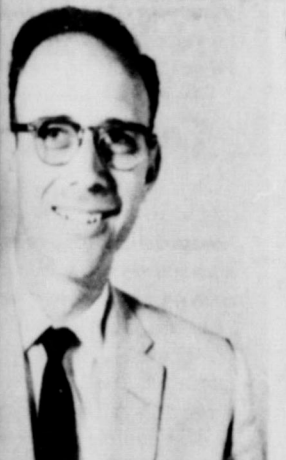

BRENDA McCASLAND TAKES 4-H TALENT TOUR

A Wheeler County 4-H member, Brenda McCasland, will be among the 16 Texas and six out-of-state 4-H Club members on the annual Texas 4-H Talent Tour scheduled for July 26 - August 3. The 22 youngsters have been initiated into the exclusive Talent Club, sponsored annually by the Producers Grain Corporation of Amarillo. The honorees come from various districts of P.G.C. and were chosen for their leadership, citizenship and achievement in 4-H Club work. In the Club's 28-year history, only about 900 members have been initiated into its ranks.

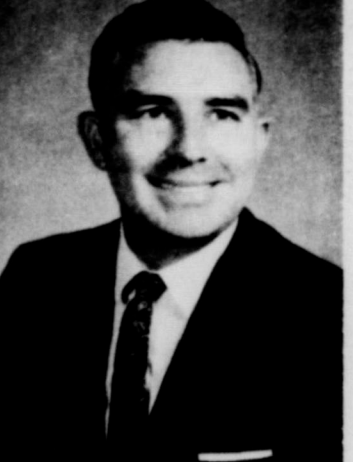
HOLT ANNOUNCES OFFER TO SELL INTEREST

Savings Bonds Sales For June

During June there were new purchases of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds amounting to \$9,266,000 according to Wheeler County Chairman, R. J. Holt. Sales for the first five months totaled \$79,556,000 or 36% of the 1970 goal of \$220,000,000. Texas sales during the month were \$13,658,647 compared to \$11,549,134 during June of 1969, a rise of 18%. Year to date sales totaled \$90,771,252 for 50% of the 1970 goal of \$179.9 million. New purchases of E and H Savings Bonds and Freedom Shares over the nation during June amounted to \$465 million - a 25-year peak - while sales for the first six months of 1970 were \$2,514 million, 1% above 1969. Exchanges of Series E for Series H Bonds amounting to \$123 million were reported for the first six months which represents a 31% increase over exchanges through June 1969. As of June 30, 1970, \$52.0 billion in United States Savings Bonds were outstanding which is 23% of the privately held portion of the public debt.

Across the Fence

Just when the drought seemed to have the furrer and rancher down on his knees and taking a long count, we got a break in the weather. Things get pretty serious when our leading industry agriculture is in trouble. Some areas get as much as an inch and a half, while others get little more than a half inch. As one man said, "It seemed like a lot more though," cause it's been so long. However, the drought is still on and our cattle herds continue to drift to the auction rings. Now, incidentally, is a good time to reduce herds by removing low and non-producers. Along with good prices, culling and selecting improves the genetic capability of the herd and leaves more forage for those that are left. Reducing the grazing pressure now will conserve forage for the winter months.

Fire season is here. About 20,000 acres were burned up near Vemon a few weeks ago. Preventing fires now is very important because the grass and brush is very dry.

Grazing Management
Four major considerations in management of grazing are: (1) Graze each pasture as uniformly as possible, (2) Graze with proper kind of livestock, (3) Graze with the proper number of animals, and (4) Graze each pasture at a proper season of the year.

Our grazing study test site south of Wheeler on Hwy 83 stresses these four major considerations. A July 15 weighing showed average daily gains of over 3 pounds a day the past two weeks on the heifer calves out there. This exceptional performance in July is somewhat contradictory to Oklahoma data indicating that "Performance tapers off to a usual low during July to August as typical hot dry summer weather induces semi-dormancy or grass nears a maturing stage." Based on only one year's data, it's going to be hard for us to say outright that there's not a dormant period but we can say that indications are that properly managed weeping lovegrass does not quit performing in July.

