He also awarded Captain Conrad a Navy command insigniafor his service as commander of the three man lunar crew. Also, Captain Bean was formally presented his Navy astro-

naut's wings, Apollo 12 being his first trip into space. The command insignia presented to Conrad is officially named the Command-at-Sea insignia. It is normally awarded to officers in command of commissioned ships and to pilots who command aviation squadrons that operate in direct support of the fleet. The bin was built on the ground and later lifted into position to same time and money. The bin has a capacity of 1/2 million pounds and will store whole grains, hay, supplements, etc. The crain used to lift the bin is one of the largest of that type in the Panhandle; it is a 60 ton crain; the smaller crain, shown in the pictured is a 20 ton crain. The bins will be housed in the mill. When completed the feedmill will be a push-button operation and will produce 200 tons finished feed per day. The mill's process of feed mixing is referred to as "a batch mix system". The cylinder in the background is the grain tank; it will not be enclosed in the mill. The "elevator legs", lower right when raised will stand 120" and carry commodities from the trucks to the supply bins. Bill Scherman is the engineer for the feedmill through Brown and Megee of Lubbock. Harold Ferguson of Lubbock is the contractor for the feedmill construction. The top picture shows the bin being lifted and turned into place and the lower picture shows the ben being lowered.




