## County Social Security Benefits

Social security benefits paid to residents of Wheeler County totaled \$109,000 a month as 1969 ended, Travis Briggs, social security district manager, reported today. A benefit increase, signed by President Nixon on December 30, 1969, has raised the monthly rate of payment by 15 percent for 1,473 social security beneficiaries in Wheeler County, Briggs noted.

Of the social security beneficiaries living in Wheeler County, 1,059 are retired workers and their dependents. Another 290 are receiving benefits as the survivors of workers who have died, and are getting benefits as disabled workers or the dependents of disabled workers. Briggs pointed out that although the majority of social security beneficiaries are old people, about one out of every four is under age 60.

In the State of Texas, 321 people under age 60 are getting social security payments each month. The 186 who are under 18 are receiving payments because a living father or mother has a disability or retirement benefits.

Of the 30,272 who are 18 through 21 years of age, most getting students' benefits are a provision which permits the continuation of a child's benefits past his or her 18th birthday, and up to 22 if the child is attending school full time.

Of the 18 to 22 age group are some other types of beneficiaries, illustrating the broad family protection that is provided working people of all ages under the social security program.

A number are the children of retired, disabled, or deceased workers who became disabled before they reached age 18 and who will probably never be able to go to work and become self supporting. Benefits of these young people, severely handicapped physically or mentally, will continue indefinitely and benefit are also payable to their mothers if the disabled son or daughter is in the mother's care.

Another small but significant group of youthful social security beneficiaries are those who are receiving social security benefits as disabled workers. Under a 1967 change in the law, disability benefits can be paid to a person who becomes disabled even if he has less than five years of work under social security. As little as a year and a half is required in the case of a worker who becomes disabled before age 24.

## PARACHUTE MEET PLANNED AT PAMPA, GIRLSTOWN BENEFIT

An invitational parachute meet is being planned for July 18-19 at Perry Lefors Field in Pampa, Texas, in behalf of Girlstown, USA, of Borger, Texas. This two-day meet is being sponsored by friends of Girlstown in cooperation with various civic organizations throughout a four-state area.

Sky-diving clubs from as far away as Orange, Massachusetts, and Colorado Springs, Colorado, have been invited to participate in this event, and more than one hundred sky-divers are expected to be present. A total of \$1000.00 in prize money and twenty-six trophies will be awarded in the two-day meet.

Two objectives will be served by this activity: one to acquaint more people in the Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, and Kansas area with the work being accomplished at Girlstown in Borger, and, secondly, to offer any financial assistance to be gained from the meet to further the work at Girlstown.

Advance tickets are now being distributed to civic organizations in the four-state area to be sold at \$1.00 per adult and 75c per student. During the parachute meet they may be purchased at the gate for \$1.50 per adult and \$1.00 per student.

# WERE YOU COUNTED

Wheeler and Wheeler Co. Citizens who feel they were not counted in the 1970 Census are being asked to pick up forms at the City Office in Wheeler, fill out the forms and return them to the address indicated at the bottom of the form.

In a letter to Mayor Pete Burton, Percy R. Millard, Regional Director for the Bureau of the Census, stated: "The 1970 Census enumeration of your community, as well as the rest of the State, was recently completed. For this census, the systems and methods are more comprehensive than ever before in our history. To ensure the accuracy of the results, the enumeration process has numerous built-in reviews and checks. One of the final steps in the process was a 'Were You Counted?' campaign... 'Nevertheless there may

be some individuals or families who have expressed doubt that they were included in the census. If you know of such persons have them fill out one of the enclosed census forms and mail it to the address indicated.

"Tabulation of the official population counts is now under way. In order for this work to proceed on scheduled filled-in 'Were You Counted?' forms must be received as soon as possible. Local efforts in this matter should, therefore, be completed within two weeks from receipt of this letter."

Mayor Burton urges local citizens to obtain these forms if they feel they were missed by the recent census count. The forms are available at the City Office, 505 S. Shamrock.

## PARKVIEW WITHDRAWS FROM RED CROSS WICHITA REGIONAL BLOOD BANK

Mrs. Roberta Adams, chairman of the local Red Cross Chapter notified the "Times" this week of the discontinued affiliation of Parkview Hospital with Wichita Regional Blood Bank of the American Red Cross.

Blood used at the hospital will now come from Coffee Memorial Blood Center of Amarillo. This means patients at the Wheeler hospital no longer have a reciprocal agreement with the Red Cross Blood Bank and can not receive blood at blood bank charge. In the past, patients could make blood donations either at Wheeler or their respective home to replace blood used from the Blood Bank.

The reason for the change

was given as cost and delivery of blood. The supply point for a time was Shamrock; it was later changed to Canadian. Canadian no longer keeps a supply point and blood needed at Parkview had to come from Wichita, Kansas to Canadian by train; the hospital had to go to Canadian to pick up the blood and was required to return unused blood to Wichita. Delivery of blood to Parkview from Wichita has been known to take two days.

With the change to the Amarillo Center, Parkview Hospital will be able to receive blood in a matter of hours by bus to Wheeler and in case of emergency the blood can be sent by patrol from Amarillo.

The change will leave the charge per unit of blood approximately the same. In the past, the local Red Cross Chapter was charged \$300 per year, the chapter was required to host the Blood Mobile and the hospital was charged for each unit of blood used.

## Savings Bond Sales For May

During May there were new purchases of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds amounting to \$9,273 according to County Bond Chairman R. J. Holt. Sales for the first five months totaled \$70,350—32 percent of the 1970 goal of \$220,000.

Texas Sales during the month were \$14,528,581 compared to \$14,994,457 during May of 1969. Year-to-date sales totaled \$77,112,605 for 43 percent of the 1970 goal of \$179.9 million.

New purchases of E and H Savings Bonds and Freedom Shares over the nation during May amounted to \$385 million, while sales for the first five months of 1970 were \$2.0 billion—0.8 percent below a year earlier. Exchange of Series E for Series H Bonds amounting to \$101 million were reported for the first five months—a 30 percent increase over the \$78 million exchanged in 1969.

## Ten Accidents Are Investigated

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 10 accidents on rural highways in Wheeler Co. during the month of May, according to Sergeant J. D. Dalrymple, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one persons killed, eight persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$13,420.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first five months of 1970 shows a total of 42 accidents resulting in one persons killed, 22 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$42,895.00.

During the next three months millions of motorists will be heading for the road on vacations and outings. According to past facts and figures this will be the most deadly consecutive three months of the year.

During 1969 in Texas 996 persons were killed in traffic accidents during the summer vacation period. The Sergeant stated, "This should be a challenge for all drivers and pedestrians not to be a fatality this summer."
