Mr. Phillips is the best informed man on this subject in this area, according to Wes Lizzard of the Amarillo Globe News.

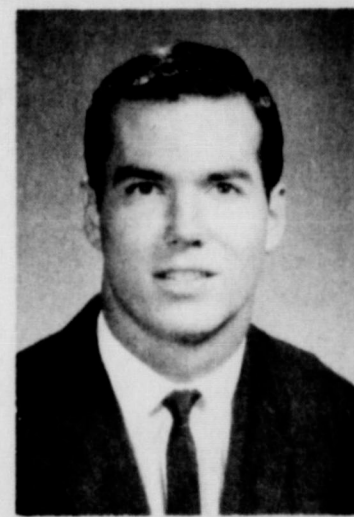
Sharing the speakers rostrum will be Judge Grainger McIlhany and Texas Ranger, Mr. Bill Baten of Pampa.

## REAGAN BROWN WILL BE GUEST SPEAKER AT CHAMBER BANQUET

Across the Fence Reagan Brown will be the speaker at the annual Wheeler Chamber of Commerce Banquet on January 20. Garland Abernathy, President of the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce said he had heard him speak twice and that "he was the best speaker he had ever heard speak." Abernathy encourages attendance by all chamber members and guests from surrounding towns who would like to hear Mr. Brown's talk.

Known as an inspiring and motivating speaker, Brown has the reputation of being one of Texas' most popular speakers. His topic will be on Community Development. Brown was secured through the County Agricultural Agent's office.

He is responsible for the Texas Community Improvement Program sponsored by the electric utility companies and conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Working with local county agents and home demonstration agents, Brown has helped more than a thousand communities in programs designed to make the communities more beautiful, more prosperous, and a better place to live. He is often called "Mr. Community Improvement".

He has served as county agent in three Texas counties. He is past president of the Terrell Chamber of Commerce, Kaufman Lions Club, and the Lockhart Businessmen's Club. He is a veteran of the 69th Infantry Division, was wounded in the Battle of the Bulge, and was discharged with the rank of captain.

He is a member of the graduate faculty at Colorado State University, and his summer class, "Human Behavior" has attracted students from every section of America and

many foreign countries. Brown's sparkling style and down to earth philosophy has made him a favorite speaker at numerous functions.

Equally at home in academic circles or at rural community meetings, he has received standing ovations on college campuses, sales meetings, conventions, and hundreds of community get-togethers.

He was recently chosen by the Former Students Association of Texas A&M University for the Faculty Distinguished Achievement Award. The award included \$1,000 and a gold watch. He is also recipient of the Superior Service Award by the University's Agricultural Extension Service.

## A.S.C.S. Explains 1970 Feed Grain Program, Bases In Mail

Producers in Wheeler County will receive notice of their feed grain bases and an explanatory leaflet on the 1970 Feed Grain Program in January, 1970, according to Louis W. Grayson, Office Manager of the Wheeler County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office.

Sign-up period for the voluntary farm program including wheat and cotton as well as feed grains will be February 2 through March 20, 1970.

The 1970 Feed Grain Program will be much like the 1969 program, the Office Manager said. Provisions of the QOUP Wheat and Cotton Programs were announced earlier. Grayson gave the following details on the Feed Grain program:

1. Acreage diversion and diversion payments. Minimum diversion at 20 percent of a farm's feed grain base acreage will be required for program participation. No payment will be made for this first 20% diversion, except for small farms. Payments will be made for additional diversion of corn, grain sorghum, and barley.

Maximum acreage that can be diverted for payment will be the larger of 30% of a farm's feed grain base or 15 acres less the qualifying 20% of diversion. Payment rate for this additional diversion will be based on 40% of the total county price support (loan plus support payment) times a farm's projected yield of the crops involved. No advance diversion payments will be made.

Upper limits will be established on the per-bushel rate which will be paid for the additional voluntary diversion of feed grain acres. The maximum payments will be: for corn, 50 cents per bushel; for grain sorghum, 55 cents per bushel (not CWT.) for barley, 45 cents per bushel.

