## Population Down In Wheeler Co

The population of Wheeler County decreased 1,722 during the past decade, according to preliminary figures released last week end by R. L. Burler, district manager for the Amarillo office of the U. S. Census Bureau.

The preliminary report shows that Wheeler County currently had 6,225 residents. This compares with the official count of 7,947 when the last census was conducted in 1960.

Only eight of the 30 counties coming under the Amarillo census district showed population increase. An overall decrease in the district of 359,294 is revealed in the 1970 tabulations.

All counties in this area suffered losses: Collingsworth County decreased 1,326—from 6,276 to 4,950; Hall County, 1,443 from 7,322 to 5,879; Childress, 1,940—from 8,421 to 6,481; Donley, 917 from 4,449 to 3,532; Hemphill, 153—from 3,185 to 3,032; Ochiltree, 390—from 9,380 to 8,990; and Roberts, 125—from 1,075 to 950.

The Census Bureau will commence in the fall of 1970 to publish official population figures for all areas in the United States by states, counties, cities, towns and villages.

"I want to express my own and the Census Bureau's thanks to the residents of the area, to officials, the newspapers, and the broadcasting stations for their cooperation in taking the 1970 census," Butler said.

## Wheeler Municipal Historical Society Meets

The regular meeting of the Wheeler County Historical Society was held Monday, May 25, 1970, at 8:00 in the District Courtroom in Wheeler with Mrs. Beverly Whittle, County Chairman presiding.

Mrs. Claude Montgomery, Shamrock was elected Vice-Chairman with Mrs. Frank Walker, Jr. named Secretary and Raymond Burks was re-elected as Treasurer.

Mr. N. L. (Shorty) Sechrist presented a very interesting and informative program consisting of an exhibit of bottles and artifacts found at Ft. Elliott located near Old Mobeetie. The Fort was established in 1874 and abandoned around 1884. He also exhibited a few bottles found at the old "Rain Town Saloon" that was on the road from Ft. Elliott to Dage City, Kansas. Some Indian artifacts found in the area were also included. Bottles shown included Dr. Doane's and Dr. Hostetter's Bitters, wine, beer, champagne and whiskey bottles including a rare 'pumpkin seed flask; ink bottles including some 16 different types of both bulk and ink wells, canning jars, medicine bottles, valentine's meat juice, perfume from Paris, St. Jackob's Oel, and many others. This was just a small sampling of the bottles dug by Mr. Sechrist.

Other items shown included a basket-weave milk glass egg cup, coins and tokens, pipes, decorations used on the soldier's uniforms such as eagles and crossed rifles and sabers, belt buckles, buttons and pins, an insulator and piece of wire from the old telegraph line and a small Deringer gun, ammunition, china doll heads, cork screws, shoe button, hooks and bits.
