## \$10,000 Bond Payment Made, Sales Tax Collection Are Given

The City Council approved the check for the first payment on the paving project at their regular council meeting Monday evening. The check for \$10,475.00 was only a part of the total collected from the city's 1% sales tax last year.

The Sales Tax in Wheeler went into effect in March, 1969. Collection for 1969 sales amounted to \$12,623. The check for the fourth quarter of 1970 has not been received; \$13,869.77 was collected for the first three quarters of 1970.

All money collected from the sales tax is set aside to pay for the \$150,000 Street Improvement Bond issue.

The paving project was completed Nov. 11, 1969. Prior to the payment approved Monday night was \$13,447.35 has been paid in interest. A check for interest in the amount \$8,950.00 was given in March, 1970, and a payment of \$4,497.35 was made on interest in September, 1970.

The council voted Monday night to purchase speed limit signs to be placed at the park and additional dip signs to be placed where needed.

The installation of a master meter to check the amount of water pumped and mechanical chlorination equipment to provide continuous disinfection of all water supplied to the city was discussed by the council. The matter was tabled until information of the total cost could be obtained.

The city attorney, Bob McPherson was given the "go ahead" on the collection of past due taxes.

The fire department was told to take bids for the painting and lettering of the Fire Truck. The bids will be discussed at the March 15 meeting.

### Blanche Grainger Killed Monday Evening Rites Road Wed.

A 78-year-old Wheeler resident was accidentally killed Monday afternoon when she stepped in front of a car traveling west on Texas Highway 152.

Miss Blanche Florence Grainger, a long time Wheeler resident, was dead on arrival at Parkview Hospital following the accident which occurred at 2:50 p.m. 27 feet east of the intersection of Highway 152 and Canadian Street.

Wayne Pierce, Investigating Department of Public Safety Officer said Miss Grainger was struck by a car driven by John Clemmons Helton, 35, of Wheeler, as she was crossing to the south side of the highway.

The officers ruled the incident accidental.

Blanche Florence Grainger, 78, of Wheeler died Monday as a result of an auto accident. She was born April 20, 1892 in Comanche, Texas.

Miss Grainger had lived in Wheeler since 1931 moving here from Comanche. She worked for many years at McIlhenny Dry Goods Store and made her home with her sister, Mrs. McIlhenny.

She was a member of the First Methodist Church of Wheeler.

Survivors are three sisters, Mrs. Golda McIlhenny of Wheeler, Miss Alma Grainger of Comanche and Mrs. Ruby Cox of Comanche. She was preceded in death by one brother and two sisters.

Services were held Wednesday in the First Methodist Church in Wheeler with Rev. Ross Dunn officiating. Services in Comanche will be held Thursday at 10:30 a.m. in the Comanche Funeral Home Chapel.

Burial will be in Comanche Cemetery under the direction of Wright Funeral Home.

The groups reports response to the drive has been excellent.

