



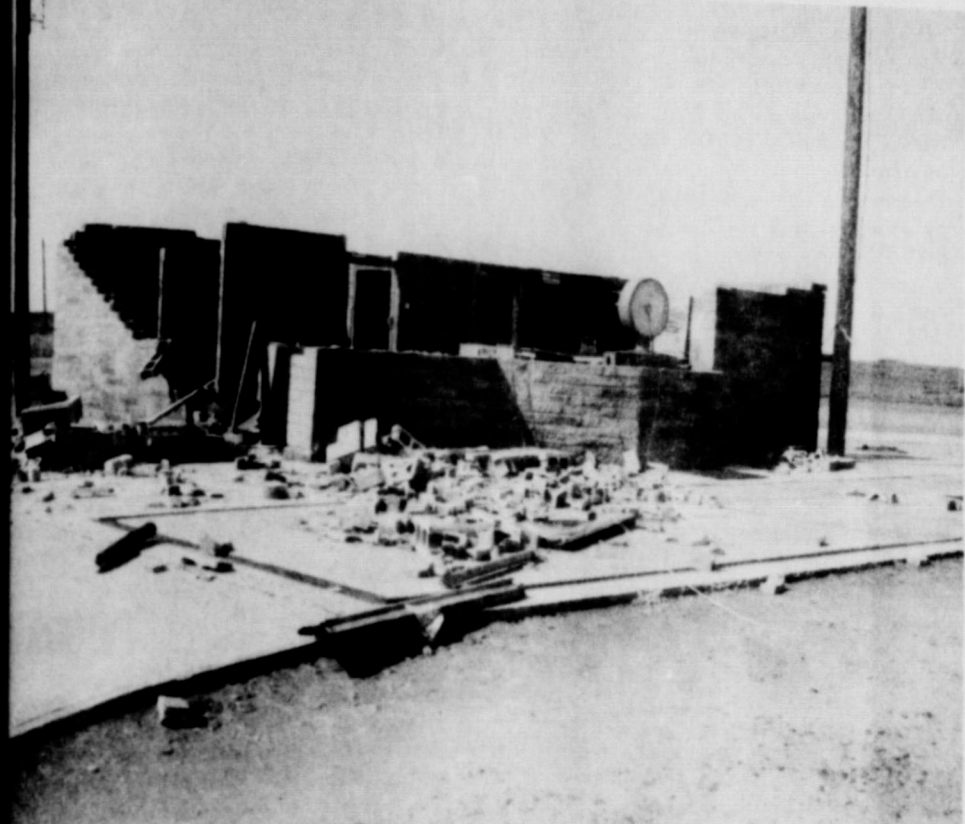

TORNADO HITS WHEELER AREA SATURDAY



Wheeler was one of many towns hit early Saturday morning at 2:30 A.M. by one of two tornadoes which traveled in parallel paths (southwest to northeast).

The storm which struck Wheeler area was traced, according to Dan True, KFDA Weatherman, from Vigo Park, northeast of Tullia, through Sherwood Shores at Clarendon and continued across Wheeler Co. to pass within 1/2 mile of the west Wheeler city limits.

Damage to the Wheeler area ranged from light to heavy. Hardest hit was M&M Gin. The office was unroofed, a fertilizer house was blown completely away and the

west end of the gin was blown out. All the buildings and structures connected with the gin were destroyed with cotton trailers and tin scattered across the adjoining fields.

The Claude Franklins lost their belongings and trailer home. The Franklins were across the drive asleep in their son's home when the storm struck. Their son, Kenneth, talked them into coming over to the house to stay, just in case a storm came through.

Several of the outbuildings were taken by the storm with the porch posts being loosened on the house and the TV antenna bent over.

Dr. W. Calvin Jones lost several buildings in the storm. One hay and cattle barn west of town was destroyed Dec. 22 with straight winds of 80 to 100 mph; it was rebuilt in January and partially destroyed in Saturday's storm. The front porch on one of Dr. Jones houses was torn from the house and dropped.

The storm took the corral, hay stacks and fences at the Dennis Porter home in the Magic City area. Other places in the same area received damage from the storm.

The Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department (team 1) was on duty the morning of the storm; but heavy rain, wind and lightning prevented the spotting of the storm and the warning of the Wheeler citizens. Roy and K. D. Ford each were watching the cloud from a fire department unit. As they went out toward Mobeetie, they saw the damage at the Gin; this was the first indication of the storm. They immediately began checking the farm homes in the area to see if any help was needed.

Spud Moore lost several out buildings and was not aware of the storm until the firemen woke them up.

Numerous items are being found over the county which were dropped from the clouds. The muddy fields and pastures have prevented removal of lot of the debris.

