MUSTANGS SHADE CLARENDON 6-0

JUDGE SENTENCES VANDALS

Four young men were charged in the case of vandalism at the J.B. Tiner home in Wheeler. One, 17, was tried as an adult and four were tried as juveniles. The 17 year old was assessed a \$47.50 fine and court costs. It was his first time in Wheeler County. George Hefley, 16, of the juveniles had brought into court on Monday, Oct. 19 his second time in county court.

Judge Hefley ruled they be sent to Boys Ranch until they complete high school or reach the age of 18. Two of the juveniles were paroled back to their parents and fined \$100 each for their part in the vandalism; a number of stipulations were made in the parol. The Parolls run until the age of 16 for one and 18 for the other youth. If the paroll is broken, the youths will be brought back into court.

The forward pass came back into the Mustang offense for one play last Friday night and it was good enough to provide a narrow 6-0 win over arch rival Clarendon. Gary Fischer found Jerry Beaty roaming behind all Broncho defenders at the 2 yard line and lofted the 21 yard scoring shot that Beaty hauled in and stepped into the end zone for the only score of a tough defensive battle waged on a dreary night in Clarendon. The victory put the Mustangs on top of the district heap along with McLean and Silverton who also chalked up wins in district openers. Wheeler's touchdown came on the only penetration of the 20 yard line that either team made in the contest although the Mustangs had to put down a desperate Broncho attempt for victory in the final seconds as Dale Stevens intercepted a Broncho aerial at the Mustang 6 with just 24 seconds remaining on the clock. The winning TD, that came midway of the third quarter, was set up when Rick Hefley blocked a punt off the toe of Johnny Gillen and the Mustangs gained possession at the Broncho 26. Three running plays netted just 5 yards before Fischer hit on the fourth down pass. The defensive battle saw both teams kicking a total of 14 times and the 8 times that Rodney Weatherly put his foot in the ball helped keep the ever dangerous Bronchos deep in their end of the gridiron. Twice in the first half the Mustangs had the pigskin in Broncho territory but a fumble by Roy Chick at the Clarendon 26 fell into Broncho hands and dented this excursion and the Mustangs gave up the ball on downs at the Broncho 32 early in the second period. Although the Bronchos outgained the Mustangs and had a big 14-5 edge in first downs, most of it was garnered around midfield except for the late drive. When the need arose, the Mustangs defense was there. Besides the big interception by Stevens, Jimmy Cole picked off a Broncho pass at the Wheeler 45 just before the half and two other passes were dropped by Mustang defenders who were kept busy with Clarendon putting the ball up for grabs 21 times in the contest. On the first series of downs after scoring, the Mustangs had a good chance to pad their lead when a fourth down punt attempt was fumbled by Clarendon at the Broncho 49. Cole got 5 as he hit off right guard and Chick got 2 more hard earned steps to the 42. Cole picked up a couple at left tackle before the Mustangs called on Chick but the Bronchos were reading the play and stopped Chick at the line of scrimmage and for the remaining seven minutes the Mustangs were called on twice to quell the Bronchos. With 6:23 to play, the Mustangs took over at their 33 following a punt but lost the ball for the third time via a fumble at the 39 and really had their backs to the wall. Great defensive play by Wheeler put a halt to the Broncho threat with Carroll Watson knocking Jim Shadle down a yard shy of the first down at the Mustang 30. Failing to gain, the Mustangs were forced to punt and the 37 yarder off the toe of Weatherly put the Broncho-

B TEAM TO FACE CLAUDE AFTER LOSING TO LEFORS

Saturday morning just wasn't right for the Wheeler B team as they fell to the Lefors B for the second time this year, coming out on the short end of a 28-6 count. Lefors did all of their scoring in the first half and two of the touchdowns resulted from fumble recoveries deep in Mustang territory. Only once during the game did the Pirates make a long drive and this was in the second quarter and they moved 65 yards to Paydirt. Choosing to run on fourth down from their 39 in the first quarter was costly to the Mustangs as the Pirates swarmed over Larry Rives for a loss of one to give the Pirates excellent field position. Larry Wallis, big Pirate halfback, was a thorn in the B team's side all morning and he capped the 38 yard drive with a 3 yard smash to paydirt. Wheeler was able to move the ball against the Pirates when they had it but fumbles killed their offensive efforts. After recovering a Mustang bobble at the Pirate 35, Lefors made their only sustained drive to paydirt and moved the 65 yards in 13 plays to build their margin to 12-0 with 3:05 remaining to play in the opening half. Kicking off, Lefors pounced on a loose football when James Vise coughed it up on the Wheeler 29 on the return and the Pirates quickly took advantage and Wallis crammed it in three plays later. Lefors padded their margin to 28 points when Delbert McWhorter fumbled on the kickoff return following the Piraated third TD to give the Pirates the ball 22 steps away from the end zone. Wallis got the TD with 24 seconds to play and the damage had been done. The Mustangs came out in the second half and outplayed the Pirates but could get only one touchdown for their efforts and this on a 40 yard run by Rustye Cole early in the final question. Wheat's not growing like it should in parts of the country. Some folks are getting their stocker calves in now.

