

LARGE CROWDS ATTEND STREET DEDICATION & BARBECUE FOR CAPT. ALAN BEAN FRIDAY

Four hundred and twentyfive persons attended the Space Traveler Barbecue Friday, September 4, which followed the dedication of Alan L. Bean Boulevard. The crowd of 650 persons were present for the dedication.

Guest of Honor for the dedication and barbecue was Capt. Alan L. Bean, lunar module pilot for the flight of Apollo XII. Accompanying Capt. Bean was his father, Arnold Bean, who has revisited Wheeler since he moved in 1932. Capt. Bean stated he had been within 9 miles of Wheeler-straight up 48,000 ft.; you can't see Wheeler

For entertainment prior to the 6:00 p.m. dedication, the Motifs, a local band, presented several numbers.

The dedication was held in front of the Wheeler County Historical Museum. Presiding was Judge Grainger McIlhany. The mayor, Pete Burton, presented Capt. Bean with a "Key to the City". Thomas Daughtry was called upon to dedicate the street, as he offered the idea of changing the street name to the Coun-




BEING SERVED: Capt. Bean is the first to be served barbecue at Nichol son Field for the Space Traveler Barbecue. Bean was one of 425 served.





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
