Interesting Facts On Electric Power The Progressive Study Club


You always know the top twenty in college football the Tuesday after the last Saturday that the teams have gone to battle. The statistics don't come out quite that fast in the electric utility business, however, and a Federal Power Commission report which was just recently released shows that two of Southwestern Public Service Company's giant electric generating units were in the top 20 for efficiency in 1968, the latest year for which figures are available.

The Federal Power Commission report on operating expenses and efficiencies rated Unit #2 at Cunningham Station, near Hobbs, New Mexico, as the 10th most efficient gas-fired generating unit in the nation, insofar as heat rate is concerned, and Unit #4 at Plant X, near Earth, Texas, was selected as the 12th most efficient.

Each of the generating units has a capability of 210,000 kilowatts. The reconition of their efficiency is measured in the amount of gas required to produce a kilowatt-hour of electric

Where this all gets imporyou get it down to dollars

and cents. Southwestern's cost for gas has increased by 36% in the last ten years, but the unit fuel cost for each kilowatt-hour generated has increased by only 22%. The more efficient units, such as those cited in the FPC report, make this performance possible.




