The Wheeler Colts closed after Claude's first TD. their 1970 football campaign Rodney Weatherly boosted with a 20-12 win over Claren-Mustang hopes as he broke don last Thursday on Nicholson Field and with the win fashioned a 5-3 season. After winning three non conference games, the Colts fell on hard times and lost their first three district games Here came Knox again as but came back strong to whip McLean and get their first win over Clarendon since the district was formed five years ago. Going ahead 6-0 in the first quarter, the Colts saw their lead evaporate and were forced to come from a 12-6 deficit in the last half to get the victory. Clarendon sent the teams

to the halftime break with a 6-6 deadlock when they scored late in the second period and put the Colts behind with a touchdown in the third quarter but they enjoyed the lead just a couple of minutes before the Colts went ahead for good. Larry Dyer pounced on a loose football at the Clarendon 39 to give the Colts their first possession of the pigskin and they made it count for six points. The ball toting workhorses of the Colts attack, Don Chapman and Kent Ware, went to work and behind a hard working Colt line, moved the ball to paydirt in 13 plays with Chapman pushing over from the 1.

Returning the kickoff to the Colt 45, Clarendon moved to the Colt 8 and set up a first and goal from there. Three stabs at the line put the ball on the one but it all ended there as the Clarendon quarterback fumbled and recovered but the Colts had held and took over in the shadow of their goal. Wheeler got out of the dan-

found the receiver wide open put Clarendon in the lead 2:56 deep in the third quarter but the lead was short lived. Three plays after Clarendon had taken the lead, the Colts had the ball two steps deep in Clarendon's end of the field from where Chapman raced through a big hole at left tackle to put the Colts back even on the scoreboard. Chapman put the Colts ahead with the two point conversion.

The final Colt score came after Jerry Earl recovered a fumble at the Ciarendon 44. Chapman got his third TD when he climbed over right guard from the 1 on his tenth carry in the drive.

The aroused Colts blunted two drives by Clarendon in the closing minutes to salt away the win.
