## The Cross And The Switch Blade

Keith Johnson, pastor of the Wheeler Assembly of God Church, announces a two service crusade with Dave Wilkerson, the famed author of THE CROSS AND THE SWITCHBLADE, and known around the world as the "Gang Preacher." He will be speaking in Pampa at the Harvester Field House located at Pampa High School at 7:30 P. M. Saturday, February 21, and 3:00 P. M. Sunday, February 22, 1970. The public is invited. Wilkerson is widely known for his successful work among drug addicts and gang members in New York. His book THE CROSS AND THE SWITCHBLADE, written about his work, has sold over three million copies.

In 1958 Wilkerson became famous in the New York area for interrupting the Michael Farmer murder trial. Seven young gang members were on trial for the brutal murder of a police officer, Michael Farmer. In an attempt to help the young gang members, Wilkerson interrupted the court session and was promptly dragged from the courtroom. The ensuing publicity made the young minister from Pennsylvania a hero among New York's 350 teenage gangs. The gangs were soon allowing him to visit their hideouts, from which came the nickname "The Gang Preacher."

Dave Wilkerson is the founder of New York Teen Challenge, one of America's most successful drug addiction rehabilitation programs. Teen Challenge claims an amazing 74% cure rate among heroin users who have completed its program.

In addition to his duties in New York, Wilkerson now travels around the world to carry his message to young people. He speaks on an average of from 3,000 to 10,000 teenagers each week. His message is simple and relevant. His topics include drugs, sex, rebellion, loneliness and fear.

This crusade is being promoted by the Pampa Ministerial Alliance, and all churches in the surrounding communities are urged to participate.

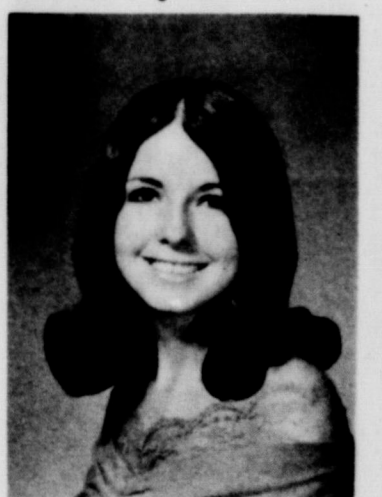

## CONTRACT LET FOR 83 PAVING

V. J. McGee, District Engineer of the Texas Highway Department, Childress, announces that the Texas Highway Commission on January 30th, 1970, approved a \$406-million, two-year Consolidated Highway Program that will mean better highway facilities throughout Texas. The program calls for construction or reconstruction or reconstruction of U. S. and State-numbered highways.

In all, a total of 1,968.6 miles of non-interstate highways will be built or reconstructed under the program. Estimated cost of the construction work is \$365 million.

Included in the above Consolidated Highway Program is a project on U. S. Highway 83, in Wheeler County, extending from U. S. Highway 66 North 4.7 miles, at an estimated construction cost of \$262,000 and an estimated right of way cost of \$16,000. Wheeler County will be responsible for one-half of the right of way cost.

This project will cover the Widening, Reconditioning, and Resurfacing of U. S. Highway 83 to provide a 26-foot roadway, with 8-foot surfaced shoulders, and the contract will be let in conjunction with a contract on Interstate Highway 40, which extends from 1.0 mile East of Shamrock to 1.0 mile West of Shamrock. The letting date of this contract is not known at the present time.

O. V. Johnson, Sr., Resident Engineer of Wellington, will be in charge of these projects.

## Wheeler Man Found Guilty

Clinton Jones of Wheeler was found guilty of robbery by assault Wednesday in the first day of his trial in 31st District Court.

Judge Grainger McIlhany said he will withhold sentencing on the jury's assessed penalty of seven years imprisonment for 10 days, giving defense attorney James Bowers of Pampa time to file for a retrial or to appeal the conviction.

Jones was arraigned in September on charges of beating 80-year-old Jeff Sweetnam in his home here and robbing him of \$7 on June 3. Charges against Charles Walker of Dumas in connection with the same incident have been dropped.