2. Price-support loans and payments. National average price-support loan rates on all feed grains will be the same as in 1969. However, corn loan rates, while unchanged, will be at \$1.08 per bushel, "No. 2" basis—which is equal to the 1969 level of \$1.05 for average quality. The National average loan levels of the other feed grains will be: grain sorghum, \$1.61 per hundred-weight; barley, 83 cents per bushel; oats, 63 cents per bushel; rye, 1.02 per bushel. (Price support is required by law for oats and rye, but there are no provisions for acreage limitations.) Price-support payment rates will be: corn, 30 cents per bushel; grain sorghum, 53 cents per hundred-

weight; barley, 20 cents per bushel. Price-support payment for a farm is arrived at by multiplying the per bushel price-support payment times the farm's projected yield times the smaller of the planted acreage or 50% of the farm's feed grain base. 3. Small farm provisions. A farm with a feed grain base of 25 acres or less will be able to qualify for payment on the first 20 percent of its diverted acreage, with the payment rates based on 20 percent of the total county support rate times projected yield. For the remaining diverted acreage on small farms, the diversion payments will be based on the 40% payment rate, subject to the maximum limitation. Producers with feed grain bases of up to 125 acres will have the option of temporarily reducing their base to 25 acres to become eligible for the small farm provisions. In such case, no corn, grain sorghum, or barley is to be planted for harvest on the farm and the temporary 25 acre feed grain base must be put to conserving uses. 4. Other Program Provisions. Soybean planted in lieu of feed grains will not earn price-support payments. Alfalfa/barley will not be exempt from diversion requirements in 1970 since supplies are more than adequate to meet needs. Substitution provisions relating to wheat and feed grain acreage will continue as in previous years. Announcement will be made prior to sign-up time on production of substitute crops on diverted acres.

