SPACE TRAVELER BARBECUE TICKETS GO ON SALE

Bean will be held September 4 in Wheeler Gymnasium at 7:00. The dedication of Alan L. Bean Boulevard will precede the barbecue. The dedication will be at 6:00.

Alan L. Bean came into this world in the Wheeler hospital, located over the City Drug; his stay in Wheeler was a short three months. The home address of the Bean family while they lived in Wheeler was 605 Shamrock Street, the present home of Edna Wright.

The name of Shamrock Street will be officially changed to Alan L. Bean Boulevard with the dedication September 4.

Capt. Alan Bean and his father, Arnold H. Bean, will be present at the dedication and barbecue. Capt. Bean will be guest speaker for the barbecue which will be catered.

Capt. Alan L. Bean, USN, was a member of the first group of astronauts selected by NASA; his destination was the moon. Capt. Bean served as lunar module pilot for the flight of Apollo XII, which was in flight November 14-24, 1969; he walked on the moon—the fourth man to set foot on the moon—November 19, 1969.

Capt. Bean has logged a total of 244 hours and 31 minutes of space flight, 31 hours and 31 minutes on the surface of the moon—of which 7 hours and 31 minutes were spent in lunar EVA.

COUNTY MELON PATCH TO PAY FOR COLLEGE TERM

(By Betty Topper) A Wheeler County youth, Richard Hefley, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Hefley, Jr. in the Twitty community is quite busy selling watermelons and cantelopes to finance the first year of college at Texas Tech, Lubbock.

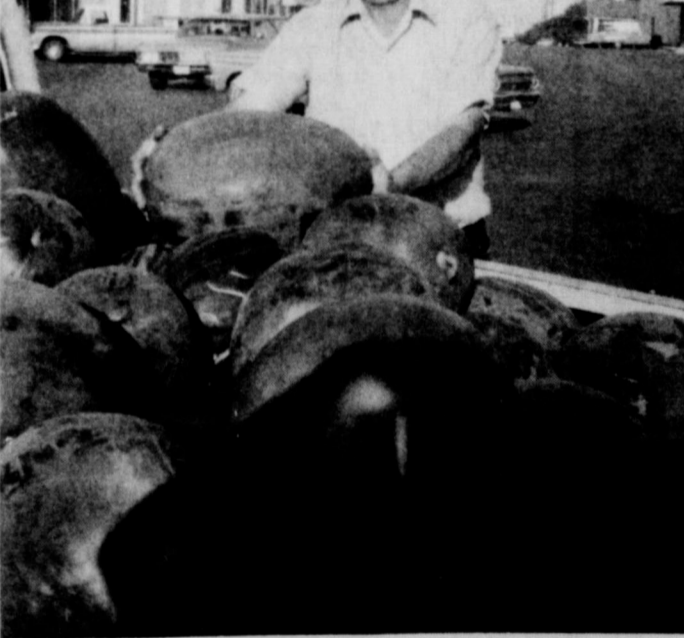
Richard has been active in 4-H Club work nine years. Crop, swine, and public speaking have been his 4-H projects. In public speaking, Richard won district in 68 and placed 5th in state. He was in FFA 4 years, served 2 years as local chapter president and served 1 year as area vice-president.

Richard finished high school in Shamrock in the spring of 1970 and plans to major in agricultural science.

The 10 acre melon patch consists of 5 acres in Black Diamond melons (yellow bellied variety) and 5 acres of cantelopes. He says his crop has just about peaked but that he lost about 100 bushels of cantelopes Sunday night with a 2 inch plus rain which caused the ripe melons to split rendering them unsaleable. Richard loaded one truck with 84 melons this week averaging 41 lbs. each.

The crop has been irrigated five times since planting and besides making fine melons he also has an unusually good crop of weeds, grass, etc. Makes picking a bit more but he stated that the melons seemed nicer among the weeds. Perhaps the shade helps some. He is ready to load up both pickups, trucks, trailer. Cantelopes, watermelons, anyone?

Arthur W. Burrell, a Wheeler County farmer, rancher also in the Twitty area has 40 acres of melons, 25 acres in black diamonds which he irrigated once. Burrell said he probably has about half a crop this year and that this has been a very bad year for melons. His blackeyed peas fared even worse. He too, is selling melons by the truck load.

