The system is used in the ordering of groceries to restock the shelves of the store. Formerly a three day process, the order is written and filled in one day.

Each item in the store is coded with a set of numbers. A converted 10-Key adding machine is attached to a tape recorder; as the piece of equipment is pushed down the isle, the code number of each item to be ordered is placed in the machine. The number is in tum, recorded on magnetic tape. When the order is complete, a phone call is placed and the recording played over the phone into a computer on the

other end. On the receiving end, the tope serves as a record of the order placed and eliminates an amount of bookkeep

FHA Offers New Plan

Builders in Wheeler, Hemphill, Roberts Counties and vicinity may build more home for rural families because of a new program of the Farmers the Wheeler County Farmers Home Administration, County Supervisor John L. Manning announced today.

Under the plan, Manning said, FHA, the rural credit agency of the Department of Agriculture, can issue a conditional commitment agreeing to finance new or substantially rehabilitated homes for as many as 15 families at a time.

Previously, he noted, home financing could be assured only as indivudual families With the conditional commitment, builders can proceed with the construction of up to 15 homes in an area, with reasonable assurance that financing will be available to qualified purchasers.

The conditional commitment does not reserve funds for a loan nor does it provide for construction financing, Manning point out, "but with the growth of the rural housing individual loan program from \$486 million in fiscal 1969 to \$821 million this year, and with more than \$1.4 billion projected for 1971, expansion of rural housing opportunities is assured." "FHA's National Admin-

strator, James V. Smith, has called on contractor, developers and realtors to engage in a stepped-up program to improved low-andmoderate cost housing in rural America," Manning reported. "It is one step in our effort to eliminate the

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

Floyd Smith, head of USDA research center at Belts ville, Md. recently reported the results of tests that proved beer attracts thirty times as many slugs as metal dehyde, a standard bait for decades, and one incidentally, we have been recommending. Beer attracted more than 300 slugs, while metal dehyde attracted only 28 in a series of four day greenhou se tests. HOGS-There is money in hogs but don't let diseases set you back. Recently in a Texas auction barn, pigs from a consignment were purchased by several people. To date, three hog cholera outbreaks have been traced back to this one lot of pigs. All swine on these three farms were depopulated. Much trouble and monetary loss could have been prevented if the purchased pigs had been isolated for 30


