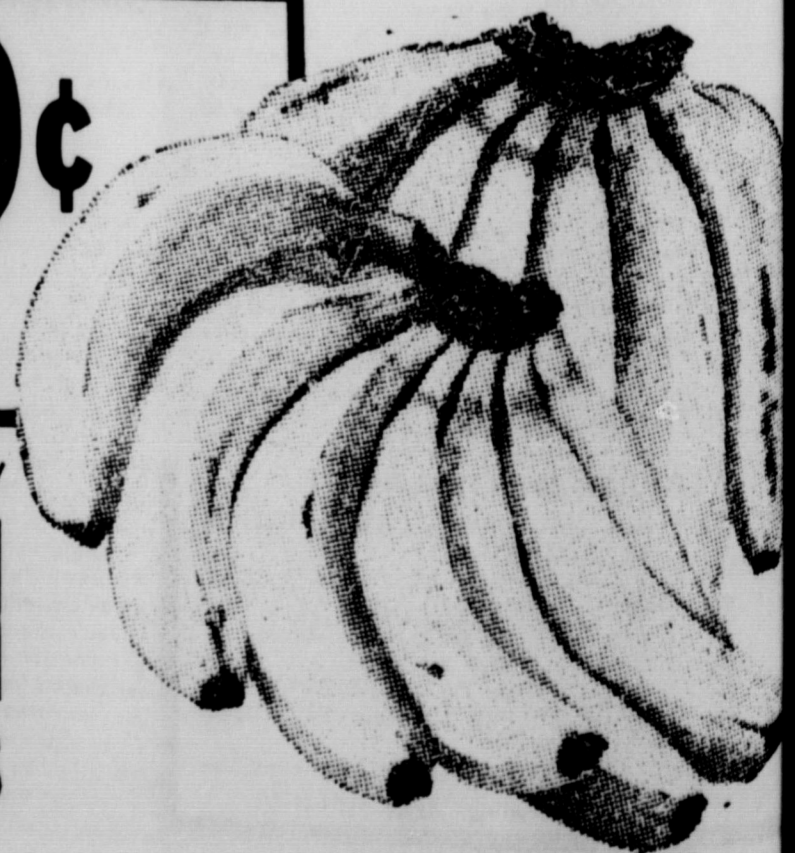

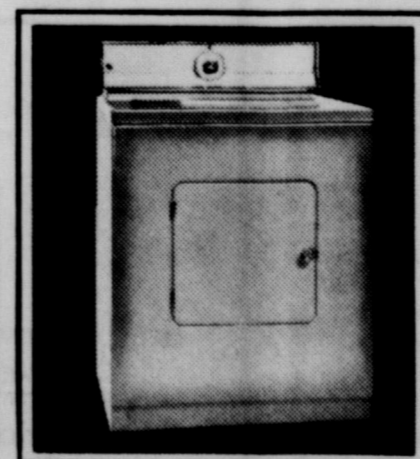

Across the Fence

Prussic Acid Poisoning in Livestock: The recent freeze over much of the county brought an abrupt halt to cotton production and may prove detrimental to livestock producers if certain precautions are not followed.

Caution should be exercised when grazing livestock on Johnsongrass, Sudan, Sorghum-Sudan hybrids, Grain Sorghum and Forage Sorghum because of Prussic Acid Poisoning.

When the growth of any type of sorghum is slowed or stopped by freezing temperatures or drought stress, certain chemical changes occur in the plant and sometimes a high prussic acid content develops, especially in young growth. An animal that feeds on such plant material can be poisoned and can die in a very short time. Whether or not an animal can be saved depends on how soon a veterinarian can get to it.

Freeze damaged sorghum plants should not be grazed until they are as dry as food quality hay or until at least three to four days after the freeze, a week delay is preferable. But keep in mind that new sucker growth appearing after the initial freeze will also be high in prussic acid.

Death results from suffocation, since the poison prevents the exchange of oxygen from the blood to the tissue. We understand that a good way to check grazing safety is to turn one or two animals into a suspect field and watch them for a day or two. Be sure water is available to them or the symptoms may be delayed. If poisoning is suspected, we advise consulting your local veterinarian at once. However, good grazing management is the best preventive against animal losses from prussic acid poisoning.