## Citation Is GIVEN Austin Caldwell

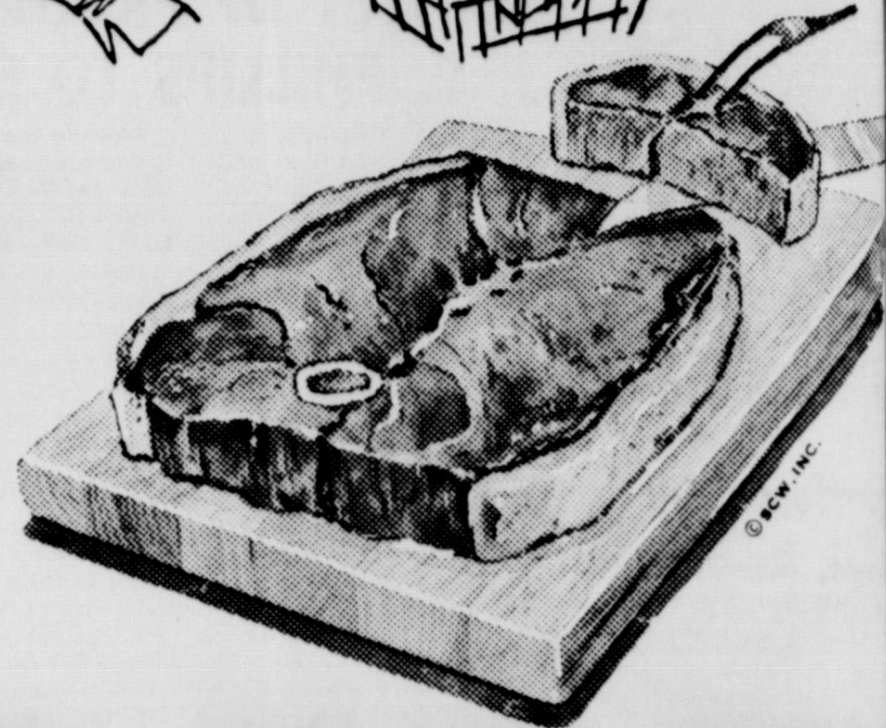
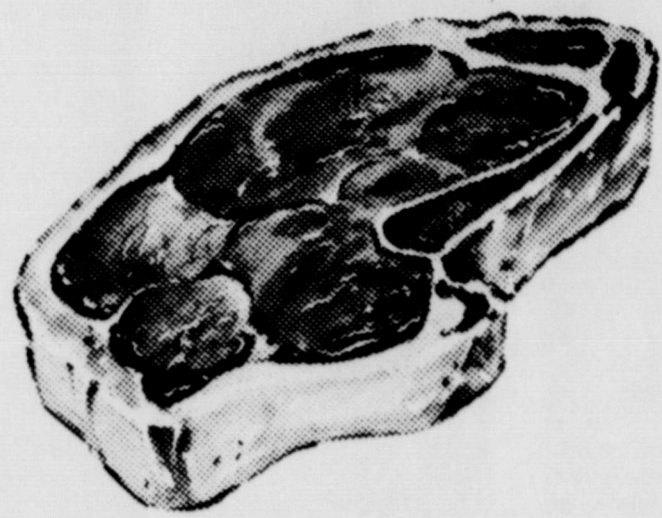
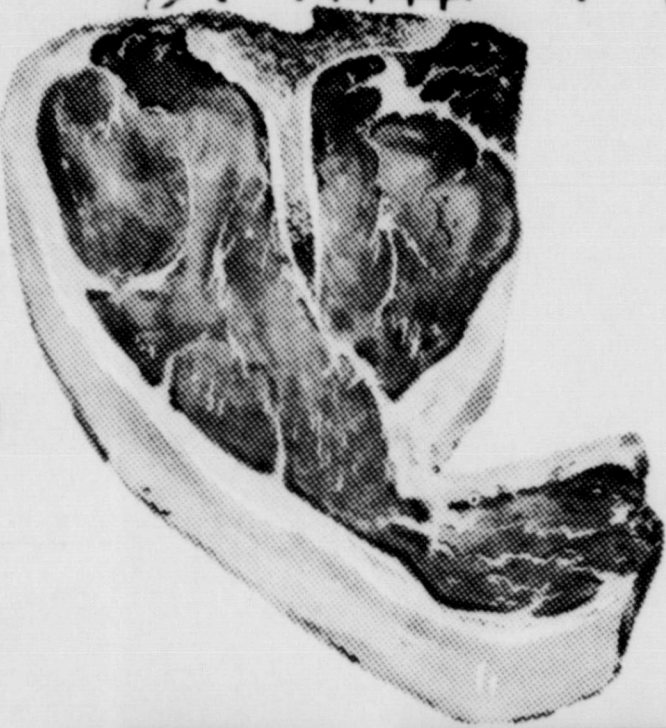
AUSTIN—An official State Health Department citation for work proficiency has been awarded to Austin G. Caldwell, owner-operator of the Mobeetie Water Works.

Signed by the State Health Commissioner and authorities of the Texas Water Utilities Association, the certificate of competency is awarded only to those utility plant operators who have successfully demonstrated their skill and knowledge in modern principles of plant management.

To qualify for certification, a plant operator must have accumulated a prescribed amount of actual work experience. He must also have attended both regional and statewide short schools at which the techniques of water treatment and waste water disposal are taught, and must have passed an examination given by State Health Department sanitary engineers. State law requires that at least one operator per sh-

