Proposed were the following specific changes in the United Nations: IS THIS WHAT WE WANT? Universal membership of every independent state including Red China. 2 Worldwide disarmament. 4. Abolition of the veto power of the Security Council. 3. An international police force. 5. Popular election of General Assembly representatives. 6. A United Nations nuclear authority. 8. Compulsory jurisdiction of all disputes vested in the Inter-national Court of Justice. 9. A world development program to foster economic and social advancement of nations in need of it. 11. A charter provision that all powers not granted to the United Nations be reserved to the member nations. 12. A clause in the Charter recognizing that the authority of the United Nations would extend to all nations. Though he characterized the list of innovations as desirable Though he characterized the list of innovations as desirable and praiseworthy, he questioned whether the political reality of immediate international politics would permit them to be adopted. If the political reality of the time precludes the adoption of these innovations, Sherman questioned whether the United Nations could bring "peace in our time?" The twenty-two page dissertation, generously interlaced with footnotes, develops Mr. Sherman's view of the United Nations in its role as a keeper of the peace.