The District 4-H Horse Show will begin at 8:00 this Friday, July 24. Seven Wheeler County 4-H members will compete.

A very small worm-like parasite, commonly known as root knot nematode, is playing havoc with peach trees in some county orchards. Symptoms of the parasite invasion include stunted trees and yellowing of the foliage and a close examination of the roots reveals the presence of small diameter galls.

There are two methods of controlling the nematode problem in peach trees. The first is the use of resistant rootstocks, Okinawa or Nemaguard. Homeowners who are planning to plant trees this fall should contact their nurseryman to assure that the varieties they want will be available on either of these Pampa.

two rootstock. The next method of controlling nematodes is the use of soil fumigation. This required on trees that are already planted and are not fumigated are later found to be infested with nematodes. DBCP such as Nema-K, Nematode Killer, Fumazone, Nemagard or Oxy-BBC should be used. These materials should be applied in a band around the drip line of the tree and then watered in about a three inch layer water to act as a water seal. This will force the fumigant down around the root system of the plant, which will result in the death of the nematodes.

Not all nematodes cause galls; therefore, soil tests are sometimes required to determine if other nematodes might be involved in the decline of the fruit trees. If you suspect nematode damage, it is suggested a soil sample be sent to Plant Nematode Detection Laboratory, Texas A&M University, College Station, Texas.

Conservation News

In spite of dry weather, farmers and ranchers are doing conservation work. Leonard Rathjen has just completed a system of terraces, as well as constructing a diversion terrace and shaping a waterway. Leonard's farm is about miles east of Wheeler. Hathaway recently completed a system of parallel terraces on his place about two miles north of Mobeetie. J. T. Johnson is in the process of building a parallel terrace system as well as constructing a seep pond and building a dam. J. T.'s ranch is located about ten miles north of Wheeler. Soil Conservation Service Technicians have staked an erosion control structure for Jack Wardlaw's place west of Shamrock. This structure is a concrete chute that will control runoff that is threatening to cut across the corner of one of his cultivated fields.

If you have an erosion problem of any kind, contact technicians of the Soil Conservation Service that assist Wheeler County Soil and Conservation District for an appointment. They will welcome the opportunity to assist you.

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (HJR28)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 52, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:
"Section 52. (a) Except as otherwise provided by this section, the Legislature shall have no power to authorize any county, city, town or other political subdivision of the State to lend its credit or to grant public money or thing of value in aid of, or to become a stockholder in such corporation, association or company.
(b) Under Legislative provision, any county, any political subdivision of a county, any number of adjoining counties, or any political subdivision of the State, or any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State of Texas, and which may or may not include, towns, villages or municipal corporations, upon a vote of two-thirds majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of such district or territory to be affected thereby, in addition to all other debts, may issue bonds or otherwise lend its credit in any amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of such district or territory, except that the total bonded indebtedness of any city or town shall never exceed the limits imposed by other provisions of this Constitution, and levy and collect taxes to pay the interest thereon and provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof, as the Legislature may authorize, and in such manner as it may authorize the same, for the following purposes to wit:
(1) The improvement of rivers, creeks, and streams to prevent overflows, and to permit of navigation thereof, or irrigation thereof, or in aid of such purposes.
(2) The construction and maintenance of pools, lakes, reservoirs, dams, canals and waterways for the purposes of irrigation, drainage or navigation, or in aid thereof.
(3) The construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof.
(c) Notwithstanding the provisions of Subsection (b) of this Section, bonds may be issued by any county in an amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property in the county, for the construction, maintenance, and operation of macadamized, graveled, or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of the county, and without the necessity of further or amendatory legislation. The county may levy and collect taxes to pay the interest on the bonds as it becomes due and to provide a sinking fund for redemption of the bonds."
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing any county, on the vote of a majority of its qualified property taxpayers electors, to issue road bonds in an amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property in the county."

