The Panhandle Regional Planning Commission has hired the services of Mr. Robert Ashworth as Executive Director of PRPC. Mr. Clark is a former member of Amarillo and is currently employed as Assistant City Manager of Water, Okla. where he served in that capacity from July of 1968. Pampa Optimists To Give Coffee

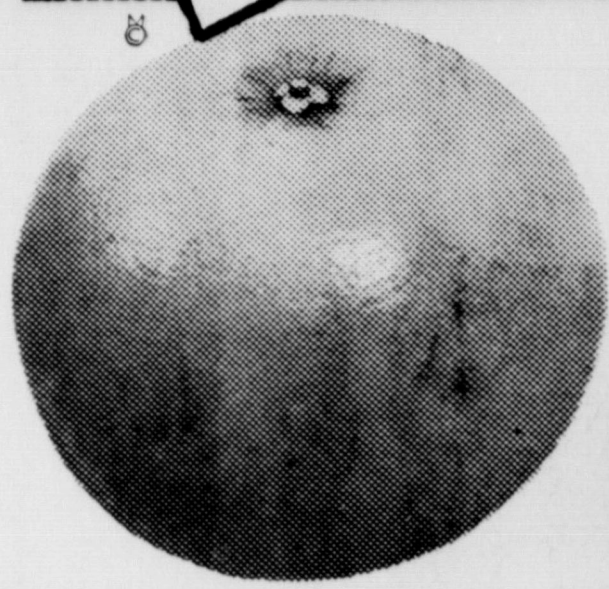

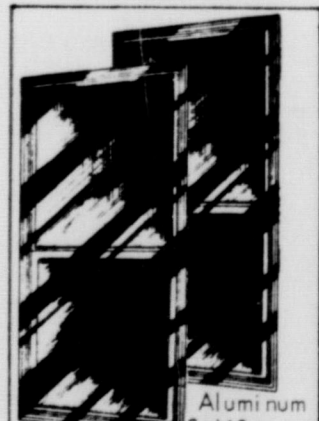

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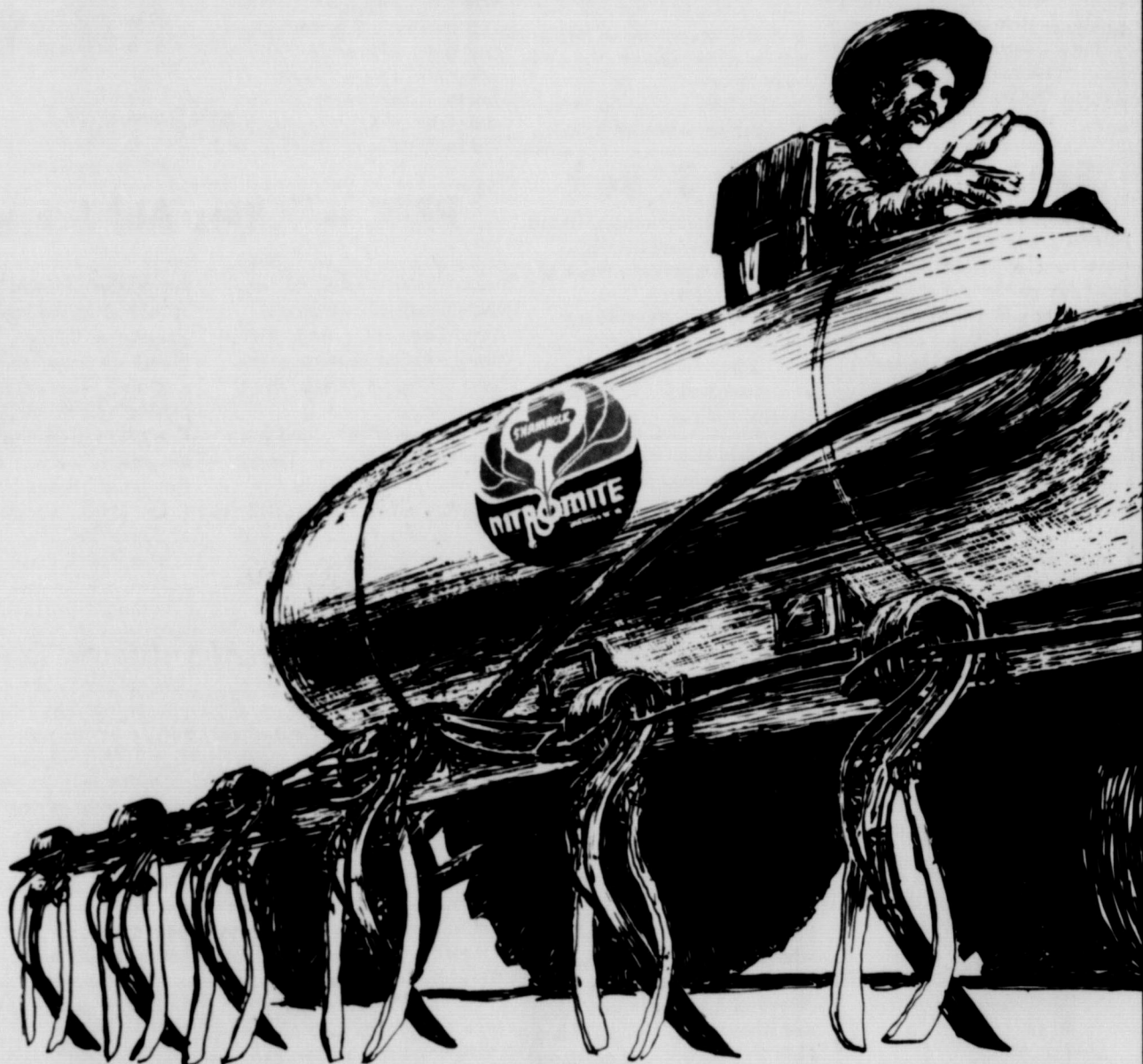

