MUSTANGS ROLLED OVER MEMPHIS 28-7

David Britt
you don't succeed, try
again and this is just
the Mustangs did
Friday night on Nich-
olson Field and when
the game had settled, the Mus-
tang Cyclones to the
score of 28-7.

The Mustangs scored on
their second possession
but saw drives to the Mem-
phis 20, 6, and 1 fail and
even after holding the vis-
itors to a couple of first
downs in the first half they
weren't out of the woods
until they built a two touch-
down margin three minutes
deep in the fourth quarter.
A 45 yard drive after the
opening kickoff by the Mus-
tang Cyclones to the mem-
phis 20 where Roy Don
Chick fumbled as he
was hit and Memphis re-
covered.

Stevens put them in good
shape at the Cyclone 32.
Gary Fischer neatly cut
inside his left end on the
option and followed a clear-
ing block at the 20 by Rick
Hefley to set up a first and
goal at the Memphis 5 from
where it took a couple of
stabs by Chick to get the
touchdown. Chick climbed
over right guard for the
first two yards and 5:15
showed on the clock as
Stevens made a 7 out of
the 6 with the first of four
true conversion kicks.
Forcing the Cyclones to
kick, the Mustangs came
roaring back into Memphis
territory. From the 37,
Fischer found a big path

clear once more at left
end and rambled 21 yards
down to the 16. Chick tried
right tackle a couple of
times to the 10 and from
there Fischer went to the
6. Chick blasted into right
guard but came up inches
shy of the first down and
for the second time, Mem-
phis' defense had prevailed.
Memphis had to punt
early in the second quarter
and here came the Mustangs
pounding the Cyclone for-
ward wall to the Memphis
25. Fischer found Jimmy
Cole loose and hit him with
a swing pass good for 15 to
the 10 where 5 more yards
were tacked on for a per-
sonal foul against Mem-
phis to give the gold clad
Mustangs a first and goal
at the 5.

skin on the lip of the goal.
Memphis moved out of the
shadow of the goal with the
aid of a 15 yard fine again-
st "heeler but had to kick
at the 33.
Chick fumbled the punt
and the Cyclones had the
ball at the Mustang 37
as time was running out in
the half. With 29 seconds
left, Memphis went to the
air and Cole came up with

the first of his two inter-
ceptions to quell the threat
at the Mustang 27.
A theft of a John Carman
pass at the Wheeler 35 by
Cole got the Mustangs roll-
ing in the second half. Cole
lugged the pigskin back to
the Cyclone 40 and it took
Wheeler 7 plays to get to
paydirt with Cole getting
the TD on a good run from
9 yards out at left guard.

Stevens kick was good and
the Mustangs had finally
erased the 7 on the score-
board.
Memphis got back in the
game when Louis Davis,
who was a thorn in the
Mustangs side both offen-
sively and defensively all
night, recovered a bobble
by Fischer at the Wheeler
47. Four running plays got
a first down at the 37 and

then Davis found running
room around the Mustangs
left end and sped 37 yards
to the end zone. Roger Kehr
booted the extra point and
the Cyclones trailed by
only 7 with 1:58 to play
in the third quarter.
The touchdown drive was
the end of any real Cyclone
offensive threat for the
game and the Mustangs put
a damper to any Cyclone
hopes as they took the
kickoff and moved 75 yards
to pad their lead.
Two passes from Fischer
to Cole got 35 of the yards
before Cole blasted over
from the 3. Stevens kick
boosted the Mustangs mar-
gin to 14 with 9:48 to play
in the game.
Time was running out when
the Mustangs put more
icing on the cake with a
52 yard drive with Chick
and Cole getting all of the
yards on the ground. Cole
climaxed the drive as he
went over standing up from
the nine. Stevens put the
final point on the board
just 1:24 from the end.
Memphis put the ball in
the air the final minute and
a half and all they got for
their effort was two passes
nearly intercepted and run
back for TD's by the alert
Mustang secondary.
"Wheeler's ball control
offense put the ball in play
an amazing 93 times in the
contest and racked up 779
yards total offense to dom-
inate the game. Roy Don
Chick was called on 45
times and responded with
160 yards. Gary Fischer
and Jimmy Cole boosted the
Mustang total rushing
yardage as they picked up
80 and 71 yards respect-
fully.