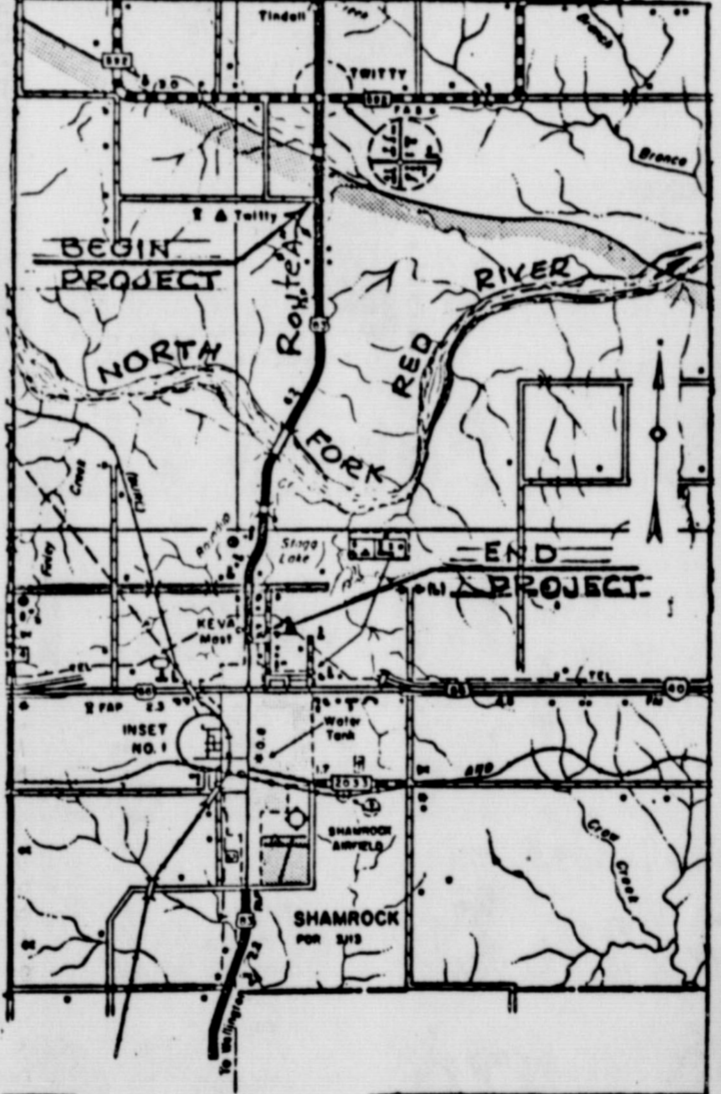

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**
NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (HJR28)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 52, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 52. (a) Except as otherwise provided by this section, the Legislature shall have no power to authorize any county, city, town or other political corporation or subdivision of the State to lend its credit or to grant public money or thing of value in aid of, or to any individual, association or corporation whatsoever, or to become a stockholder in such corporation, association or company.

"(b) Under Legislative provision, any county, any political subdivision of a county, any number of adjoining counties, or any political subdivision of the State, or any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State of Texas, and which may or may not include, towns, villages or municipal corporations, upon a vote of two-thirds majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of such district and territory to be affected thereby, in addition to all other debts, may issue bonds or otherwise lend its credit in any amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property in the county, for the construction, maintenance, and operation of macadamized, graveled, or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of the county, and without the necessity of further or amendatory legislation. The county may levy and collect taxes to pay the interest thereon and provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof, as the Legislature may authorize, and in such manner as it may authorize the same, for the following purposes to wit:

"(1) The improvement of rivers, creeks, and streams to prevent overflows, and to permit of navigation thereof, or irrigation thereof, or in aid of such purposes.

"(2) The construction and maintenance of pools, lakes, reservoirs, dams, canals and waterways for the purposes of irrigation, drainage or navigation, or in aid thereof.

"(3) The construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Subsection (a), Section 64, Article III, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 64. (a) The Legislature may by special statute provide for consolidation of governmental offices and functions of government of any one or more political subdivisions comprising or located within any county. Any such statute shall require an election to be held within the political subdivisions affected thereby with approval by a majority of the voters in each of these subdivisions, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may require."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for consolidating governmental offices and functions and allowing political subdivisions to contract for performance of governmental functions in any county."

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 1-d, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 1-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands, which shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops rather than upon the value of such lands and the crop growing thereon."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the Legislature to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands, which shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops."

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Subsection (a), Section 64, Article III, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 64. (a) The Legislature may by special statute provide for consolidation of governmental offices and functions of government of any one or more political subdivisions comprising or located within any county. Any such statute shall require an election to be held within the political subdivisions affected thereby with approval by a majority of the voters in each of these subdivisions, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may require."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for consolidating governmental offices and functions and allowing political subdivisions to contract for performance of governmental functions in any county."

