Carla Ridgway, the Mobeetie FFA Sweetheart won third place at the Top O Texas District Sweetheart contest.

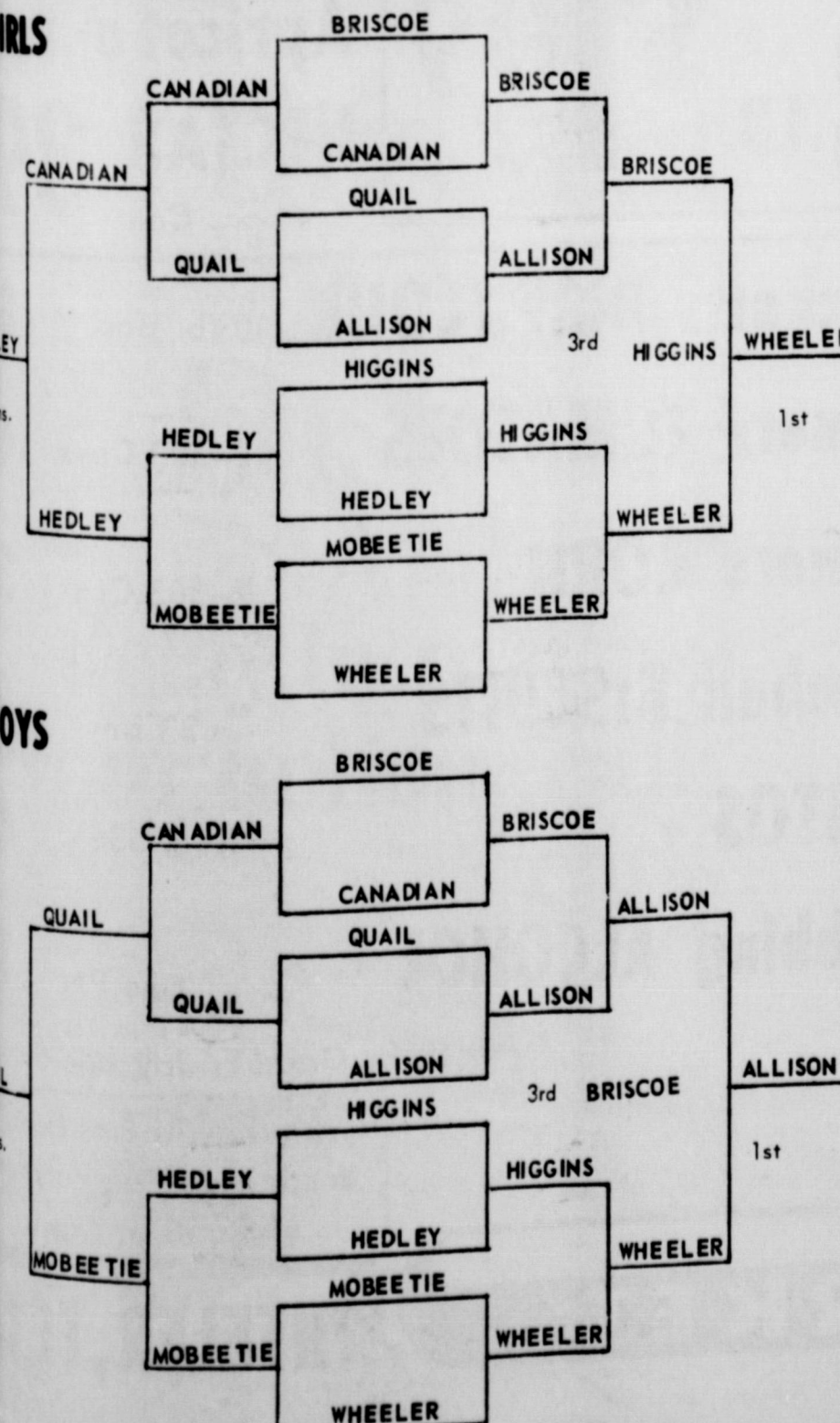

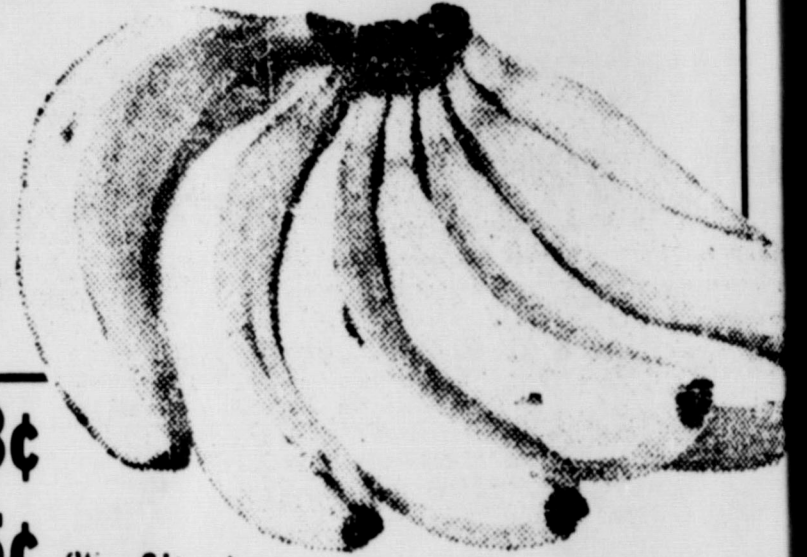

Across the Fence

Inflation is apparently going to be with us for a while yet, according to bank officials speaking at the Panhandle Economic Program sponsored Agricultural Finance Seminar held last week in Amarillo. James Verden, Wheeler PCA, John Manning USDA's FHA, R. L. Roberts and Jack Roach from the F & M Bank in Shamrock and Clarence Zybach, PEP Board Members attended with us.

