There might have been some doubt as to how seriously the Wheeler Mustangs were taking the Happy Cowboys with the big battle with Clarendon just a week away, but these doubt were quickly erased as the Mustangs put on their best offensive showing of the year

The Mustangs led by only 7-0 at the first quarter but got stronger as the game progressed and the rout was on for good in the third period when Wheeler built up a 35-6

Jimmye Cole paced the Mustang point getters as he crossed into the end zone four times, three times running and once on the receiving end of a 14 yard toss from Roy Don Chick.

Not only did the Mustangs get their highest point total of the year but also had their most productive game in yardage as they amassed 503 yards total with 407 of that coming on the ground.

Wheeler just needed four plays the second time they had the ball to get their initial touchdown. Taking over at their 37, the Mustangs sent Dave Britt into the line on a couple of carries for 9 yards and then Rodney Weatherly fooled everyone as he kept around his left end for 25 yards.

Then Weatherly hit Roy Don Chick for a TD pass with third time at the Groomthe play covering 31 yards. line with 3:21 still to Keith Wood kicked the first of his seven conversion kicks and the Mustanas led 7-0

Twelve months have passed since the last encounter but it all adds up to the same year and stranger things thing, Wheeler's Mustangs and Clarendon's Bronchos are staring each other in the face with the district crown p for grabs.

All the preparations and hopes of both clubs will be put on the firing line at 7:30 Friday night in Clarendon and standing room space will probably be scarce.

Few people ever thought that the young Mustangs would come this far with an opportunity to battle it out for the championship, but here they are and they plan to give it all that they have.

Clarendon is once more ranked high in the state in Class A, this week they are ranked no. 6, and will put one of the most explosive teams in the state up against

the Mustangs.
The Bronchos have speed to burn and are led by two all state candidates in the backfield in quarterback, Jim Moore, a 160 lb. speedster who has run the 100 in 9.8 and Charles Louis, a 10 flat 164 lb. tailback. Bennie Reese and Ike O'Neal round out the all senior Broncho backfield. In fact, the Bronchas will start ten seniors

The Mustangs will pen what hopes they have on corraling the Broncho speedsters and being able to move the ball against the Clarendon defense.

Wheeler and Clarendon will bring identical 3-0 district records into this week's game but the Bronchos are undefeated in eight contests and have only been extended by one team and that was the Stinnett Rattlers who they blew off the field in the last three minutes of play.

Each team will have one more contest in district play after this week, but all of the marbles are up for grabs in this one for the Mustangs and Bronchos.

This is the game of the year for the Mustangs and every fan is urged to go to Clarendon and back the Wheeler Mustangs.

### **DPS News**

On September 1, 1969, the Texas Motor Vehicle Inspection Program began a year around inspection schedule, announced Captain Alan Johnson, Service Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety for this

Briefly, Captain Johnson listed the changes: 1. Inspections go on monthly, year-around schedule 2. Sticker location changed to left side of windshield 3. Number of the inspection month placed on sticker 4. Inspection of exhaust sys-

5. Inspection of emission system

6. Inspection fee \$2.00 Instead of the usual April 15 deadline, inspections will come due one year after the current month of inspection. This will tend to take all the registered vehicles in Texas and prorate them euqa-Ily among the twelve calendar calendar months to be inspected. This will establish an anniversary month for each vehicle to be inspected and prevent the log-jam of over six million registered vehicles to be inspected at one time.

The new inspection sticker will be placed inside of the lower left-hand side of the windshield instead of the usual right side of the windshield. The number of the current month of inspection will appear on the sticker. For example, those issued in September will have the num er 9 on them, October the number 10 and so on. The color of the sticker will change each calendar year.

Two items have been added to the inspection list -the exhaust system and the exhaust smission system. A car must have a muffler and it must be free from leaks. All cars manufactured in 1968 or later coming from the factory equipped with the exhaust smission system (commonly known as the smog device) still must have the device in working order.

The exhaust smission system will be checked to see that it has not been removed or disconnected. This will also apply to foreign cars. However, most of them now sold in this country are equipped with the smog device before they are sold.

Vehicle owners are now urged to start having their vehicles inspected. The new inspection fee is \$2.00.
