CLARENDON ROARS PAST MUSTANGS 42-22

It was a case of just too much Clarendon for the Wheeler Mustangs to handle and when it was all over, the Bronchos had sewed up the district crown with a resounding 42-22 win over the Wheeler Mustangs before a capacity crowd at Clarendon last Friday.

Clarendon set the tune for the ball game early and with the aid of two fumble recoveries in the third period - which they turned into two quick touchdowns - put the game out of reach for the gallant but outmanned Mustangs.

Even though down by a 35-8 count early in the second half the Mustangs didn't quit and fought back with determination shown by few clubs that had the odds against them as did the Mustangs.

The speed and quickness of the Clarendon team, notably Jim Moore, the Broncho quarterback, was the big difference in the two clubs.

Clarendon took the opening kickoff and promptly drove 55 yards to paydirt. With the Mustangs geared to stop Moore, the Bronchos used Charles Louis on six of the plays and the big tailback rammed over from one yard out. Scotty Lindley kicked the extra point and only 3:14 had elapsed.

Wheeler could get nothing going their first possession and Dave Britt put the Bronchos back to their 15 with a 38 yard boot.

Louis got the call a couple of times and picked up 20 yards out to the 35. Moore sprinted out to his left and by-passed one Mustang defender as he turned the corner. Dodging several more would be tacklers, Moore finally broke into the clear and it was no race then into the end zone as he cleared the 65 yards for the Bronchos second TD.

Half of the first period remained as Lindley toed his second point through the uprights.

Jimmy Cole stopped another threat by the Bronchos when he intercepted a pass at the Mustang 3 yard line on the last play of the first quarter.

The Bronchos moved ahead by 21 points as time was fast running out in the first half as Louis broke free from a couple of Mustang defenders at the 30 and continued on to paydirt to climax a 44 yard run. Lindley kicked good with just 2:18 to play.

Steve Simmons returned the kickoff to the Mustang 41 and from there the Mustangs launched a 59 yard drive for their first touchdown that was a race against the clock. Using three of their timeouts, the Mustangs moved to the Broncho 20 for a first down with 17 seconds to play. The longest play on the drive was a 14 yard pass completion from Rodney Weatherly to Steve Simmons.

The Mustangs drew a 15

yard fine for illegal use of hands back to the 35 and it looked as if this threat was done, but no one had told the visitors from Wheeler.

Weatherly hit Dale Stevens, fleet freshman wingback, with a sideline pass to stop the clock with 0:11 showing and the pigskin on the Clarendon 26.

Stevens made a miraculous catch of his second pass on the next play and dashed into the end zone to put the

Mustangs on the board with just 3 seconds remaining. Rodney Weatherly got the two pointer and the Mustangs had some new life.

If scoring before the half gave the Mustangs and their partisans hope, it was quickly put down the drain in the third period as the Bronchos turned two Mustang fumbles into their fourth and fifth touchdowns.

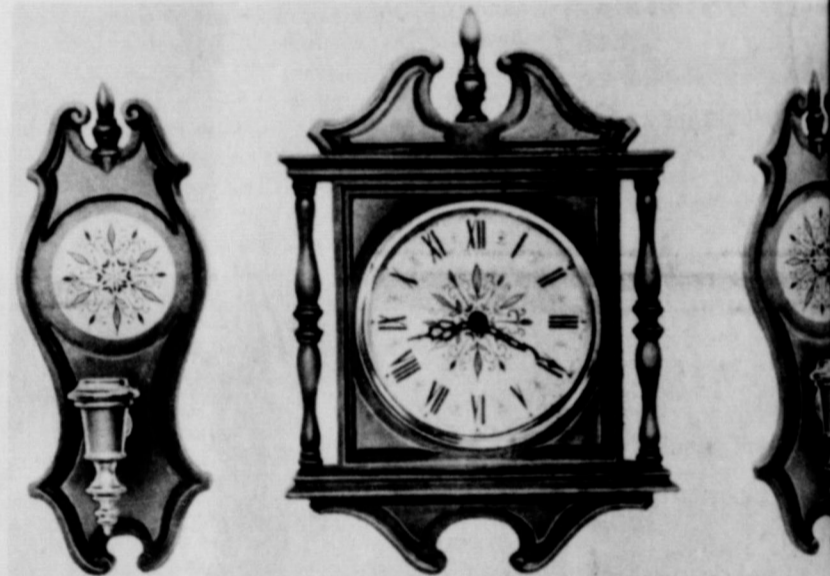

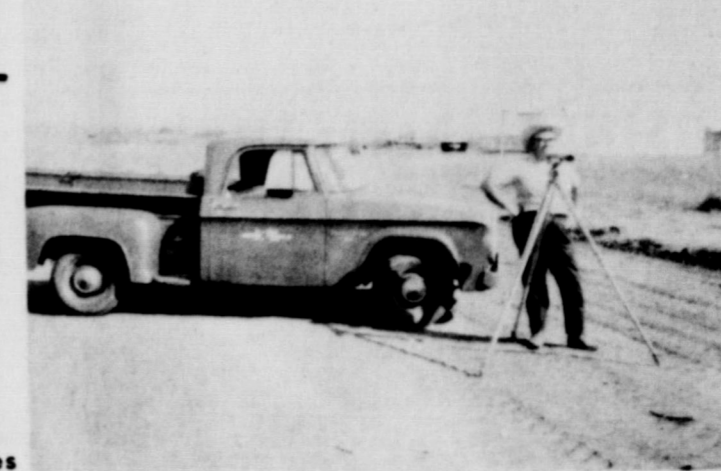
BRISCOE School News