Across the Fence

Strong gusty winds last week took their toll of top soil. Those who are thin enough to need ballast should keep bricks in their pockets so they won't blow away according to an acquaintance of ours.

Had an opportunity last week to attend the first Weeping Lovegrass Symposium at Ardmore, Oklahoma with James Reneau. The discussions, narrated by some who had as many as 30 years of experience, indicated that we were sitting on top of a gold mine if we could learn the 8 keys to profit.

The first key to clean up the old growth by mowing or clean up grazing with steers fed extra protein. You may burn it off, however this is detrimental if done every year.

The second key to profit is to Fertilize with nitrogen in split applications. Apply 30 lb. actual nitrogen on about April 1, June 1 and August 1 if soil moisture is adequate. Research done here last year and published in our demonstration handbook also indicated this same principle.

Let spring growth get 6" tall before grazing is the third key. Rotational grazing at 40 day intervals grazing for 1 week and resting for gets top utilization. The studies last year indicated that top protein values were at 6 to 8 weeks after fertilization of grazed or mowed over forage.

The fifth key is to leave a 4" stubble when mowing or

grazing to allow rapid regrowth and to keep the plant vigor high.

Controlling spot grazing by flash grazing with about 12 steers per acre for 1 week, then rotate. To insure that they eat this portion of the field, spot fertilize, spot mow and locate shade, water and rubbing posts to distribute grazing. Our research work here indicates that a sickle mower does less damage than a conventional brush hog or stalk cutter. A windrow would be ideal.

An example of the encouraging titles were "What We Did to Get 495 Pounds of Beef Per Acre on Weeping Love Grass" and "Over 200 Cow Units on 480 Acres of Weeping Lovegrass." The man who did this lives at Cheyenne, Oklahoma and spoke at a farm meeting at

PRPC — "Cities Aid Scheme"

Smaller cities and communities in Texas, no less than metropolitan areas, have been struggling with problems too numerous and demanding for simple local solutions.

They need help, and help may be found in the Texas Communities Tomorrow program which was explained Wed. to about 300 city and county officials and civic leaders attending an all-day conference on the WTSU campus.

Sponsored by the City of Canyon and the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, the program, limited to cities with populations of under 12,000 was presented by heads or representatives of several state offices.

Gov. Preston Smith, who opened the morning program, said the program was developed several years ago during a meeting of leaders of small cities at Kerrville.

"In my 19 years experience around the Capitol, we recognized the citizens of Texas came to Austin on an almost endless variety of missions," said the governor. "They do not always know exactly who to see and where to go. The tendency, under those circumstances is to come to the governor's office."

"Unless the governor's office was prepared to receive them, unless someone was always available to see them, talk with them and either help or advise them or at least direct them, it would be a rather frustrating experience all around," he said.

As a minimum service, he said the governor or one of his staff should hear the problem and if unable to answer the questions, direct them to the best source in state government.

Gov. Smith said he has a strong conviction that state government does have many answers to give and many services to render that are not being fully realized.

He listed the following services which can be rendered by the governor's office.

* Providing a knowledgeable "listening post."

* Securing cooperation of state agencies so that a plan of action can be mapped out.

* Informing as many people as possible of the arrangements.

* Working out a two-way system of communication between the state and the community.

* Maintaining a coordinating unit in the governor's office.

"It matters not if a person lives in a small town, a

large city or in the country, the governor said. "Each is entitled to the best possible governmental service on problems of water supply, waste disposal, law enforcement, public health, education, fire protection, housing, employment, welfare and pollution of all types."

Dr. D. E. Hackley, mayor of Spearman, and a member of the PRPC executive committee, described the regional planning organization in a luncheon speech.

He pointed out that state law prohibits the PRPC from exercising any legislative, police or taxing powers and that PRPC has been created solely to help in planning to meet needs of the region.

The PRPC was organized Sept. 18, 1969, in Canyon and the cities of Canyon and Amarillo and Potter and Randall counties and has since grown to 16 members.