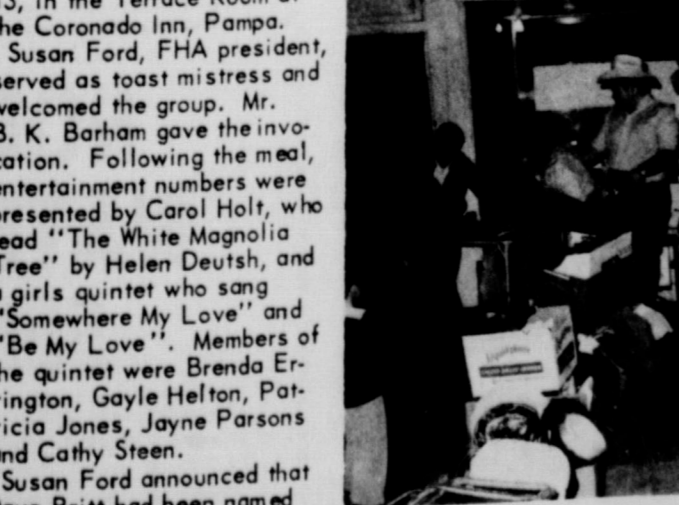

## PUBLIC NOTICE

### PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

#### NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 15)

Special Election May 18, 1971

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article III, Section 24, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 24. (1) The State Ethics Commission is created as an agency of the State. The commission consists of nine members. Three members shall be appointed by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Texas with the advice and consent of the Associate Justices serving on the Court, three members shall be appointed by the Presiding Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals of Texas with the advice and consent of the other Judges serving on the Court, and three members shall be appointed by the Chairman of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission with the advice and consent of the other members of the commission. Each group of three appointees no more than two shall be attorneys engaged in the active practice of law. In addition thereto there shall be two ex officio members, one from the House of Representatives and one from the Senate to be elected on the first day of each Regular Session of the Legislature by a majority of the membership of each House for a term ending on the first day of the next Regular Session.

"(2) With the exception of the initial appointees, each member shall hold office for a term of six (6) years and until his successor is appointed and has qualified. In making the initial appointments, each appointing officer shall designate one (1) appointee to serve a term of two (2) years, one (1) appointee to serve a term of four (4) years, and one (1) appointee to serve a term of six (6) years. Interim vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as vacancies due to expiration of a full term, but only for the unexpired portion of the term in question. The membership shall designate one of its members to serve as chairman for a period of two (2) years.

"(3) The members of the commission shall be reimbursed for actual and necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their duties.

"(4) The commission shall recommend a compensation, per diem, and mileage allowance of members of the Legislature, and may recommend the salary of the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the Lieutenant Governor

proved before that day by resolution of either House of the Legislature.

"(5) All rates of compensation, mileage allowances or per diem rates and all changes and recommendations made by the commission shall not take effect until approved by section by resolution of both Houses of the Legislature.

"(6) All votes on these resolutions or parts thereof shall show the individual votes in the respective journals of both Houses.

"(7) The commission shall investigate any alleged violation of any rule of ethics promulgated by it and report its findings to the appropriate State agency, official, legislative body, grand jury or district attorney.

"(8) Until otherwise provided by the commission, each member of the Legislature shall receive from the public treasury an annual salary of Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and per diem not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first 120 days only of each Regular Session and for 30 days of each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than 140 days. In addition to the per diem, the members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and fifty cents for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county seat now or hereafter established; no member to be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after adjournment of the Regular or Called session.

"(9) The commission is further authorized to recommend to each Legislature changes which will update, improve, and effect economy in the legislative process."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 18th day of May, 1971, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition. The constitutional amendment to create a State Ethics Commission empowered to set rules of ethics for members of the Legislature, State officers and legislative officers, to investigate violations thereof, and to recommend compensation for members of the Legislature and the Lieutenant Governor and recommend improvements and economy in the legislative process."

## PUBLIC NOTICE

### PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

#### NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (HJR 21)

Special Election May 18, 1971

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article XVII, Section 1, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 1. The Legislature by a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each House, to be entered by yeas and nays on the journals, may propose amendments to the Constitution, to be voted upon by the qualified electors for members of the Legislature, which proposed amendments shall be duly published once a week for four weeks, commencing at least three months before an election, the time of which shall be specified by the Legislature, in one weekly newspaper of each county, in which such amendments may be published; and it shall be the duty of the several returning officers of said election, to open a poll for, and make returns to the Secretary of State,

of the number of legal votes cast at said election for and against said amendments; and if more than one is proposed, then the number of votes cast for and against each of them; and if it shall appear from said return, that a majority of the votes cast, have been cast in favor of any amendment, the said amendment so receiving a majority of the votes cast, shall become a part of this Constitution, and proclamation shall be made by the Governor thereof."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on May 18, 1971, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The Legislature may propose an amendment of the Constitution at any session of the Legislature."