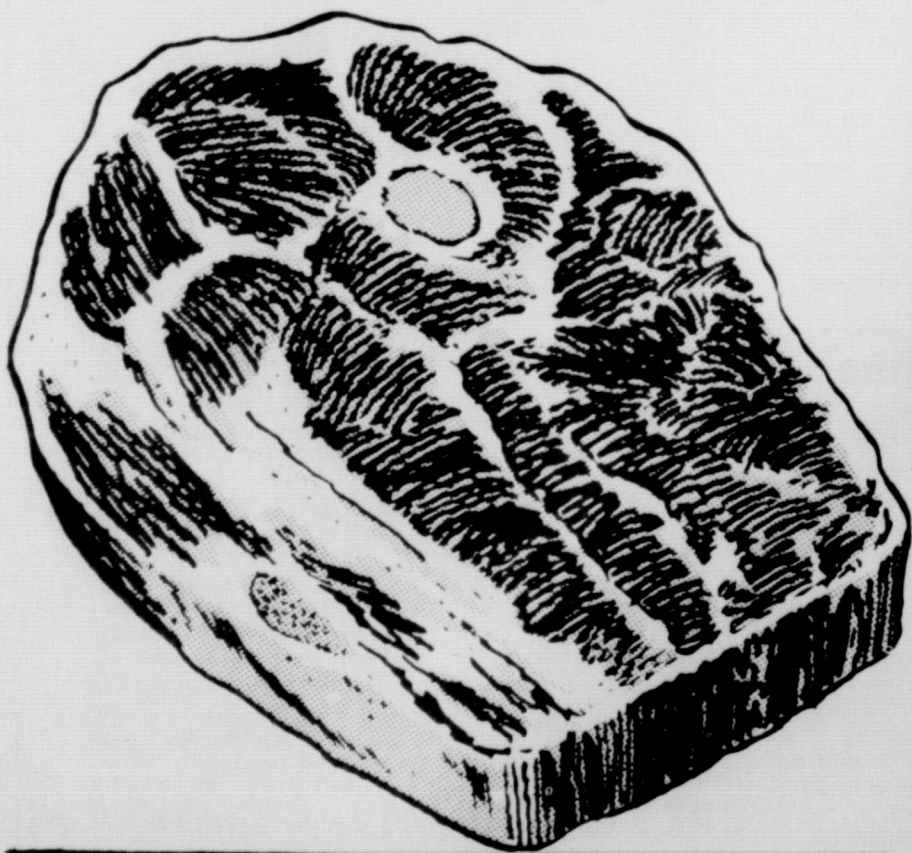
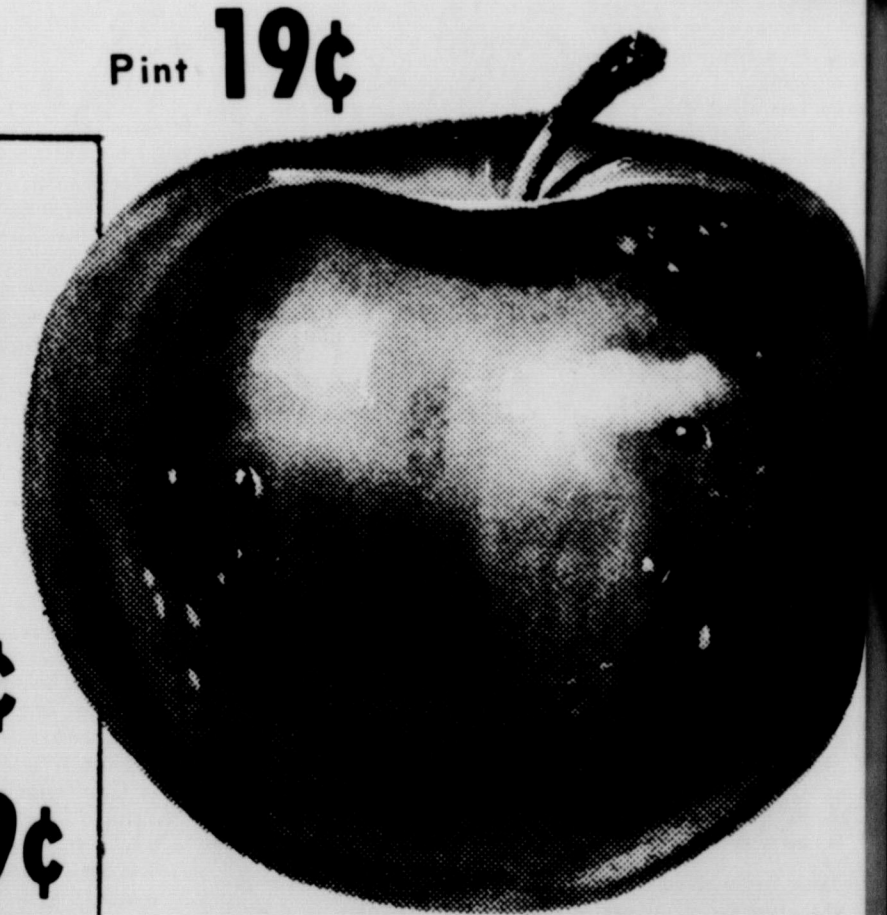