The Robert L. Martins of the Gageby Community, found two checks from Clarendon. One was found in the pasture and the other in their yard. The checks were signed by two different people, both of whom resided in the Sherwood Shores Storm.

The Martins, along with the Milton Finsterwalds, Thurmon Horns and Grady Dadds (all northwest of Wheeler) reported finding parts of trailer houses—aluminum, paneling, etc. One piece of paneling found by Thurmon Horn would not fit in the

back of the pickup. Some of Finsterwald in the Gageby Community near Finsterwald Lake.

Claude Barker found part of a church bulletin which had weathered the storm. The name of the Church was not on the bulletin, however; they knew some of the names on the bulletin to be from Plainview.

Each person has their own story to tell concerning the storm. Most of the citizens of Wheeler were asleep until the storm hit, with some of them waking up after it was too late to seek shelter.

No estimate of all the damage is available. Joe Rogers, officially reported 4.81 inches of rain.

George Weems reported Sweetwater Creek was the highest it had been since 1957.

Survivors were 7 sons, Armer of Wheeler, Bogin of Wheeler, Ben of Wheeler, Al of Wheeler, Alsey Jeff of Midvale, Utah, Tony Maxwell and Joe Bailey of Pampa, 3 daughters, Mrs. Tessie Clark of Wheeler, Mrs. Mamie Lovella Fisher of White Sulphur Springs, Mont. and Mrs. Sarah Ellen Laiselle of Salt Lake City, Utah, 2 sisters, 2 brothers, 9 grandchildren, 4 great grandchildren. She was preceded in death by her husband in 1940.

Funeral services were held in the Wheeler Church of Christ Friday, April 17, 1970, at 2:30 P.M. Minister Don Stone of the Fritch Church of Christ officiated. Burial services were in the Wheeler Cemetery under the direction of Wright Funeral Home.

