weight for every 2 pounds of feed. That compares with a pound of gain for every 51/2 pounds of grain fed to beef

SCS has published a new booklet on catfish farming which tells how to get a catfish farm going. High quality water, of course, is vital and it should be above 70 degrees at least 7 months each year. The booklet outlines methods for commercially producing and harvesting channel, white and blue catfish.

Brooks said a well-designed farm includes separate ponds for breeding, rearing and holding fish and at least one holding vat. Help in pond design and location is available for SCS offices. since there are several hazards to raising fish, producers should plan their operations carefully, he said.

Copies of the new catfish booklet are free at SCS offices.

Patrol Investigate 6 Rural Mishaps

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated six accidents on rural highways in Wheeler County during the month of February, according to Sergeant Dalrymple, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in two persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$6,425.00.

The rural accident summary for this county during the first two month of 1970 shows a total of 19 accidents resulting in 0 persons killed, seven persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$16,250.00.

Peaches and plums are beginning to bloom in the county and this is a critical time, so far as diseases control is concerned.

Chemical sprays must be applied at this time to prevent serious losses later in the year.

Initial sprays for the control of brown rot should be started at this time. This disease is characterized by a loss of blossoms and the rapid decay of fruit at harvest time. Wettable sulfur-6 tablespoons to a gallon of water or Captan-2 tablespoons to a gallon of water can be used to control this diease along with peach scab which occurs later in the year. The first spray should be applied when 75 percent of the petals have fallen after blooming. Other applications of the spray should be made at 14-21day intervals until harvest

Insect control is also important to effective control of fruit diseases. Because injury resulting from insect feeding serves as an excellent entrance for the different fruit rots.

Insect control information, along with other spray schedules are available from our office.

Inadequate feeding of beef cows during the winter will result in delayed conception and even reduced calf crops, according to Uel D. Thompsoh, Extension animal husbandman at Texas A & M University.

Thompson says that currently there is a shortage of sufficient quality and quantity to maintain cows and bulls in top breeding condition.

Unless the requirements for protein, energy, vitamins and minerals are met, there will be delayed conception and thus delayed calving. Under these conditions, producers are urged to consider using high-engery feeds,

such as grain sorghum. He added that hays with at least ten percent crude protein will satisfy the requirements if fed in sufficient amounts.

Thompson emphasized that the additional feeding should be continued until the new spring grass has sufficient strength to maintain the cattle. He warned that the first sign of spring grass is not an indication that supplemental feeding can be stop-






