

Patty Patane To Address Wheeler Students Friday tended Mount St. Mary's Col- from the Color 4 viewers.



lege in Los Angeles.





The five men tried in District Court in Wheeler last week were placed on Probation. The jury sentenced three of the men to five year terms and two of the men were given seven


year terms. Probation was recommended, as it was a first offense for all the young men.