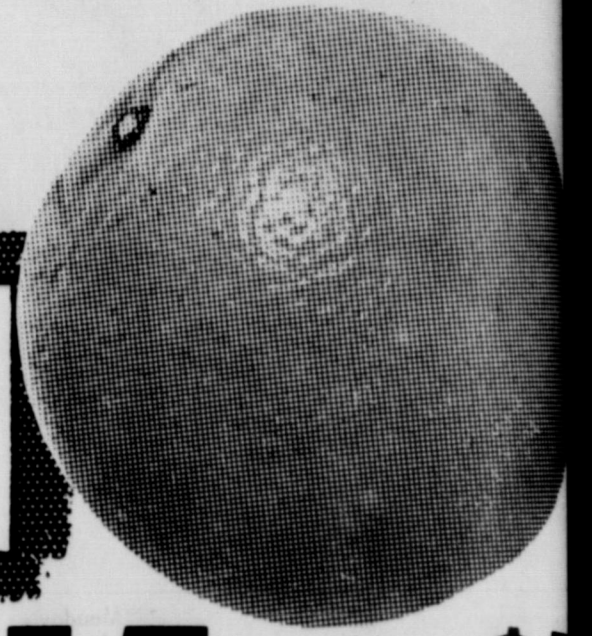

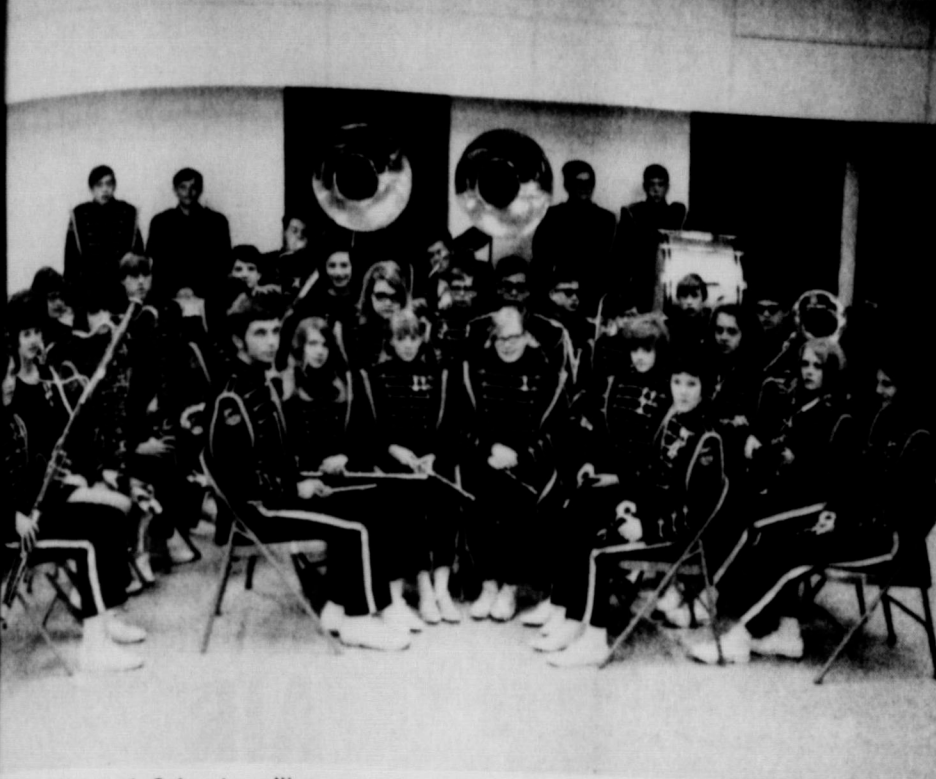

Production Credit Annual Meeting

Tornadoes which lashed the Panhandle Friday night cut sharply into attendance at the 36th annual meeting of stockholders of the Canadian Production Credit Association here Sat. morning.

Although 360 people did attend the meeting, a crowd of more than seven hundred had been expected.

The tornado which had swept through the east edge of Pampa during the early morning hours Saturday had another effect on the plans for the stockholders meeting in Canadian as it wiped out the barbecue dinner which the Pampa Shrine Club was preparing to serve to guests at the Canadian meeting Sat. noon.

In the emergency situation, PCA directors conferred quickly Saturday morning, and made arrangements with downtown restaurants to serve PCA stockholders and guests at the Association's expense. Nearly three hundred of the 360 members attending the meeting were served, but many others dispersed to their homes.

Gathering at the Canadian high school auditorium for the morning program and annual business session, the farmer-rancher members from the six-county northeast Panhandle area served by the association heard a major speech on the farm program by Congressman Bob Price, and brief remarks from former PCA President Erbin Crowell who is now vice-president of the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Houston.

They also heard a financial report from PCA President Larry Albin who reported that the Canadian Production Credit Association had made farm and ranch loans in 1969 totalling more than \$50 million.

Congressman Price reviewed the progress of farm legislation in the Congress this year, and painted a somewhat pessimistic picture of prospects for a new farm bill.

"As a result of urban migration and court-ordered redistricting," he warned the group, "power of the farm bloc in Congress has faded. A substantial number of Congressmen in both parties oppose farm legislation no matter what it provides or how much it costs."

"I want to see an effective farm program," Price declared, "and so does President Nixon."

"I've tried to convince Congress that farmers also are entitled to a cost-of-living increase," Price said. "I have called for a 6 per cent increase in supports, and have been told that my program doesn't stand a ghost of a chance."

The congressman also spoke on the situation in Vietnam, and outlined a militant plan for ending the war speedily.

PCA members re-elected H. H. Keahey of White Deer and Hugh F. Parsell of Roberts County to the board of directors; and elected John L. B. Johnson and Wilson W. Boyd of Gray Co. and J. T. Rogers and John Chesler of Roberts Co. to the nominating committee for three-year terms.

H. H. Keahey, Hugh F. Parsell, and Larry E. Albin were appointed to the Executive Committee of the Association.

The Canadian Production Credit Association serves farmer-rancher stockholders members in Ochiltree, Lipscomb, Roberts, Hemphill, Wheeler and Gray Counties.

TORNADO INFORMATION GIVEN

Where Tornadoes Can Occur: Any place in the United States at any time of the year. They happen most frequently in the midwestern, southern and central states from March through September.

How Often Do They Occur: The records show that the average number of days with tornadoes varies from about 12 per year in parts of the Midwest to less than one per year in the Northeastern and far Western states.

How To Recognize A Tornado: Usually observed as a funnel-shaped cloud, spinning rapidly, and extending toward the earth from the base of a thundercloud. When close by, it sounds like the roar of hundreds of airplanes.

Tornado "Weather": Hot, sticky days with southerly winds and a threatening, ominous sky. However, many such days occur without tornadoes.

Clouds: Familiar thunderstorm clouds are present. An hour or two before a tornado, topsy-turvy clouds appear sometimes bulging down instead of up. The clouds often have a greenish-black color.

Precipitation: Rain, frequently hail, preceding the tornado, with a heavy downpour after it has passed.

Time of Day: Mostly between 3 and 7 p.m., but they have occurred at all hours.

Direction of Travel: In most cases they move from a westerly direction, usually from the southwest.

Length of Path: Usually 10 to 40 miles (the average length is 16 miles), but they may move forward for 300 miles.

Width of Path: The average width is about 400 yards, but they have cut swaths over a mile in width.