If this is so, agriculture, along with other industries will have to pay more for credit. Since credit will be expensive we foresee the increased need for intensified management in agriculture. In addition, it appears to us that we are going to need to make a transition from a traditional row-crop economy to one of a more balanced livestock (cattle, hogs) operation coupled with sufficient forage crops and improved permanent pasture grasses, to maximize returns from our borrowed dollars.

With spiraling land costs, we are going to have to start thinking about cows to-the-acre instead of cows to-the-section.

2,4,5-T Use Restricted:

It is my understanding that a coordinated effort to restrict the use of the weed and brush killing chemical 2,4,5-T is being made by various agencies of government. The actions to control the use of the chemical were taken as a result of findings from a laboratory study conducted by Bionetics Research Laboratories, which indicated that off-spring of mice and rats given relatively large oral doses of the 2,4,5-T during early stages of pregnancy showed a higher than expected number of deformities. That just goes to show that it is interesting how the behavior of little mice in a laboratory can effect the brush eradication efforts of ranchers in the Texas Panhandle. However, at this time the use restriction applies only to food crops and for the present at least, our rangeland will not be affected.

1970 edition of the Farmers Tax Guide is in our office and can be picked up free of charge. Since January 15 is the date for filing a declaration of estimated income tax if you want to wait until April 15 to file your 1969 Federal Income tax return, you may want to get you a copy. Some helpful tips on making deductions are included.

Fireplaces for Holiday:

The fire in the fireplace during the upcoming Holiday Season can be made to reflect the cheerfulness of the occasion even more by adding multi-colored flames.

Chemical treatment of the material to be burned can result in green, red, blue, orange or purple flames instead of the usual flame from wood.

Calcium chloride can be used to produce orange colored flames, copper chloride - blue, potassium chloride - purple, strontium nitrate - red, lithium chloride - carmine, and copper sulfate - emerald green. Dry pine cones, small chips or blocks of wood can be soaked in these chemicals for the multi-colored flames. Most of the chemicals can be purchased from chemical suppliers or drugstores.

To treat the cones or wood, a plastic pail and an onion sack are needed. The cones or chips are replaced in the sack and immersed in a solution containing one pound of the chemical thoroughly dissolved in one gallon of water. The bag must be weighted so that all of the material is completely covered and soaking should last for at least 10 minutes.

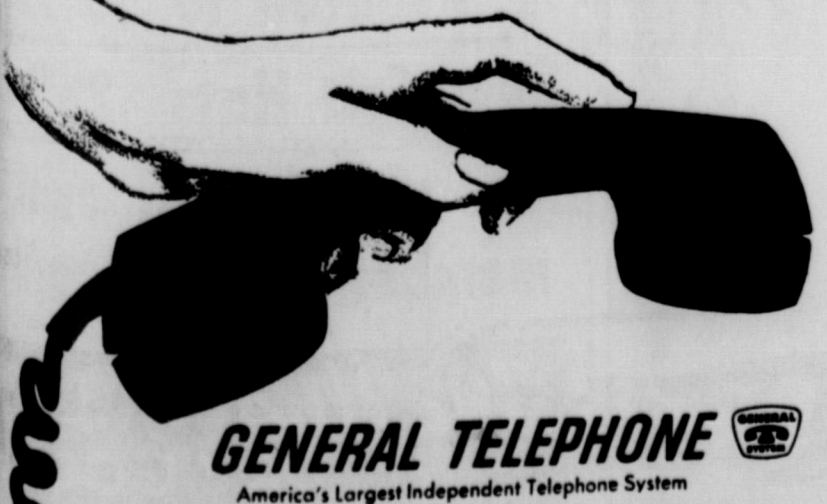

Citation Honors C. Snelgroes

Austin - An official State Health Department citation for work proficiency has been awarded to Cecil O. Snelgroes, water superintendent for the City of Wheeler.

Signed by the State Health Commissioner and authorities of the Texas Water Utilities Association, the certificate of competency is awarded only to those utility plant operators who have successfully demonstrated their skill and knowledge in modern principles of plant management.

To qualify for certification, a plant operator must have accumulated a prescribed amount of actual work experience. He must also have attended both regional and statewide short schools at which the techniques of water treatment and waste water disposal are taught, and must have passed an examination given by State Health Department sanitary engineers.

State law requires that at least one operator per shift be certified for competency by health department engin-

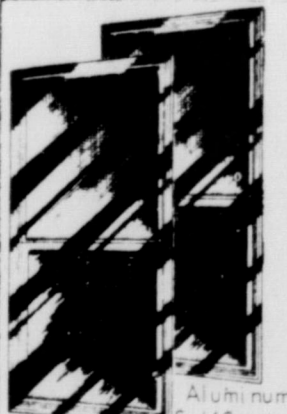