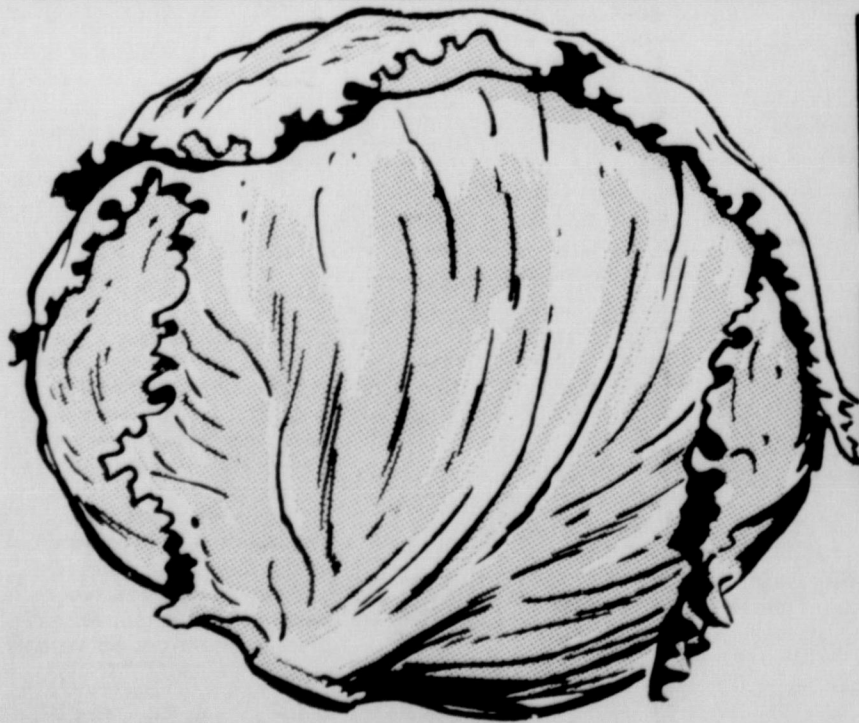

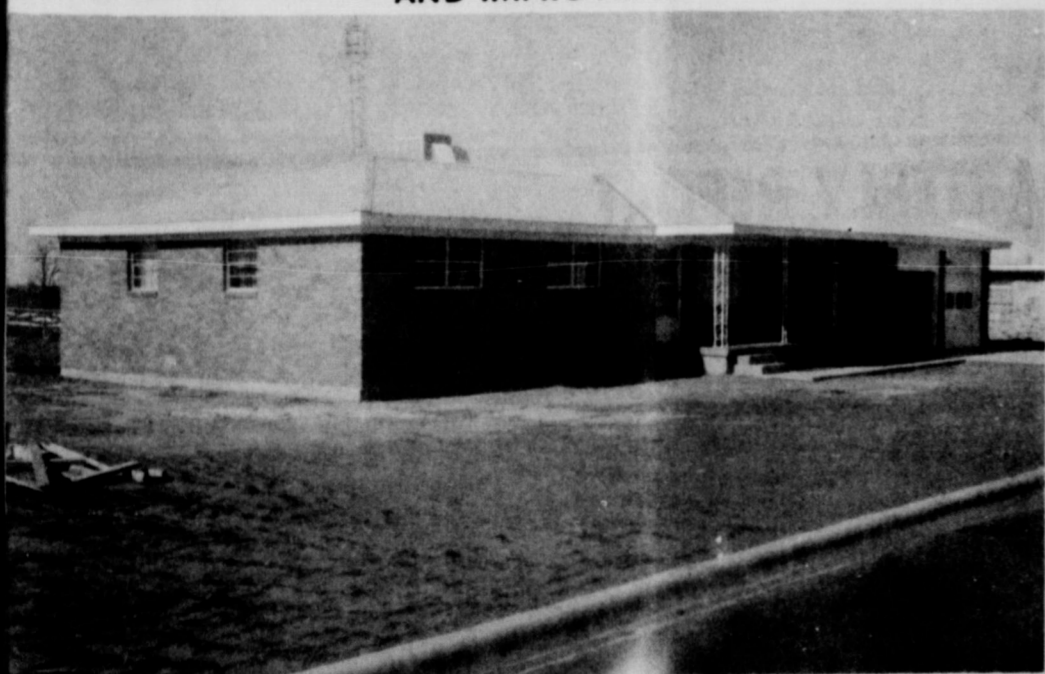
