Jumping into retirement

County requested to consider closing 3 rail crossings

Representatives of Burlington Northern Santa Fe and the Texas Department of Transportation met with Bailey County commissioners last week to discuss the possibility of consolidating railroad crossings in the county.

Specifically, the proposal involves closing railroad crossings at Muleshoe Livestock Auction (probably moving traffic east to County Road 1068 and building a new road north of the tracks to reach the auction barn), County Road 1028 (just east of the section known as West Camp Road) and on County Road 93 near Lariat (a "road" that is not maintained north of the tracks).

According to records researched by the rail-road, the crossing at Muleshoe Livestock Auction has been listed as a public crossing since 1977, but county officials said they are not aware that any maintenance has ever been done north of the tracks at that point.

Both the railroad's and the state's representatives said there might be enough funding from those two entities (because of the increased safety factor in having fewer railroad crossings) so that the county would not be out any money to build the new access road.

Commissioners tabled the proposal to give themselves time to study the situation.

City to submit cable proposal to Classic

The Muleshoe City Council voted Tuesday to submit a new cable-TV franchise to Classic Cable

City Manager Rick Hanna called the proposal "almost identical to what we looked at

Hanna said the local cable service seems to have improved considerably since the last Classic Cable representative met with the council.

"Mine is vastly improved, and I don't have as many com-

plaints (from citizens)," he said.

He also announced that the city has received \$29,000 in federal emergency funds to work on streets.

Armyworms show up in corn

Significant numbers of beet

armyworm larvae are being found in some corn in Lamb and Hale counties and perhaps other areas.

Beet armyworm will feed on corn but is more common in sorghum and cotton.

Because little is known about beet armyworm damage to corn, the damage potential is difficult to estimate. At present, area pest experts with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service expect corn less than 8 inches tall to be at risk. Corn less than 6 inches tall is at higher risk.

Damage will include leaf feeding and window-paning similar to that caused by fall armyworm, but it is possible that smaller plants may undergo "deadheart," which oc-



Some Wrestling Matches Exact a Very Heavy Price

A good wrestling match with my sons has always seemed to me to be a good thing. And it was just a few days ago, or so it seems, that my biggest concern during such a contest was just how long I should tumble with my sons and tickle them before it became truly unmerciful. One should avoid behaving like a bully, you know, even when he's just kidding. And I'm firmly convinced that mercy

and fair play, not to mention the "Golden Rule," dictate that the definition of bullying should be pretty much whatever the smaller/younger/weaker party says that it is. If the scuffle gets over being fun for the little guy, well, it needs to "get over" happening.

I've always felt pretty strongly about the sentiment expressed in that last sentence, and it's never been a more deeply held conviction than right now because, you see, suddenly I've been surprised to find myself turning into the little guy. No, I'm not getting smaller. In my mind, at least, I've never been more robust, strong, athletic, sleek, . . . uh, well, humility dictates that I should stop here.

But, seriously, I really don't think that I'm shrinking just yet or getting much smaller, but my guys are certainly getting bigger and stronger. They are all at least

fairly formidable. By my estimation, strength-wise, the lineup and the verdict, sons vs. Dad, would be: certainly stronger, most definitely stronger, a good bit stronger, and well on the way to being stronger. Aw, rats, that hurts!

So wrestling with the guys is becoming a bit of a serious commitment (both for me and for our surroundings) not to be undertaken lightly. A week or so ago I wrestled with Number Two son, the son of the college footballbound variety, and I can now almost cough, breathe deeply, sleep on my side, and bend over without too much pain. Sneezing is still a serious commitment I'd prefer not to make, but I'm better (and if I want him to know he got the upper hand, I'll tell him myself, thanks).

I still think I'm craftier than my sons, so that's in my favor, but if I'm really smarter than they are, well, perhaps I should be smart enough to slow down just a bit on the wrestling. When you're littlest little boy is wearing a 13 1/2 shoe, well, it's time to rely on brains more than brawn.

Which brings me to this: Be careful who or what you choose to wrestle. That's pretty much what God is telling us in the Ten Commandments, you know. Not one of us is strong enough or smart enough to tussle with falsehood, tumble with adultery, or toy with covetousness, and not end up badly roughed up in the process. Once I'm healed, I'll probably still wrestle with the guys. But some real fights just aren't worth the pain.

Some of my younger women friends and I recently discussed our new president.

I told them that my generation said President George Bush looked like every woman's ex-husband. After these young 30-something women reprimanded me and told me that all ex-husbands aren't bad (some of these women are second wives and married to ex-husbands), they jumped on it!

Yes, they agreed, that's exactly how he's acting, only this is worst. He has betrayed us.

These wives and mothers (mostly the soccer-mom crowd) didn't seem to mind that George W. has reneged on his pledge to regulate carbon dioxide emissions, or repealed the safety rules in the workplace, or even refused to reduce the permissible levels of arsenic in drinking water, but they were incensed at his plans

where children are concerned. Word is out that President Bush is proposing cuts in childcare assistance for low-income families and funding for programs designed to investigate and combat child abuse and neglect.

He also wants to cut funds for training pediatricians and other doctors at children's hospitals across the United States. And he plans to cut off all the money provided by Congress for the Early Learning Trust Fund, aimed at improving the quality of child-care and education for children under the

My friends may be young, but they understand that this is unconscionable.

This is not the kinder, gentler and more compassionate government they expected.

While none of this may have a direct impact on them, they understand the impact on the community. Stable child-care for low-income families has become a key to moving people from welfare to work.

Without affordable childcare, children are often left at home unattended. Their safety is at risk, their health is at risk, their education is at risk, and their future is at risk.

These are the children that are most likely to be abused and neglected, and also most likely to turn to crime. These are the children who will be the schoolmates of my friends' children.

Once I had their interest, I just couldn't help telling them how things were shaping up in

According to the Texas Department of Health, 55 percent of the births in Texas are Medicaid births. It is estimated that half these pregnancies are unintended and unplanned. Full family-planning care — including contraception — costs only \$164 a year per woman while prenatal, delivery and postnatal care costs the state millions of dollars each year.

Not only are hundreds of un-

wanted babies being born to parents who cannot afford to support them, the state spends millions in medical care only to send these babies home to

Young, still in their childbearing years and depending on birth control to plan the sizes of their families, they understand. They also understand that George W. misled them.

He told us no child should be left behind in America. He told us he cared about children.

Just like some ex-spouses, he said the right thing; he just didn't mean it.