"Section 51. The homestead, not in a town or city, shall consist of not more than two hundred acres of land, which may be in one or more parcels, with the improvements thereon; the homestead in a city, town or village, shall consist of lot, or lots, not to exceed in value Ten Thousand Dollars, at the time of their designation as the homestead, without reference to the value of any improvements thereon; provided, that the same shall be used for the purposes of a home, or as a place to exercise the calling or business of the head of a family; provided also, that any temporary change of the character of the same, when no other homestead has been acquired."
Sec. 2. 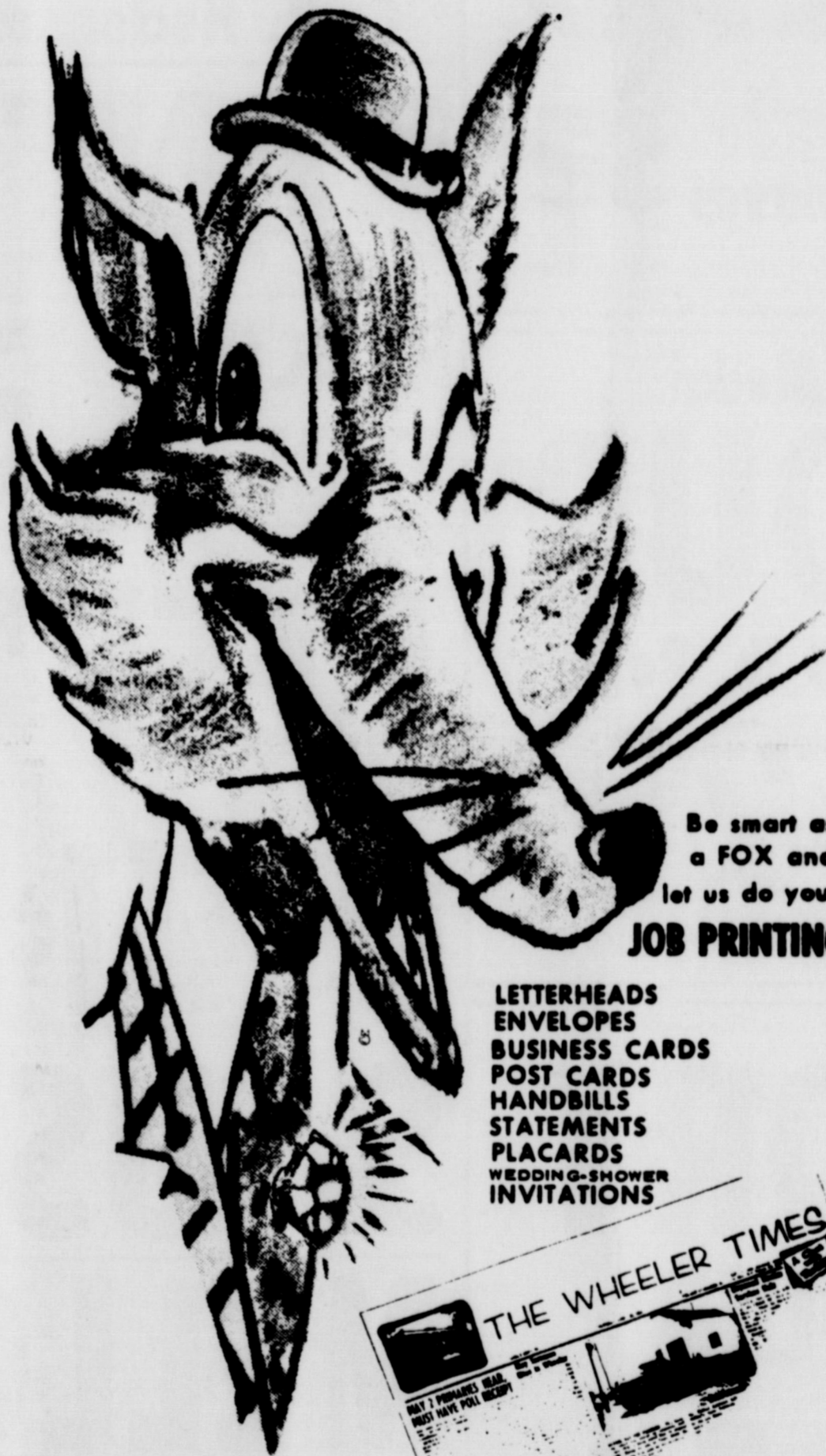
MOBEETIE 4-H CLUB HOLDS MEETING