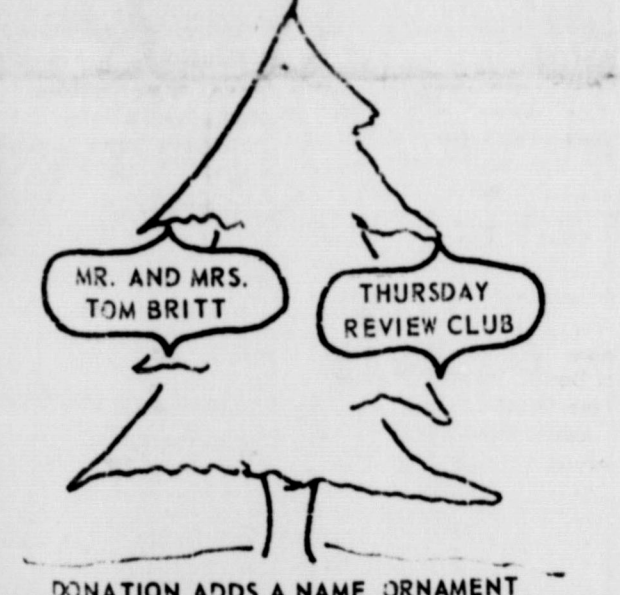
"Wheeler will Shine" each

the street, and, since the

great distance from any

Square.

Across the Fence

Flea Beetles are killing our wheat. This insect has been responsible for our loss of stands and probably the big reason for the wheat not to be growing like it should. By eating tiny holes in the leaves, the flea beetles make the wheat turn light yellow

and bleached looking. Spraying with Sevin, Malathion, Parathion or a combination of Toxaphene and Parathion will give good control. The infestation appears to be quite widespread over the area. Several have had to replant.

When voters go to the

polls November 3, they will be considering 7 proposed amendments to the Texas constitution. Among them is proposed amendment Number 3, which would authorize the legislature to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands based upon the capability of the lands to support the raising of livestock or to produce farm and forest crops. The following arguments FOR passage of the proposed amendment are taken directly from the analyses made by the Texas Legislative Council:

1 - Farm real estate taxes per acre have increased by more than 22 percent, according to data compiled by the Economic Research Service of the United States Department of Agriculture, and there is a need for the tax relief for owners of such property which the proposed amendment would authorize.

2 - The constitutional amendment approved by the voters in 1966 has not provided tax relief urgently needed by farmers and ranchers who use for agricultural purposes land which has greatly increased in value due to its potential use for other purposes, such as urban development. The proposed amendment would enable the legislature to provide such relief.

3 - The present system of assessing forest lands for ad valorem tax purposes is inequitable and unrealistic. Timber is not recognized as a "farm product" exempt

from taxation as are other growing crops. Timber is accordingly taxed with, and in addition to, the land. The result is that tree farmers pay an ad valorem tax each year on their land on the current year's "crop" (represented by the growth of the trees), and on the crop product in each prior year since the stand of timber was planted. The tree farmer does not recover any portion of these tax payments until the trees are harvested some 20 to 50 years after they are planted. The proposed amendment would authorize the legislature to provide a fairer system of property valuation for taxation of forest lands."

The following arguments AGAINST are taken directly from the analyses made by the Texas Legislative Council:

1 - Enabling legislation for the proposed amendment has not been passed; therefore, the voter has no idea how far the legislature may go in providing property tax considerations to the owners of farm, ranch, and timber lands.

2 - The proposed amendment could result in a tax ceiling for rural lands while urban Texans would be in a different category.