Speed of Traves: 25 to 40 miles per hour, but they have varied from 5 to 139 miles per hour.

Wind Speed: Estimated as high as 500 miles per hour within the tornado.

Causes of Destruction: (1) Violent winds which uproot trees, destroy buildings, and create a serious hazard from objects blown through the air, (2) Differences in air pressure which can lift automobiles and can cause buildings to collapse.

Tornado Safety Rules

1. There is no universal protection against tornadoes except caves or underground excavations. When time permits, go to a tornado cellar, cave, or underground excavation which should have an air outlet to help equalize the air pressure. It should be kept fit for use, free from water, gas, or debris; and preferably equipped with pick and shovel.
2. If you are in open country: (a) Move at right angles to the tornado's path. Tornadoes usually move ahead at about 25 to 40 miles per hour. (b) If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression such as a ditch or ravine.
3. If in a city or town: (a) Seek inside shelter, preferably in a strongly reinforced building. Stay away from windows! (b) In homes: The southwest corner of the basement usually offers greatest safety, particularly in frame houses. People in houses without basements should find shelter, preferably in a storm cellar, although a depression, such as a ditch or ravine, can offer some protection. Doors and windows on the north and east sides of the house may be opened to help reduce damage to the building.
4. If in schools: (a) In city areas: if school building is strongly reinforced construction, stay inside away from windows, remain near an inside wall on the lower floors when possible. Avoid auditoriums and gymnasiums with large, poorly supported roofs! (b) In rural schools that do not have strongly reinforced construction, remove children and teachers to a ravine or ditch if storm shelter is not available.
5. If in factories and industrial plants: (a) On receiving a tornado warning, a lookout should be posted to keep safety officials advised of the tornado's approach. Advance preparation should be made for shutting off electrical circuits and fuel

lines if the tornado approaches the plant. Workers should be moved to sections of the plant offering the greatest protection.

6. Keep clam! It will not help to get excited. People have been killed by running out into streets and by turning back into the path of a tornado. Even though a warning is issued, chances of a tornado striking one's home or location are very slight. Tornadoes cover such a small zone, as a rule, that relatively only a few places in a warned area are directly affected. You should know about tornadoes though, "just in case".

7. Keep tuned to your local radio or television station for latest tornado advisory information. Do not call the weather bureau, except to report a tornado, as your individual request may tie up telephones lines urgently needed to receive special reports or relay advisories to radio and television stations for dissemination to thousands in the critical area.

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Assume You Are Hit

Assuming YOU are the one with property damage, it's only natural that you will want necessary repairs to be made both quickly and properly and the TIAA advises how you can help: Notify your insurance agent, telling him the extent of your damage. He will report the loss to your insurance company and have an adjuster call on you. Make whatever temporary repairs are necessary to prevent further damage by wind or rain. This should include boarding up or otherwise covering broken windows; covering holes in the roof and siding with temporary materials. Keep a record of the cost, if any, and provide the insurance adjuster with itemized bills. For your own protection, deal with a reputable contractor in having temporary repairs made or obtaining a loss estimate. Let your insurance agent know where you will be if you must move into temporary quarters. If your policy covers additional living expenses, keep a record of those expenses for your adjuster. If possible, be prepared to provide the adjuster with an inventory of damaged personal property—furnishings, clothing, jewelry, etc. The TIAA notes that the public should keep in mind that each individual is only one of many who is effected by the storm damage—possibly one out of several thousands. The most urgent cases MUST get first attention. Cooperation on every individual's part will contribute to the insurance industry's prompt and fair settlement of storm claims and its efforts to rapidly return the affected community to normalcy.

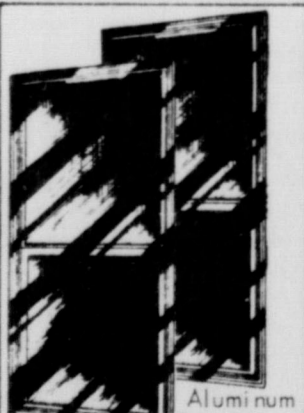



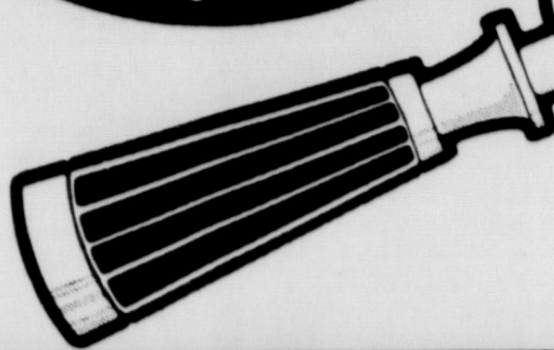
