## MUSTANGS TROUNCE HAPPY

### TEAM EDGES ROOM THURS.

Wheeler B Team scored in the first quarter Thursday night and then a gallant goalline stand kept the Mustangs from eking out a 14-9 victory over the visiting B Team.

Winning, the B Team set their season record of 3-0 and also their record to date at 3-0 and 3 losses.

It is not known whether the Mustangs will play their next game with Clarendon on Friday or Saturday.

Following the game, the Mustangs had a fumble recovery by Sammie at the Groom 18 on the play after the offense gave the Mustangs a great chance but fumbled a five yard penalty. The Mustangs held the Mustangs, Groom led the Mustangs again. He pounced on it as a second recovery, this time at the Groom 43. Wheeler didn't waste this opportunity and Gary Fischer got a quarter point on a quarter play at left guard. Wheeler just needed four plays the second time they had the ball to get their initial touchdown. Taking over at their 37, the Mustangs sent Dave Britt into the line on a couple of carries for 9 yards and then Rodney Weatherly fooled everyone as he kept around his left end for 20 yards.

Then Weatherly hit Roy Don Chick for a TD pass with the play covering 31 yards. Keith Wood kicked the first of his seven conversion kicks and the Mustangs led 7-0.

A short punt of just five yards set up the Mustangs next score and they had only 48 yards to travel for this one. Three plays after taking over, Roy Don Chick broke off his left tackle and as Steve Simmons cleared the last defender to the ground, he raced 39 yards to paydirt. Keith Woods kick was again high and true.

Happy came right back and scored on a 57 yard march midway of the second period with Ruben Garcia doing most of the damage. A questionable pass interference call against Jimmy Cole added the Cowboy drive as Charles House got the touchdown with a 9 yard drive around the Mustangs left end.

Another pass interference call on the try for two points gave the Cowboys a shot from the one yard line but the run was short and the Cowboys had completed their scoring until the final period. Carroll Watson came close to doing what all linemen dream of, scoring a touchdown, but didn't get the job done as he was downed on the Happy 14 after intercepting a pass at the Cowboy 45.

Jimmy Cole got his first touchdown four plays later when he broke free from one yard out on the wingback reverse. Woods toe was true for the third time and the halftime break slowed the Mustang machine down.

Passing, which the Mustangs haven't had the most proficiency in this year, got the next two touchdowns for the Mustangs.

A ten play, 72 yard drive was climaxed with Chick passing 14 yards to Cole

and there was still 6:30 to play in the third quarter as the Mustangs increased their lead to 28-6 when Wood's kick was good.

Happy couldn't get anywhere after the kickoff and quick kicked on third down to the Mustang 39. Two passes were thrown in this 61 yard drive and both were complete from Weatherly to Steve Simmons with the last being for 14 yards and a touchdown. The unerring toe of Woods boosted the Mustangs margin to 35-6 and fans began to think of next week.

It seemed as if the Mustangs could do nothing but right on offense as the game wore on. Two plays deep in the final stanza, the Mustangs got the ball at their 34 following a punt.

On the first play from scrimmage at the 34, Dave Britt broke just off his left guard and found himself running loose at the midfield stripe with one Cowboy in hot pursuit. Britt outdistanced the Happy defender as he made a last effort to down him at the 5 and went into the end zone with a 66 yard run. Britt had 188 yards to lead Mustang rushers. Roy Chick had 107 and Rodney Weatherly and Jimmy Cole added 62 and 51 respectively.

Wood kicked his sixth point of the night and the Mustangs now led by 42-6.

The Mustang defense was a little slack in the ensuing Cowboy drive and the visitors were able to get their second score as House went over from one yard out on fourth down. The Mustangs had held on three downs from the three but their defense broke down on this final effort by House.

Five plays after the kickoff following the touchdown by House, the Mustangs had another TD and Jimmy Cole got it with a 14 yard burst through left tackle. A 25 yard pass play from Weatherly to Simmons put the ball on the Cowboy 14.

For the first time in the game, Keith Wood was off in his kick and the Mustangs failed to make a seven out of the six.

The Happy Cowboys started throwing passes in a desperate effort to get more points but the Mustangs were having none of it. Simmons broke up one effort and then Robert Brickey slammed Steve Cole to the turf for a three yard loss as he was attempting to get the ball away. Facing fourth down, the Cowboys chose to punt but Bill Tucker put the big rush on and downed Mark Hargrave at the Happy 11.

Jimmy Cole scored on the first play from the 11 and with Keith Wood getting back on the beam, the Mustangs had their 55 point total.

Charles House fielded the kickoff on the dead run and behind several good blocks just ran right up the middle for 75 yards and a score. The run was no good and the scoreboard had its final reading.

An intercepted pass by Cole gave the Mustangs one last chance at the Happy 29. A bizarre ending for the game was started with a 15 yard penalty against Happy that moved the ball to the Cowboy 15. A field goal try by Wood was short as time

ran out but another intransigent was spotted against Happy. Half the distance was stepped off and the Mustangs went for another field goal but again it was short.

Once more Happy was guilty of wrong doing and drew a fine for offsidess and gave the Mustangs another shot at it from the 2 yard line. The Mustangs chose to go for six but the effort was stopped at the line of scrimmage and the mismatch was over.

Twelve months have passed since the last encounter but it all adds up to the same thing, Wheeler's Mustangs and Clarendon's Bronchos are staring each other in the face with the district crown up for grabs.

All the preparations and hopes of both clubs will be put on the firing line at 7:30 Friday night in Clarendon and standing room space will probably be scarce.