Sayre Jr. College Tours Feed Lot

On September 30, the Animal Science Class and instructor, Mrs. Shirley Carlsoy, toured the cattle operations of Virgil Robertson. He explained the feeding and breeding methods and distinguishing characteristics of Charolais and Angus cattle. On October 7, the class went to Wheeler, Texas, where they toured the Beef Cattle Company. The 15,000 head feed lot has just been constructed recently. Mr. Lyndon Loyd led the group and explained feed rations feeding procedures, and the workings of the automatic feed mill.

On October 14, the group will visit the Tipton Dairy at Sweetwater, Oklahoma.

3 - Lower property valuations resulting from implementation of the proposed constitutional amendment might reduce tax revenues of county, school, and other taxing districts. This could possibly handicap these political subdivisions in performing essential governmental functions and services unless other sources of income are found.

The Council did not take a position "for" or "against"

the amendment but offered the foregoing information to aid voters in making their decisions before they go to the polls on November 3. **TAX DECISION MAKING IMPORTANT NOW -**

Most farmers are busy with harvesting at the present and their thoughts are a long way from income taxes, but decisions made during the remainder of 1970 can affect that final tax bill. Probably the best idea for all taxpayers is to take a look at

your total sales of both ordinary and capital items to date, then subtract all production expenses incurred to date plus all personal exemptions plus amount of depreciation taken last year from total income to determine your taxable income picture. The amount of taxable income will tell you whether you should sell some more products before year end and hold off on buying next year's supply of seed, fertilizer,

feed and other production items, or if you should just the opposite. A good knowledge of new Federal income tax laws could save a farmer many dollars in the next three months. SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

It is now time to start plans for applying terraces, diversions, and waterways on cropland that is to be planted to row crops. There continues to be a good interest in parallel terraces among the farmers in the county. The parallel terraces are more expensive than standard terraces, but the benefits from increased production and ease of farming far exceeds the increase in cost.

H.B. Leake has started construction on several diversions and ponds on his place west of Mobeetie. The diversions will divert runoff water from an active gully to a safe outlet where it will eventually be held in a pond for stockwater. Two stockwater ponds and sev-

eral acres of critical area shaping have been completed on the Range Harford Ranch near Shamrock. These ponds will help with more even distribution of grazing. Farmer Hefley has started construction of a diversion terrace on his place between Mobeetie and Briscoe. This terrace is designed to hold runoff water from adjoining farm that was doing considerable damage to some very good cropland.

The technicians of the Soil Conservation Service that assist the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District can help with your erosion problems. Contact them for an appointment.

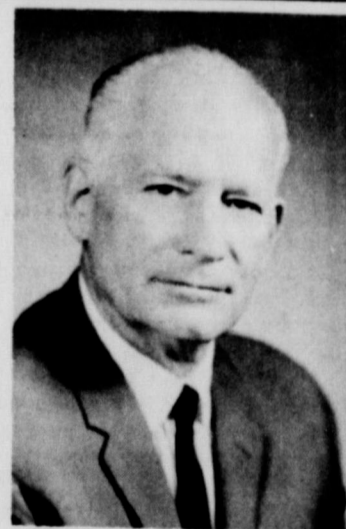

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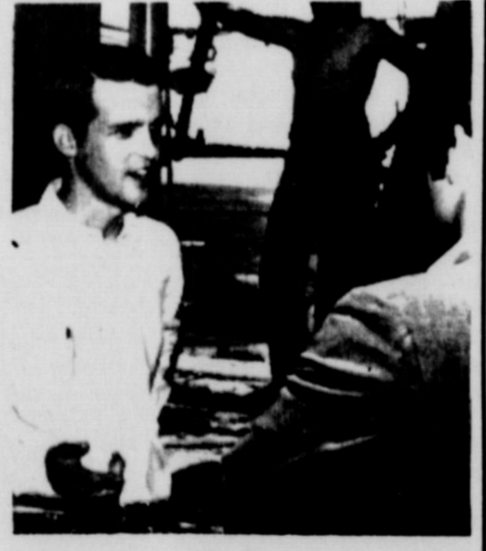

