

ORNADO HITS WHEELER AREA SATURDAY



Wheeler was one of many back of the pickup. Some of towns hit early Saturday morn Finsterwald in the Gageby ing at 2:30 A.M. by one of two tornadoes which traveled Lake. in parallel paths (southwest to northeast).

The storm which struck Wheeler area was traced, according to Dan True, KFDA Weatherman, from Vigo Park, northeast of Tulia, through Sherwood Shores at Clarendon and continued across Wheeler Co. to pass within

2 mile of the west Wheeler city limits. Damage to the Wheeler

area ranged from light to heavy. Hardest hit was M&M Gin. The office was unroofed, a fertilizer house was blown completely away and the

the west end of the gin was blown out.All the buildings and structures connected with the gin were destroyed with cotton trailers and tin scattered across the adiourning fields.

The Claude Franklins lost their belongings and trailer home. The Franklins were across the frive asleep in their son's home when the storm struck. Their son, Kenneth, talked them into soming over to the house to stay, just in case a storm came through.







TORNADO INFORMATION GIVEN

Where Tornadoes Can Occur: Any place in the United States at any time of the year. They happen most frequently in the midwestern, southern and central states from March through September. How Often Do They Occur: The records show that the average number of days with tornadoes varies from about 12 per year in parts of the Midwest to less than one per year in the Northeastern and far Western states. How To Recognize A Tornado: Usually observed as a funnel-shaped cloud, spinning rapidly, and extending toward the earth from the

from the base of a thundercloud. When close by, it sounds like the roar of hundreds of airplanes. Tornado "Weather": Hot. sticky days with southerly winds and a threatening, ominous sky. However, many such days occur without tornadoes. Clouds: Familiar thunderstorm clouds are present. An hour or two before a toma tions for disemination to do, top sy-turvy clouds appear thousands in the critical

sometimes bulging down instead of up. The clouds often have a greenish-black color. Precipitation: Rain, frequently hail, preceding the tornado, with a heavy downpour after it has passed. Time of Day: Mostly between 3 and 7 p.m., but they have occurred at all hours. Direction of Travel: In most cases they move from a westerly direction, usually from the southwest. Length of Path: Usually 10 to 40 miles (the average length is 16 miles), but they may move forward for 300 miles. Width of Path: The average width is about 400 yards,

but they have cut swaths over a mile in width. Speed of Traves: 25 to 40 miles per hour, but they have varied from 5 to 139 miles per hour. Wind Speed: Estimated as high as 500 miles per hour within the tornado. Causes of Destruction: (1) Viilent winds which uproot trees, destroy buildings, and create a serious hazard from objects blown through the air, (2) Differences in air pressure which can lift autolines if the tornado approaches the plant. Workers should be moved to sections of the plant offering the greatest protection.

6. Keep clam! It will not help to get excited. People have been killed by running out into streets and by turning back into the path of a tornado. Even though a warning is issued, chances of a tornado striking one's home or location are very slight. Tornadoes cover such a small zone, as a rule, that relatively only a few places in a warned area are directly affected. You should know about tornadoes though, "just in case".

7. Keep tuned to your local radio or television station for latest tornado advisory information. Do not call the weather bureau, except to report a tornado, as your individual request may tie up telephones lines urgently needed to receive special reports or tk relay advisories to radio and television stoarea.

Assume You Are Hit

Assuming YOU are the one with property damage, it's only natural that you will want necessary repairs to be made both quickly and properly and the TIAA advises how you can help:

Notify you insurance agent, telling him the extent of your damage. He will report the loss to your insurance company and hve an adjuster call on you.

Make whatever temporary repairs are necessary to prevent further damage by wind or rain. This should include boarding up or otherwise covering broken windows; covening holes in the roof and siding with temporary materials. Keep a record of the cost, if any, and provide the insurance adjuster with itemized bills.

For your own protection, deal with a reputable contractor in having temporary repairs made or obtaining a loss estimate. Let your insurance agent know where you will be if you must move into temporary quarters. If your policy covers additional living expenses, keep a record of those expenses for your adjuster. If possible, be prepared to provide the adjuster with an inventory of damaged personal property-furnishings, clothing, jewelry, etc. The TIAA notes that the public should keep in mind that each individual is only one of many who is effected by the storm damage-possibly one out of several thousands. The most urgent cases MUST get first attention. Cooperation on every individuals part will contribute to the insurance industry's prompt and fair settlement of storm claims and its efforts to rapidly return the affected community to normalcy.

obiles and can cause buildings to collapse. **Tornado Safety Rules**

1. There is no universal protection against tornadoes except caves or underground excavations. When time permits, go to a tornado cellar, cave, or underground excavation which should have an air outlet to help equalize the air pressure. It should be kept fit for use, free from water, gas, or debris; and preferably equipped with pick and shovel.

21 If you are in open country: (a) Move at right angles to the tornado's path. Tornadoes usually move ahead at about 25 to 40 miles per hour. (b) If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression such as a ditch or ravine.

3. If in a city or town: (a) Seek inside shelter, preferably in a strongly reinforced building. Stay away from windows! (b) In homes: The southwest corner of the basement usually offers greatest safety, particularly in frame houses. People in houses without basements should fine shelter, preferably in a storm cellar, although a depression, such as a ditch or ravine, can offer some protection. Doors and windows on the north and east sides of the house may be opened to help reduce damage to the building.

4. If in schools: (a) In city areas: if school building is strongly reinforced construction, stay insidek away from windows, remain near an inside wall on the lower floors when possible. Avoid auditoriums and gymnasiums with large, poorly-supported roofs! (b) In rural schools that so not have strongly reinforced construction, remove children and teachers to a ravine or ditch if storm shelter is not available.

5. If in factories and industrial plants: (a) On receiving a tomado warning, a lookout should be posted to keep safety officials advised of the tornado's approach. Advance preparation should be made for shutting off electrical circuits and fuel







An Incinerator is a machine that is much safer than burning boxes in a high wind I enjoyed visiting the food Store.