Now's the time to start making preparation to prevent peach leaf curl next spring. We saw a lot of home-owners become alarmed last spring at the appearance of malformed leaves that appear curled and thickened and are light green to dark red in color. If maximum yield and quality of peaches is to be obtained, it's necessary to control the fungus. Only fixed copper sprays such as Kocide 101, COCS or TC 90 should be used.

Spray your cattle now for lice. It's more practical than waiting until the cattle are noticeably infested. Treating now is more effective because of mild weather, shorter hair on cattle and the lice population is smaller now. Dipping is the most thorough way to treat cattle, but sprays are effective if applied with special attention to the brisket and flanks. The entire body should be wet to the skin. Water pressure and a coarse stream is best. Spray at close range and only a few cattle at a time. I have a list of recommended louse control insecticides in my office and will be happy to supply this information to farmers and ranchers.

Before buying insecticide for spraying cattle, read the label on the container completely. Pay particular attention to warnings and restrictions listed on the label, check on waiting periods, especially if some treated cattle may go to slaughter.

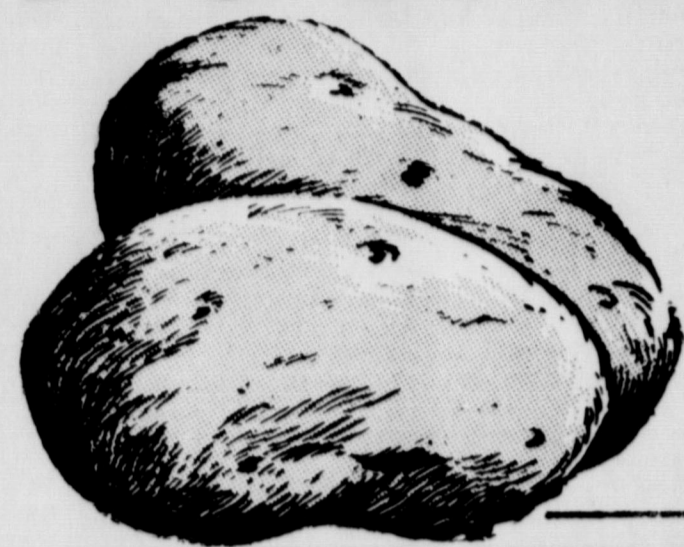

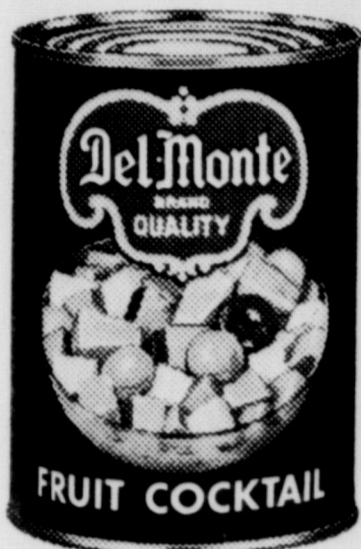

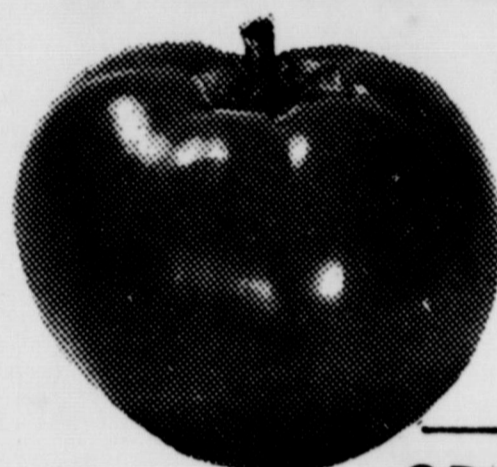
