The touchdown drive was the end of any real Cyclone offensive threat for the game and the Mustangs put a damper to any Cyclone hopes as they took the kickoff and moved 75 yards to pad their lead.

Two passes from Fischer to Cole got 35 of the yards before Cole blasted over from the 3. Stevens kick boosted the Mustangs margin to 14 with 9:48 to play in the game.

Time was running out when the Mustangs put more icing on the cake with a 52 yard drive with Chick and Cole getting all of the yards on the ground. Cole climaxed the drive as he went over standing up from the nine. Stevens put the final point on the board just 1:24 from the end. Memphis put the ball in the air the final minute and a half and all they got for their effort was two passes nearly intercepted and run back for TD's by the alert Mustang secondary. 

\$30,000 BOND FORFEITED

On October 23rd, the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals issued its mandate affirming the summary judgment ordered by 31st District Judge Grainger Mc-Ilhany forfeiting bonds totaling \$30,000 in three Wheeler County cases where William Robert Brown is defendant.

The State of Texas was represented by District Attorney Guy Hardin in these three forfeitures which were ordered by Judge McKlhany on Oct. 9, 1969.

The \$30,000 judgment plus interest and court costs will be paid to Wheeler County by the bonding insurance company.

The Colts never let the Cubs get inside their 20 in racking up their fourth win of the year and once more used the flying feet of Don Chapman and Kent Ware to get the victory. Just three plays were needed for the Colts to get their initial touchdove the

second time they had the ball. Taking over on their 30 following a McLean punt, the Colts used Chapman for 11 and then Ware for 16 more before Chapman broke loose for 43 big yards to break the goose eggs on the scoreboard. Vare rammed the two pointer home and the Colts had the lead they weren't

to relinquish. Overcoming a fumble and one penalty, the Colts pad-ded their lead in the second quarter with a time consuming march of 62 yards in 17 plays, all on the ground, with Chapman going over from 13 yards out three plays before the half ended. McLean made their deepest penetration as they took the second half kickoff and drove to the Colt 28 but lost the ball on downs at the 32 and that was it for the Cubs. Another long drive, this one for 63 yards, by the Colts got their final tally and Ware got the touchdown when he broke for 23

Among them is proposed amendment Number which would authorize the legislature to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands based upon the capability of the lands to support the raising of livestock or to produce farm and forest crops. The following arguments FOR passage of the proposed amendment are

taken directly from the analyses made by the Texas Lesislative Council: 1 - Farm real estate taxes

per acre have increased by more than 22 percent, according to data compiled by the Economic Research Service of the United States Department of Agriculture, and there is a need for the tax relief for owners of such property which the proposed amendment would authorize. 2 - The constitutional amen

dment approved by the voters in 1966 has not provided tax relief urgently needed by farmers and ranchers who use for agricultural purposes land which has greatly increased in value due to irs potential use for other purposes, such as urban development. The proposed amendment would enable the legislature to provide such relief.

3 - The present system of assessing forest lands for ad valorem tax purposes is inequitable and unrealistic. Timber is not recognized as a "farm product" exempt

from taxation as are other growing crops. Timber is accordingly taxed with, and in addition to, the land. The result is that tree farmers pay an ad valorem tax each year on their land on the current year's "crop" (represented by the growth of the trees), and on the crop product in each prior year since the stand of timber was planted. The tree farmer does not recover any portion of these tax payments until the trees are harvested some 20 to 50 years after they are planted.

The proposed amendment would authorize the legislature to provide a fairer system of property valuation for taxation of forest lands ." The following arguments AGAINST are taken directly from the analyses made by the Texas Legislative Coun-

1 - Enabling legislation for the proposed amendment has not been passed; therefore, the voter has no idea how far the legislature may go in providing property tax considerations to the owners of farm, ranch, and timber

lands. 2 - The proposed amendment could result in a tax ceiling for rural lands while urban Texans would be in a different catagory.

SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

It is now time to start plans for applying terraces, diversions, and waterways on cropland that is to be planted to row crops. There continues to be a good interest in parallel terraces among the farmers in the county. The parallel terraces are more expensive than standard terraces, but the benefits from increased production and ease of farming far exceeds the increase in cost.

H.B. Leake has started construction on several diversions and ponds on his place west of Mobeetie. The diversions will divert runoff water from an active gully to a safe outlet where it will eventually be held in a pond for stockwater. Two stockwater ponds and sev-

Cashing Govern. Checks

How safe are government checks? Merchants must learn to question every form of check, including those passed by friends/customers.

Government checks, too, can be a source of expense to the merchant who is not careful, and later, much to his sorrow, finds that it is very costly to endorse and cash U.S. checks. Following are some examples of how merchants can be fooled. Read them and take heed: Example 1 - A local food retailer cashed VA checks for a customer for several years. He knew the woman. as she regularly shopped in his store, but he had no know ledge that she had remar-

ried. The checks were made out to Jane Doe, unremarried widow of John Doe, the deceased veteran. Many months after this retailer had sold his store and retired, the checks he had endorsed for Jane Doe began coming back from the government through his local bank. The total cost to the retailer? More than \$5,000. Jane Doe went to jail for falsely cashing the checks. The merchant want to the bank to borrow the money necessary to repay the government. He was never able to recover a dime as government checks have no statute of limitations. Conceivably, a check issued by the government in George Washington's time could come final quarter, the Mustangs back on the heirs of the endorser. Example 2 - In February a retailer called to report that checks he began cashing in 1963 were just now coming back to him. The checks of \$104 each were for Social Security for a man and his wife. Of this, \$30.10 was for the wife, who had died. Now, at last count, more than 30 of these checks have been returned by the government through the grocer's bank, and this retailer must pay the \$30,10 for each of the checks he endorsed. The man did

not report his wife's death and continued cashing the entire check. The retailer doesn't know how many more will be returned to him. It seems that you must not know your endorser, b you must know something of his personal life, as well. Example 3: - In several instances, we have been told where months after a government check has been cashed, it was returned to the retailer with a notation that the endorsem ent had been forged, and that a claim for a duplicate check had been filed with the government. On comparison of the so-called forged signature and the payee's signature, it appeared that they were identical. So who could identify the passer after several months had apsed? Example 4 - A retailer who habitually cashed certain checks for a nearby housing development, cashed every month. The trouble with this one was that although the check was familiar- and so was the customer had stolen this particular one out of the mail box of another tenant. All this retailer got for his money was a photostat of the check. Is it any wonder that signs are now appearing in stores which read, "WE DO NOT CASH GOVERNMENT CHECKS. PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

No. 1.	GAINST	The constitutional amendment relating to the removal, retirement, or censure of Justices, Judges, and Justices of Peace under prescribed circumstances.
No. 2	FOR AGAINST	Repeal of the prohibition against open saloons found in Section 20, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas.
No. 3.	FOR AGAINST	The constitutional amendment to authorize the Legislature to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands, which shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops.
No. 4.	FOR AGAINST	The constitutional amendment reconstituting the State Building Com- mission as a three-member appointive commission.
No. 5.	FOR AGAINST	The constitutional amendment authorizing any county, on the vote of a majority of its qualified property taxpaying electors, to issue road bonds in an amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property in the county.
No. 6.	FOR AGAINST	The constitutional amendment increasing the value of the homestead which is exempt from forced sale.
No. 7.	FOR AGAINST	The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for consolidating governmental offices and functions and allowing political subdivisions to contract for performance of governmental functions in any county.




