## County requested to consider closing 3 rail crossings

Representatives of Burlington Northern Santa Fe and the Texas Department of Trans portation met with Bailey County commissioner. last week to discuss the possibility of consolidating railroad crossings in the county. Specifically, the proposal involves closing railroad crossings at Muleshoe LivestockAuction (probably moving traffic east to County Road 1068 and building a new road north of the tracks to reach the auction barn), County Road 1028 (just east of the section knovin as West Camp Road) and on County Road 93 near Lariat (a "road" that is not maintained north of the tracks)
According to records researched by the rail road, the crossing at Muleshoe Livestock Auc tion has been listed as a public crossing since 1977, but county officials said they are not ware that any maintenance has ev
one north of the tracks at that point
Both the railroad's and the state's represen tatives said there might be enough funding from those two entities (because of the in creased safety factor in having fewer railroad crossings) so that the county would not be out any money to build the new access road
Commissioners tabled the proposal to give hemselves time to study the situation.

armyworm larvae are being found in some corn in Lamb and Hale counties and perhaps other areas
Beet armyworm will feed on corn but is more common in sorghum and cotton.
Because little is known about beet armyworm damge to corn, the damage poten tial is difficult to estimate. A present, area pest experts with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service expect corn less than 8 inches tall to be at risk. Corn less than 6 inches tall is at higher risk.
Damage will include leaf feeding and window-paning similar to that caused by fall armyworm, but it is possible that smaller plants may undergo "deadheart," which oc pairs of
