FAT STOCK SHOW PLANNED AT MOBEETIE

4-H & FFA MEMBERS TO EXHIBIT SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 28

The Mobetie Stock show will be held Saturday, Feb. 28th. The First Annual Fat Stock Show will be held in the bus barns at Mobetie Schools.

The show will consist of entries of both 4-H and FFA exhibits. These exhibits will consist of fat barrows, gilts and fat steers. The Mobetie FFA Farm Mechanics exhibits will be on display.

There will be 2 divisions

of barrows, one steer division and 2 gilt divisions. The barrows will be broken into light (190-220) pounds and heavy weight (220-240) pounds. The gilts will be broken into mature and immature classes. And there will be one class of steers.

First, Second and third place ribbons will be given. Bostetts will be given to the champions of the show.

Mr. Larry Howe, Ag. teacher, in Wheeler will be the judge of the show.

Walter L. Knapp has filed for election to the Senate in the 31st Senatorial District of Texas and to the Democratic primary. The 31st Senatorial District consists of the 20 westernmost counties of Texas Panhandle. (Deaf Smith, Randall, Armstrong, Bailey, Collingsworth, Oldham, Potter, Carson, Gray, Wheeler, Hartley, Moore, Hutchinson, Roberts, Hemphill, Dallam, Sherman, Hansford, Ochiltree and Lipscomb).



First, I want to thank all friends in the large and all towns and on the ranches of the Panhandle who have counseled me and have encouraged me to make this decision. I realize that the job of representing the Texas Panhandle in the Senate carries heavy responsibilities and great challenges. There are only 31 Texas Senators and we have moved into an era when the U. S. Supreme Court has given the large seats of the Senate to districts consisting of rural areas, small towns and all cities have to scrap and claw all the way to offset the advantage of great numbers which the big city Senators have. For this reason I feel that the 31st Senatorial District needs its most experienced Legislator in the Senate seat and I think the eight years I've served in the House have qualified and conditioned me to handle the responsibilities of the Senator.

I feel that my legislative experience and the friendships I've made in Austin will benefit the people of the Panhandle.

Many times a friendship between members of the legislature influences a decisive vote and I count many members of the House and Senate as my friends.

A brand new man can learn the written rules of the Legislative process in short time but it takes years to learn the unwritten rules and the personalities and out of the Legislature one has to deal with representing one's District.

During my eight years in the Legislature I've always tried to represent the majority of the people in my District. I think my record and performance has satisfied most of my constituents most of the time.

JACK HAZLEWOOD SEEKS SENATE POST; AGAINST INSUR. INCREASE

The proposed increase in hail insurance premium rates now on file before the State Board of Insurance drew fire in Amarillo today from Attorney Jack Hazlewood, candidate for the State Senate. Hazlewood said that he would make the high cost of insurance premiums an issue in his campaign for the Senate and that if he is



setting their rates and he proposed that legislation be passed which would require the Insurance Board to set premium structures on the basis of investment income.

The Senate investigation should also take into account hail insurance policies to determine whether the companies are shooting straight with the public in their statements to the Insurance Board. Hazlewood pointed out that hail insurance is sold normally to a homeowner for an advance payment of three years premium. The companies have the Policy holder's money for three years, Hazlewood said, and have been making enormous profits from the investment of these premium dollars during the three year life of the policies.

Whether the companies have really suffered because of the recent hail losses in Amarillo and whether Amarillo residents should be called upon to pay higher premiums than elsewhere is a matter of vital public concern and should be the object of a Senate investigation.

Patti Patane joined the KGNC News Department in September of 1969. She formerly lived in Palm Springs, California, where she was raised and went to school. She is a graduate of Palm Springs High School and at-

tended Mount St. Mary's College in Los Angeles.

Patti is an accomplished journalist and photographer. She owned and operated a small publishing and advertising company in Palm Springs for seven years. She worked closely with the Palm Springs Police Department in drug and narcotics investigation—film she shot was used in their training program.

