

September 4. Capt. Alan L. Bean, USN, was a member of the third group of astronauts selected by NASA; his destination was the moo n. Capt. Bean served as the lunar module pilot for the flight of Apollo XII, which was in flight November 14-24, 1969; he walked on the moon-the fourth man to set foot on the moon-November 19, 1969.

Capt. Bean has logged a total of 244 hours and 36 minutes of space flight, 31 hours and 31 minutes on the surface of the moon-of which 7 hours and 45 minutes were spent in lunar EVA.

Tickets are available at the City Office or may be purchased from any of the City Councilmen. The tickets are \$3.00 each.

Thomas Daughtry, owner and manager of the Ben Franklin Store, is given credit for the suggestion to change the street name to honor Capt. Bean. In the November, 1969, meeting of the council, it was decided to change the street name. Capt. Bean's parents lived at 605 S. Shamrock at the time of his birth.

Capt. Bean was born in the Wheeler Hos pital March 15, 1932: the hospital was located at the time over the City Drug. Baby Bean's stay in Wheeler was a short three months. Bean moved with his parents to Ft. Worth where the parents still reside.

Holt's uncle, was the first president of the bank and remained 8-31 in that capacity until June 2, 1924 when he was succeeded by Mr. J. M. Porter who served in that post until August 8, 1936. Mr. J. M. Porter was one of the original stockholders and was in the founding of the bank

with the Holts. Mr. D. E. Holt then became president of the bank and remained in that capacity until his death in May of

Wheeler County was the first one organized in the Panhandle in 1879 and juri sdiction over what is now 26 counties was transferred from Henrietta, Clay County, to the new County. The old jail was the first

substantial one constructed in the Panhandle and was completed in 1886.

faces got so dirty you could not have seen it anyway. We learned the language


When the men came back, we were willing and happy to give them their jobs and responsibility back. Slowly we changed back to the feminine types.

Because rain doesn't always come at the right time, interest in irrigation is high in a drouth year. Johnnie Burrell, Twitty, has just completed a new well when we were by there last week. It looks like it's going to be a good one. Johnnie plans to use the water on difalfa and grass. We believe that watering grass would make a real profitable venture for a man with cattle. Several people are doing this and they're raising cattle cheaply.

With sparce grazing, mama cows aren't milking and calves are lighter. To overcome this, some producers are creep feeding their calves. Creep feeding is a management tool in the production of calves that depends on the judgement of the individual cattleman for

its success. The ultimate goal is to increase profit. In most tests run on creep feeding, figures are on the wrong side of the profit ledger for calves on good pasture. Increased value of feeder calves is seldom enough to pay for the additional feed

and labor. Performance testing shows that the average creep-fed calf gains on e-tenth of a pound more per day than his non-creep-fed counterpart. This amounts to 25 pounds at wearing. However, if puton cost is greater than the sale price, profits are

The practice of creep feeding varies widely from farm to farm. If profits are to be

gained, the herd manager must pay dose attention to several factors.

Feeders should be placed where the herd congregates, such as near water or shade. A ready supply of clean, fresh, in expensive feed is a must at all times.

Winter creep-fed calves will probably need a ration containing 14 to 15 percent protein. In summer on pasture, a protein content of 12 percent is sufficient.

In view of the present situation, creep feeding might offer better possibilities than in the more normal years. Stockmen interested in more information on the subject are invited to contact us for a copy of B-792, "Creep Feeding Beef Calves." GARDENING

Late summer is the time to repot house plants, but soil as it comes from the garden is not usually suitable for the potting job. Mix two parts of good garden loam,

two parts peat humus or shredded peat moss and one part of sand Well rotted manure or shredded leaf mold may be substituted for the pear humus. This type of mixture, provides the three most needed conditions for potted plants - support, good soil aeration and ability to hold water and

plant nutrients. After the potting mixture is prepared, it should be placed in a shallow pan less than six inches deep, then moistened and placed in a preheated oven at 180 degrees F. for 30 minutes. Clay pot s should be thorough ly washed and placed in the oven. This heat treatment will kill disease and insect organisms and weed seed. But, don't sterilize plastic pots, just wash them with hot water. Use clean tools and keep the hands clean when doing the potting job or the soil may be reinfected with harmful organisms. Of sourse, there is always an easier way to do the job; go to the garden supply cen-