Few people ever thought that the young Mustangs would come this far with an opportunity to battle it out for the championship, but here they are and they plan to give it all that they have.

Clarendon is once more ranked high in the state in Class A, this week they are ranked no. 6, and will put one of the most explosive teams in the state up against the Mustangs.

The Bronchos have speed to burn and are led by two all state candidates in the backfield in quarterback, Jim Moore, a 160 lb. speedster who has run the 100 in 9.8 and Charles Louis, a 10 flat 164 lb. tailback. Bennie Reese and Ike O'Neal round out the all senior Broncho backfield. In fact, the Bronchos will start ten seniors on their offensive team.

The Mustangs will pen what hopes they have on corraling the Broncho speedsters and being able to move the ball against the Clarendon defense.

Spirit is high on the Mustang team and there is nothing they would rather do

than spoil the Clarendon hopes for the second straight year and stranger things have happened.

"It is going to be real contest," is about all Coach Cottrell would say about the upcoming battle. "We have been looking forward to this game and we know that Clarendon has."

"We were real pleased in the offensive play of the boys against Happy but we were a little weak at times in our defensive play and broke down on some assignments," Coach Bateman reported at the weekly quarterback club meeting.

Gary Davis had another real good offensive game and Darrell Hanks showed up real well. Our entire backfield led by Dave Britt and Roy Don Chick had good games and Noel Glazner had another top effort defensively," Coach Bateman added.

Wheeler and Clarendon will bring identical 3-0 district records into this week's game but the Bronchos are undefeated in eight contests and have only been extended by one team and that was the Stinnett Rattlers who they blew off the field in the last three minutes of play.

Each team will have one more contest in district play after this week, but all of the marbles are up for grabs in this one for the Mustangs and Bronchos.

This is the game of the year for the Mustangs and every fan is urged to go to Clarendon and back the Wheeler Mustangs.

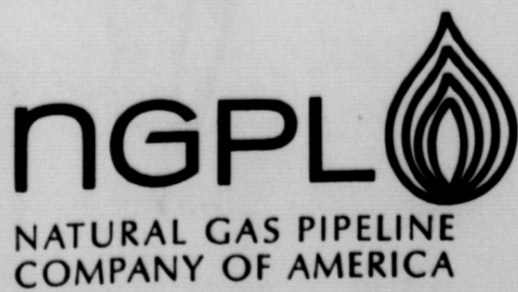
## Natural gas storehouse

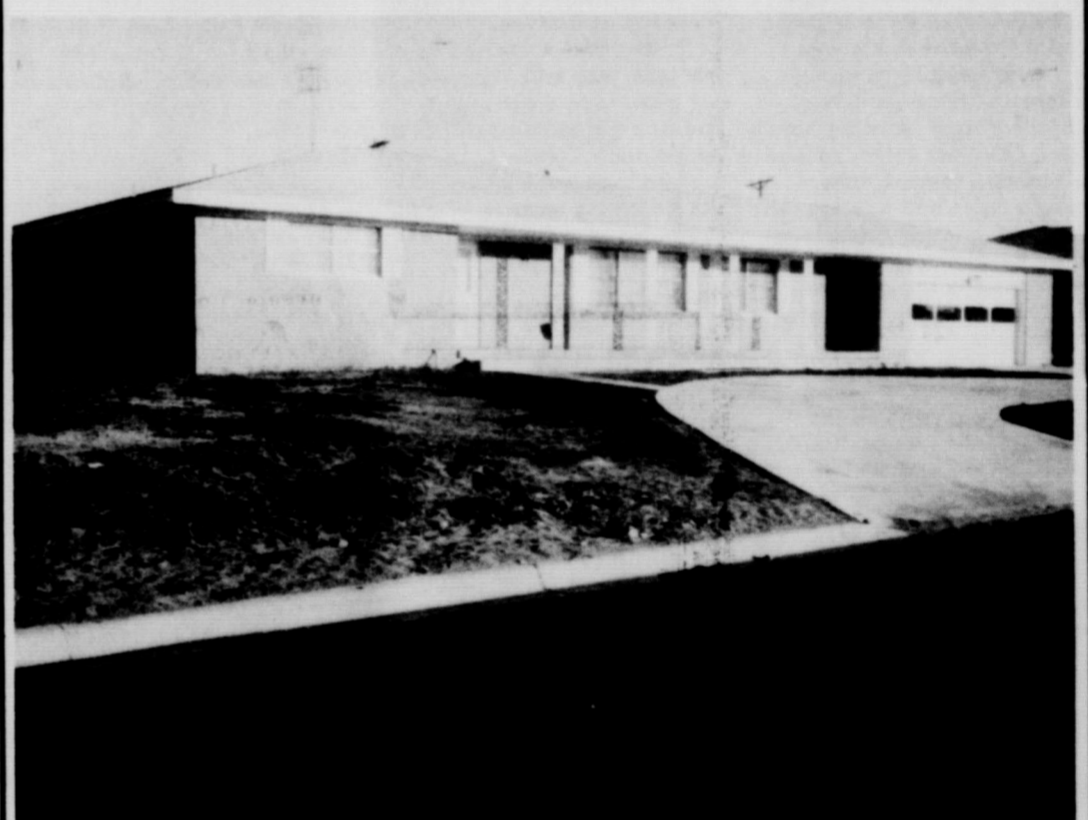
We now operate six underground gas storage facilities; two more are being developed. And we rely on our Storage Foremen to make sure pure natural gas is available on demand.
