JUNIOR RODEO IS ADDED TO ANNUAL WHEELER RODEO

The 15th Annual Wheeler Rodeo is scheduled to begin with a Junior Rodeo slated for Wednesday, July 15. Thursday evening will be the first performance of the annual rodeo slated for Thursday, Friday and Saturday, July 16-17-18. Performances each evening will begin at 8:00.

Kicking off the three nights of riding, roping and steer wrestling will be the parade Thursday afternoon at 4:00. The parade will be followed by the free barbecue at 6:00 at the rodeo grounds.

Everyone attending the Thursday evening performance of the Rodeo will be served free barbecue donated

and prepared by Wheeler merchants, individuals and riding club members.

JUNIOR RODEO

Contestants in the Junior Rodeo must be 18 or under as of July 15. The bull riding will be divided in two groups with boys, 14 and under, in one group and boys, ages 15-18, in a second group.

Six events are slated for the Junior Rodeo. First out of the chute will be the Bare Back Bronc Riding; this will be limited to the first 20 contestants to enter. The bronc riders will be followed by Bull Roping and the popular Barrel Race. For those 10 and under, the Calf Scramble

is scheduled. Both groups of Bull Riding will close the Junior Rodeo.

Each group in the bull riding will be limited to the first 15 to enter.

A notarized permit, signed by each parent, will be required before any minor can participate in the rodeos.

Farmers Supply will be the headquarters for the Rodeo. Anyone wishing to pick up an entry form may do so by contacting Gerald Johnson at 826-5297 or Fat Jones at 826-3214.

Six events will be featured at the main rodeo, Thursday, Friday and Saturday. The events will be Bareback Bronc Riding, Calf Roping, Girls Barrel Race, Bull Dogging, Bull Riding and Heading and Healing.

Heading and Healing will be one go-round. The entry fee for Bronc Riding, Calf Roping, and Senior Bull Riding will be \$10. The entry fee for the Barrel Race and Junior Boys Bull Riding will be \$5. There will be no entry fee for the Calf Scramble.

CATES WINS REP. RACE

Phillip R. Cates has been declared the winner of the June 6 Second Democratic Primary. Cates was named the winner by the first count but the June 18 run-off showed his opponent Ray Trosper the winner. With the completion of the recount Monday, July 6, Cates was declared the Democratic nomination for the office of State Representative in the 79th district. The June 6 mixup was credited to a telephone conversation which reversed the election returns in Hemphill

County Precinct 3. This error was discovered on June 18 and Trosper showed to be the winner.

Cates ask the Democratic Executive Committee for a retally of all ballots in the seven counties.

The count in Wheeler County showed Cates to have five more votes than had previously been counted. Trosper lost 11 votes in the Wheeler retally.

The final tally for Cates is 2,709 votes with Trosper 2,706 votes.

Scattered stands of cotton and milo need that rain we never got. Folks with irrigation wells are mighty proud they've got em J this year. Darville Atherton who irrigates west of Wheeler has been keeping things going as far as alfalfa cutting goes and Midland Bermuda grass. We've got a desert grass to recommend to you - it's Ermelo Weeping Lovegrass. Those heifer calves we've

been grazing on it gained 2.1 pounds per day in June. This test has been in connection with our grazing study research. The results have been encouraging enough that Progressive Farmer Magazine indicated an interest in the data obtained.

ABRAHAM IS NAMED TO TEXAS ELECTION CODE COMMITTEE

Rep. Malouf Abraham of Canadian left for Houston today to attend a public hearing Friday of the Texas Election Code Committee. He is one of 5 members appointed by House Speaker Mutscher to study election laws and submit needed changes to the next Session of the Legislature. This interim committee will hold a series of meetings over the State to hear suggestions for changes in the present law.

First Place winners in the Performance events were: Poles-Judy Parker, Barrel-Shonda Johnson, Horsemanship and Western Pleasure-Tanya Dunn, and Reining-Bo Dunn.

Gardening Conservation Leaflet Available

Gardening and conservation is the subject of a new USDA leaflet written by the Soil Conservation Service.

District Conservationist Bill Brooks of the Wheeler SCS office, said the 8-fold leaflet, titled "Gardening on the Contour," outlines ways to control erosion in a backyard garden. It tells, for example, how rows can be laid out on the contour using a carpenter's level mounted on a 2 by 4. The leaflet also explains how rainwater which drains from a neighbor's property might be diverted away from your garden.

Abraham is a strong advocate for moving the primary elections back to August with run-offs in September prior to the General Election in November. He stated that people get tired of hearing politicians all year long. Presently it is necessary to file the first part of February which is 9 months before the general election. A shorter election period would also cut down on campaign expenses. Anyone having suggestions for changes is urged to inform Rep. Abraham.

"Some of our gardeners are excellent conservationists," Brooks said. "Many use mulches on the soil surface to help reduce erosion and to improve soil fertility similar to the way conservation farmers use crop residues. A few local gardeners compost their grass clippings and tree leaves for this purpose. Others use hay, straw, cottonseed hulls or peat moss. Preventing erosion in a garden is just as important to a gardener as it is to any other land user," the conservationist pointed out. Brooks said copies of the new leaflet are available free at his office at 112 W Oklahoma St. in Wheeler, Telephone number 826-3115.

Man of Year in Texas Agriculture - Noticed where my old friend Jack Dillard had been selected as Man of the Year by the Texas County Agricultural Agents Association. Self-treatment for cattle - New Mexico researchers say that beef and dairy cattle can treat themselves against warri some flies by walking between burlap sacks loaded with approved insecticides such as 3 percent Ciodrin or 1 percent coumaphos. For beef cattle, good locations are gateways leading to water, salt, and resting areas. They work here too. At Wheeler, only one heifer has hom flies on her back out of 10 at our research site.

Polled Hereford Clinic - The American and Texas Polled Hereford Associations will cooperate with Texas A&M University to conduct the seventh annual National Polled Hereford Pattern for Progress Clinic July 9 and 10 in College Station. Theme of the session is "Breeding Power-Key to Profits in the 1970's." Wallace Fields and El B. Range, Jr., Shamrock are attending from our county.