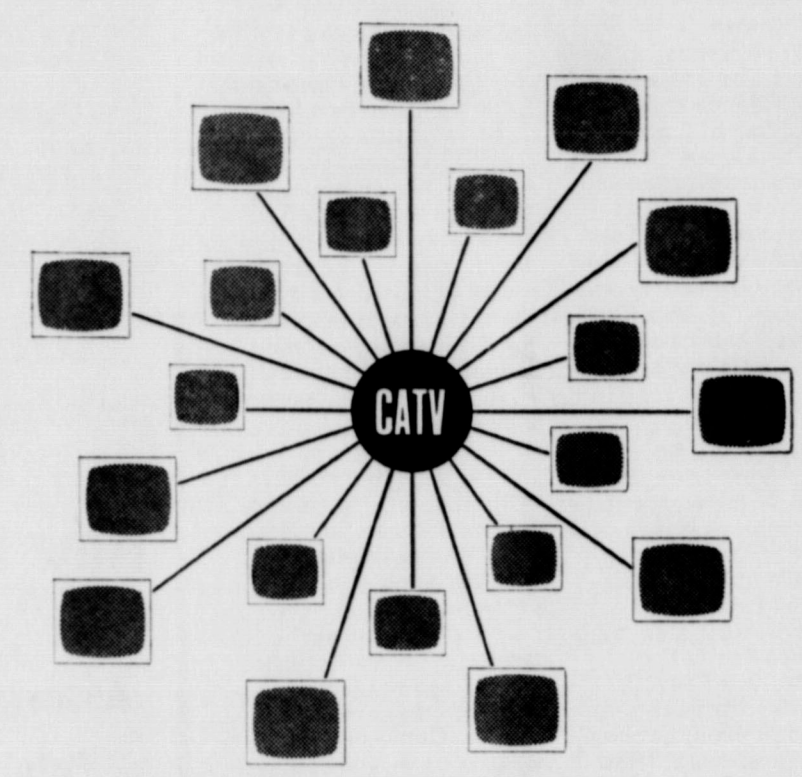

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# Across the Fence

Work is progressing on the new Wheeler Feedlot. The 20,000 head capacity lot's business office is nearly finished and the operation is beginning to look like a feedlot. With interest in cattle feeding mounting in our area, folks here might be interested in hearing the experiences of other people in the feedlot business on a listening and learning program on February 18 in Amarillo. There, the very "heart" of the mushrooming cattle feeding industry in the Texas Panhandle and adjacent areas will undergo careful examination at a PEP (Panhandle Economic Program) Stocker-Feeder Conference. An outstanding program has been developed for the conference, and anyone interested in the cattle industry is encouraged to attend. The conference will kick off at 9:00 A. M. at the Holiday Inn West. Its theme is "Meeting the Need for Feedlot Replacements."

Opening remarks will be made by R.B. Dawson, Jr. of Tulsa, chairman of the PEP Agricultural Production Task Force, and Leo Forrest of Amarillo, PEP Chairman. Erbin Crowell of Canadian, program committee chairman, will preside at the morning session. Leadoff speaker will be Dr. C. M. Smallwood of West Texas State University who will discuss "Stocker Cattle-Who Needs Them? Do You Do?" He will be followed by Stanton Brown with the League Ranch at Benjamin. Brown's topic will be "They'll Never Look Back."

A panel of three order-buying firm representatives will round out the morning session - John Spigntes, Kenneth Murray Livestock Co., Montgomery Ala.; J. D. Vann, Vann-Roach Cattle Co., Fort Worth; and Kendall Quinn, Quinn Brothers Livestock Commission, Jackson, Miss. They will tell "How We Shake 'Em Out of the Bushes."

Dawson will preside at the noon luncheon and during the afternoon session of the conference. Speaking at the luncheon on "Selling Beef is Everyone's Job" will be Jim McNease with the National Livestock and Meat Board. Headlining the list of afternoon speakers is Dr. E. E. Krause, veterinarian from Clovis, who will discuss "Avoiding the First Two Week Wreck." He will be followed by Ross Cooley, consulting nutritionist from Hereford, whose presentation will be "You Can't Starve a Profit Out of Them."

The day-long confab will be brought to a close with a "question and answer" period in which all program speakers will participate. Smallwood will moderate this portion titled "Let's Get It Straight Before We Leave."

