By: David Britt Trailing 7-6 at halftime and having made only one first down in the opening two quarters and this by the penal ty route, the Wheeler Mustangs came back with authority and dominated play in the second half to register a season opener victory over the Lefors Pirates 26-14. A near capacity crowd

watched the action on Nichol son Field as the Mustangs got the 1970 season off to a good start. Roy Don Chick's 79 yard

punt return for a touchdown early in the game was all that Wheeler parti sans had to cheer about in the first half except all were relieved that the Mustangs were only behind by one point. The visiting Pirates threatened several times in the first half but the Mustang defense was able to thwart these drives.

One drive by the Pirates was stopped by a fumble recovery by Carroll Watson and another promising drive by the Pirates came for naught with a missed field goal try. The Pirates were not to be denied entirely in the first half as they mounted a drive of 47 yards to paydirt as time was running

out. Just 21 seconds remained when David White passed 11 yards to Ronnie Sims in the corner of the end zone. With Mike Robbins adding the one pointer, the Pirates enjoyed the halftime break. The first time the Pirates had the ball they were forced to punt and Chick gathered the pigskin in on his 31 and headed for the

sideline behind a quick forming wall of blockers. Cutting back to the middle at the midfield stripe, Chick outran the pursuing Pirates to chalk up his first of three TD's for the night. Dale Steven's attempted kick for the extra point was blocked and this was all of the offensive show in the first

half for Wheeler. Whatever transpired in the dressing room at the half proved to be good medicine as Coach Bateman's charges came back and took charge of the contest.

The Mustangs took the second half kickoff and promptly drove 60 yards for the go ahead score in just 8 plays. Chick, Jimmye Cole and Rodney Weatherly all took turns at gouging out yardage to the Pirate 26 where Chick broke loose off his left tackle and rambled to the end zone. 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