"I encourage and appeal to you to study the PRPC and its merits and join in planning for progress in the Panhandle," Dr. Hackley said. "We need your help."

A brief question and answer session followed Hackley's talk.

Asked what is being done to combat future health problems in Texas cities, Jim Wilson of Amarillo, district supervisor of the Texas Water Quality Control Board, said a public hearing on health is being planned in Amarillo.

"We haven't set a date for a place for the meeting," Wilson said. "But we do want to get together with the public soon so we can prevent health problems before they get started."

Boswell said the answer to another question that should be diverted to High Plains, individual communities will be required to share the cost.

"The present plan of state expenses exists solely to assure that all obligations incurred by such a project are met," Boswell said.

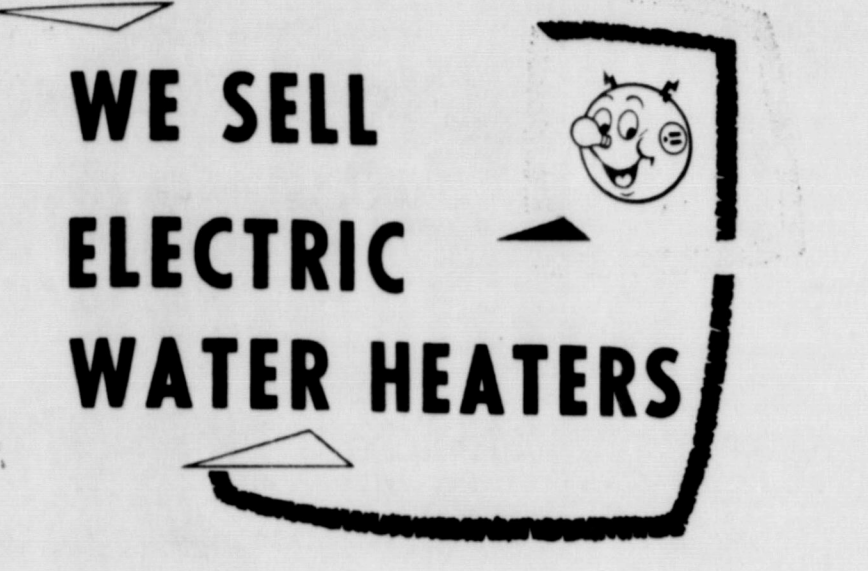
Annual 4-H Spring Party

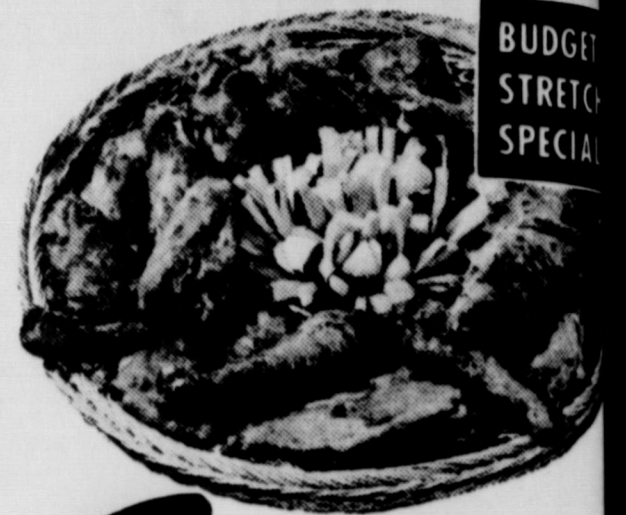

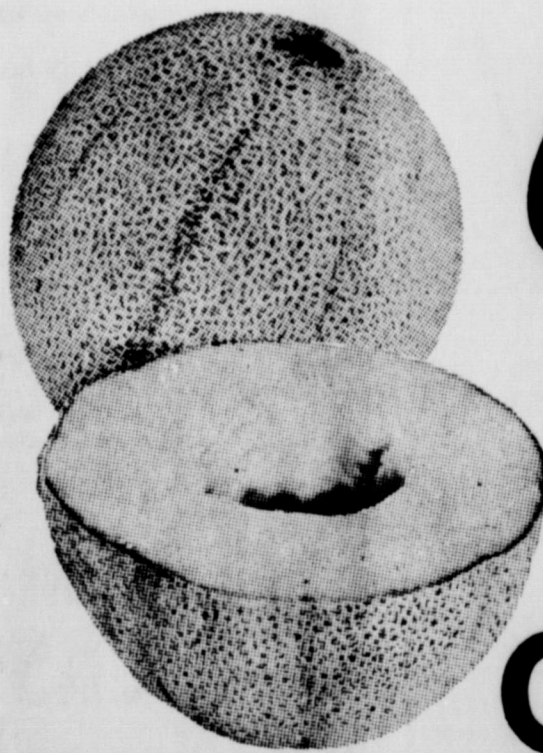
