CONTRACT LET **FOR 83 PAVING**

V. J. McGee, District Engineer of the Texas Highway Department, Childress, announces that the Texas Highway Commission on January 30th, 1970, approved a \$406-million, two-year Consolidated Highway Program that will mean better highway facilities throughout Texas. The program calls for construction or reconstruction or reconstruction of U. S. and State-numbered high-

In all, a total of 1,968.6 miles of non-Interstate highways will be built or reconstructed under the program. Estimated cost of the construction work is \$365 mil-

Included in the above Consolidated Highway Program is a project on U.S. Highway 83, in Wheeler County, extending from U.S. Highway 66 North 4.7 miles, at an estimated construction cost of \$262,000 and an estimated right of way cost of \$16,000. Wheeler County will be responsible for one-half of the right of way cost. This project will cover

the Widening, Reconditioning, and Resurfacing of U.S. Highway 83 to provide a 26foot roadway, with 8-foot surfaced shoulders, and the contract will be let in conjunction with a contract on Interstate Highway 40, which extends from 1.0 mile East of Shamrock to 1.0 mile West of Shamrock. The letting date of this contract is not known

at the present time. O. V. Johnson, Sr. Resident Engineer of Wellington, will be in charge of these projects.



Cattle infested with lice spend a great deal of time rubbing against fences, posts or other convenient objects. Cattle on feed do not gain as they should and more feed is required for a pound of gain.

Infested cows lose weight and their calves become prime targets of the pests. Reduced weaning weights of calves can hit the pocketbook where it really hurts. Cattle lice are common

over the entire state and include both the biting and sucking types. Their populations build up rapidly after cool weather arrives in the