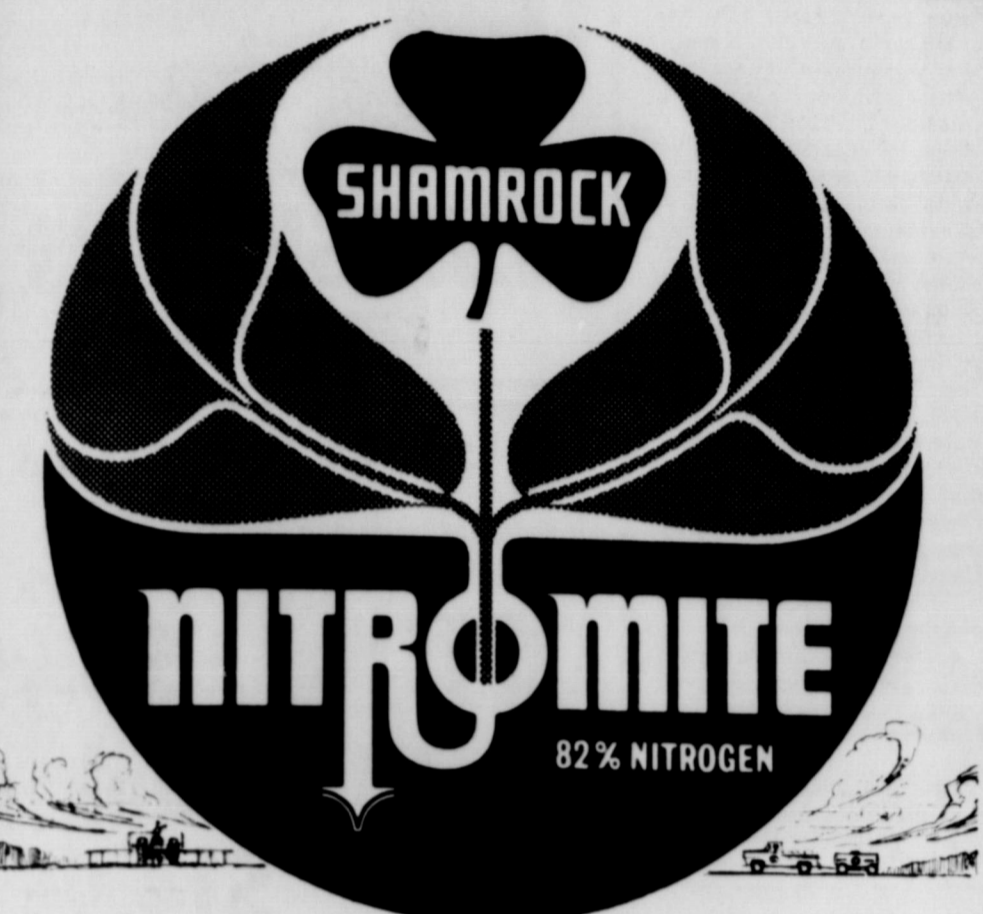

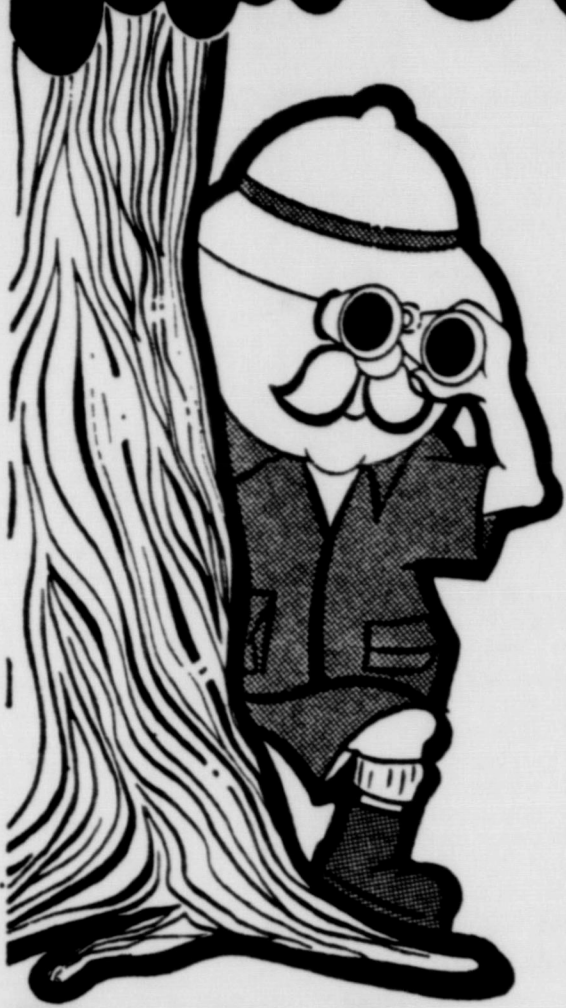

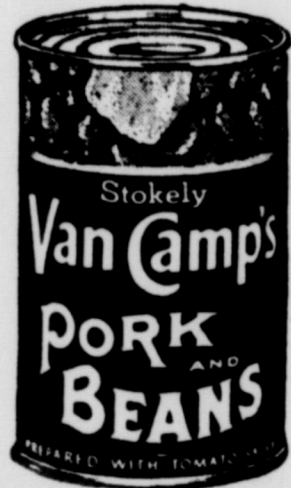