Clarence Zybach, Chairman of the Livestock Committee of the County Program Building Committee says the conference has something to offer for every-

one interested in the economy of the area. And it's an excellent opportunity to learn more about how stocker and feeder cattle can mean additional income to farmers and ranchers in the Panhandle. Mr. Zybach was on the PEP Task Force and helped plan this meeting.

This conference is being sponsored by the PEP Agricultural Production Task Force and is the third of a series of such PEP meetings designed to bolster the overall economy of the 25 counties in the PEP area. These include Armstrong, Briscoe, Carson, Castro, Collingsworth, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Donley, Gray, Hall, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lipscomb, Moore, Ochiltree, Oldham, Parmer, Potter, Randall, Roberts, Sherman, Swisher and Wheeler.

4-H and FFA Pig Show-4-H Boys and girls who plan to show pigs at the Wheeler County Pig Show March 7 should be getting their \$1 entry fees in to their 4-H leaders as soon as possible.

4-H Drill Team-The Wheeler County 4-H Texans Drill Team is beginning work for the 1970 season in preparation for their upcoming appearance in the new Cady Coliseum in Amarillo next month. Any 4-H members interesting in taking part in the Drill should report to the Wheeler Rodeo Arena Saturday afternoon at 2:30 P. M. or Sunday afternoon at 2:00 P. M.

over the entire state and include both the biting and sucking types. Their populations build up rapidly after cool weather arrives in the fall.

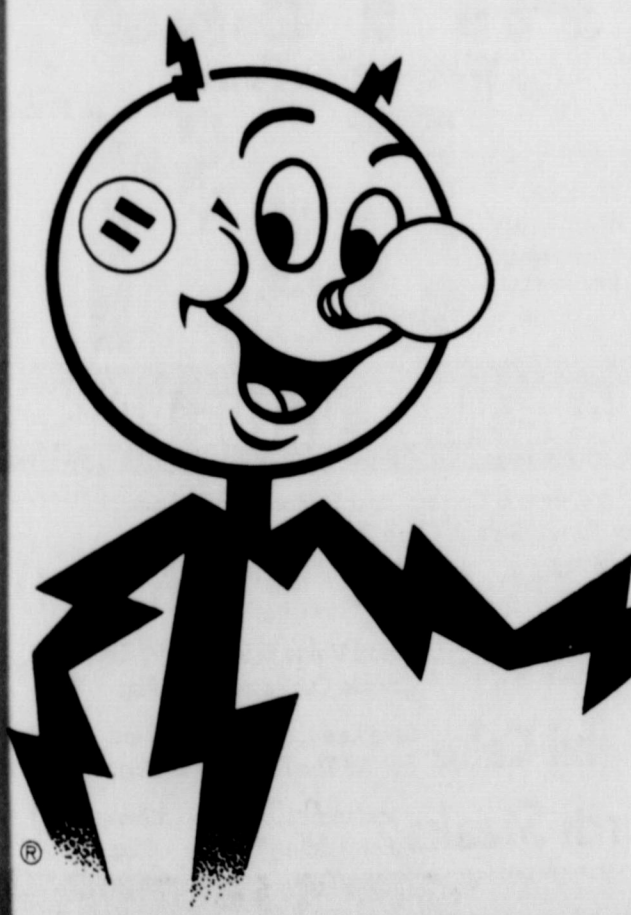

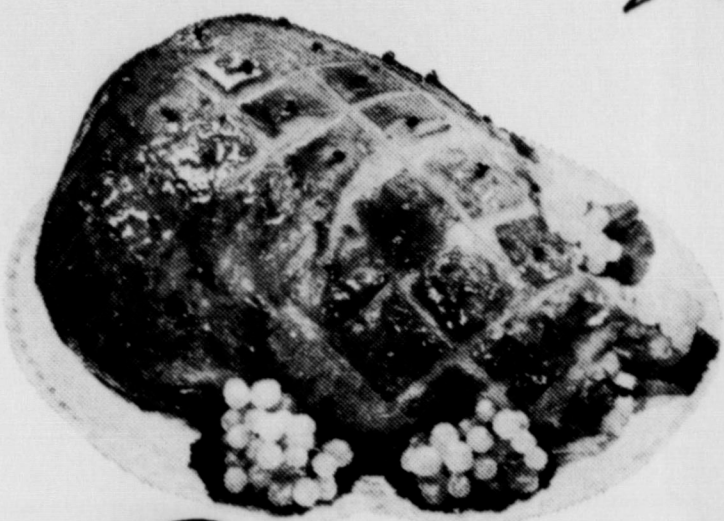
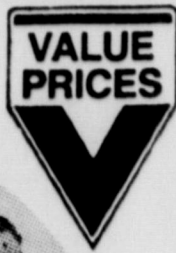