Cashing Govern. Checks

How safe are government checks?
 Merchants must learn to question every form of check, including those passed by friends/customers.
 Government checks, too, can be a source of expense to the merchant who is not careful, and later, much to his sorrow, finds that it is very costly to endorse and cash U.S. checks.
 Following are some examples of how merchants can be fooled. Read them and take heed:
 Example 1 - A local food retailer cashed VA checks for a customer for several years. He knew the woman, as she regularly shopped in his store, but he had no knowledge that she had remarried. The checks were made out to Jane Doe, unmarried widow of John Doe, the deceased veteran. Many months after this retailer had sold his store and retired, the checks he had endorsed for Jane Doe began coming back from the government through his local bank. The total cost to the retailer? More than \$5,000. Jane Doe went to jail for falsely cashing the checks. The merchant went to the bank to borrow the money necessary to repay the government. He was never able to recover a dime as government checks have no statute of limitations. Conceivably, a check issued by the government in George Washington's time could come back on the heirs of the endorser.
 Example 2 - In February a retailer called to report that checks he began cashing in 1963 were just now coming back to him. The checks of \$104 each were for Social Security for a man and his wife. Of this, \$30.10 was for the wife, who had died. Now, at last count, more than 30 of these checks have been returned by the government through the grocer's bank, and this retailer must pay the \$30.10 for each of the checks he endorsed. The man did not report his wife's death and continued cashing the entire check. The retailer doesn't know how many more will be returned to him. It seems that you must not only know your endorser, but you must know something of his personal life, as well.
 Example 3 - In several instances, we have been told where months after a government check has been cashed, it was returned to the retailer with a notation that the endorsement had been forged, and that a claim for a duplicate check had been filed with the government. On comparison of the so-called forged signature and the payee's signature, it appeared that they were identical. So who could identify the passer after several months had lapsed?
 Example 4 - A retailer who habitually cashed certain checks for a nearby housing development, cashed every month. The trouble with this one was that although the check was familiar—and so was the customer had stolen this particular one out of the mail box of another tenant. All this retailer got for his money was a photostat of the check. Is it any wonder that signs are now appearing in stores which read, "WE DO NOT CASH GOVERNMENT CHECKS."



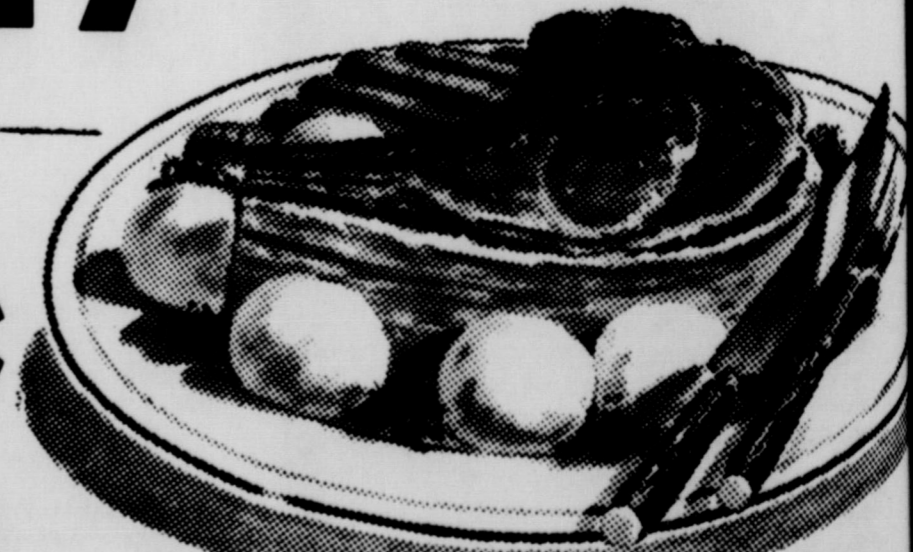