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 1-d, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

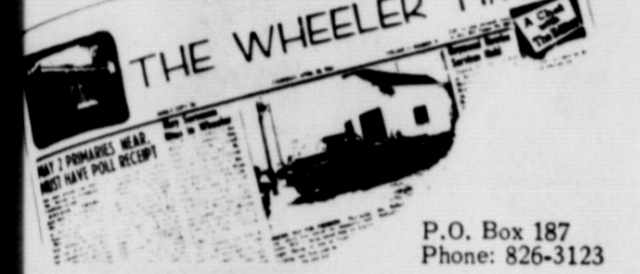
"Section 1-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands, which shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops rather than upon the value of such lands and the crop growing thereon."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the Legislature to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands, which shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops."

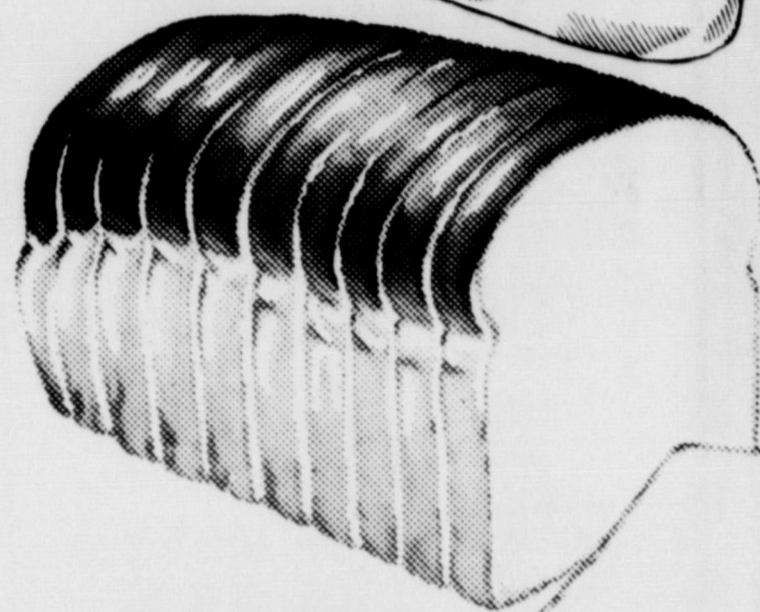

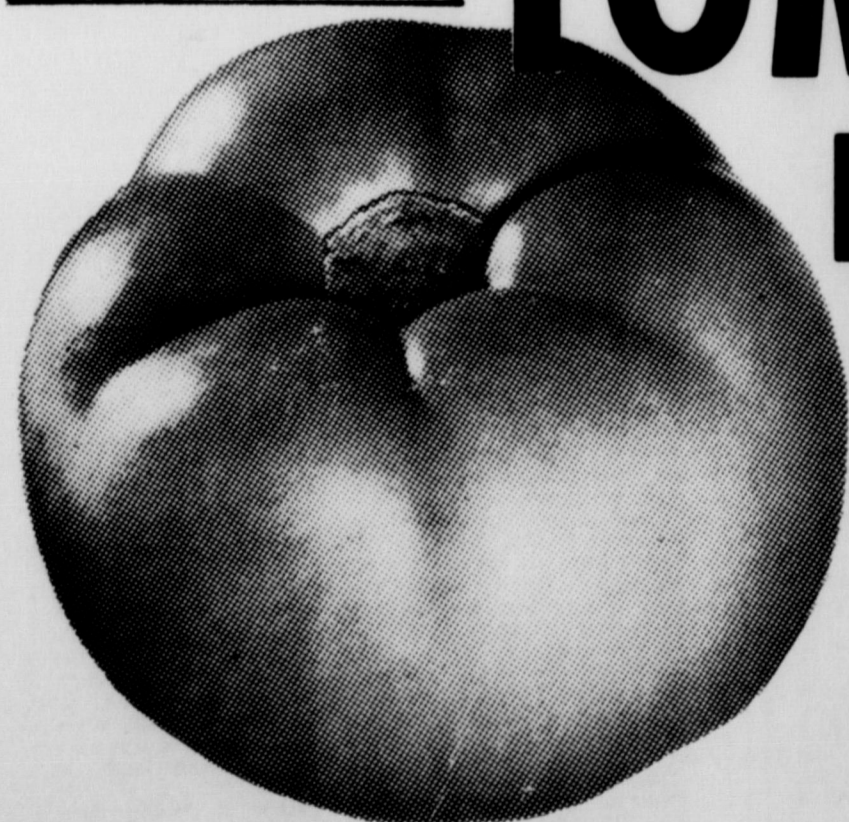
