Awards Are Given at Annual Banquet

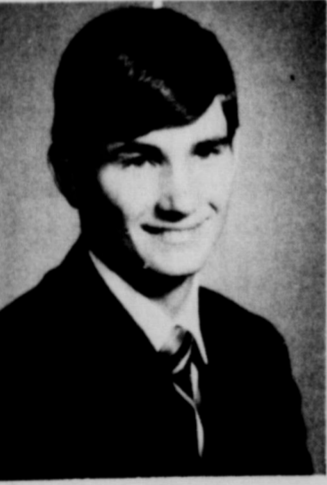

Marvin Self toed a 31 yard field goal with 5 seconds to play and broke a 13-13 deadlock and gave the Silvertown Owls a narrow 16-13 win over the Wheeler Mustangs last Friday night and all but eliminated the Mustangs from the district chase. Silvertown had recovered a fumble at their 32 to thwart the last Mustang bid for victory and drove within field goal range in a desperate race against the clock.

The Mustangs fought back from a 13-0 deficit at half to tie the game with 6:37 to play as Roy Dan Chick went over from three yards out but the bid to go ahead failed as the ball was fumbled on the extra point try. Wheeler took over on their 47 with nearly five minutes to play when Dana Martin fumbled and Carroll Watson gathered it in for the Mustangs.

Moving for a first down by inches at the Owl 42, the Mustangs had another first down at the 32 in a couple of plays but misfortune struck Wheeler as Chick lost the ball as he was tackled and Mark Hutsell recovered for the Owls to set their winning drive in motion.

The Mustangs drove to the Owl 4 in the first quarter on the running of Chick and Jimmy Cole after holding the Owls at the Wheeler 43 but Silvertown was reading the Wheeler mail on third down and dropped Chick for an 8 yard loss.

A fourth down effort to score on a pass from Gary Fischer to Dale Stevens fell incomplete as the ball slipped through the anxious hands of Stevens and the drive came to naught. Maybe the Mustangs were a little deflated after failing to score but whatever, the Owls took quick advantage and broke David Holt loose at his right guard on a straight dive play.

Holt broke free from a couple of Mustangs at the 17 and cut to his left and raced 88 yards to paydirt to give the Owls the lead that held up until the frantic fourth period. Self booted the seventh point with 4:44 still to play in the opening quarter. Wheeler fumbled four times in the contest and the first one proved to be costly also. Chick fumbled at the Mustang 45 three plays after the Owl touchdown and Self recovered. Silvertown covered the 45 yards for their second TD in 12 plays as the Mustangs gave up each yard grudgingly before Bill Strange nudged it over from 1 yard away. Self's kick was wide to the right to keep the Owl margin at 13.

Wheeler came back late in the quarter to drive to the Silvertown 32 where a fourth down effort fell a couple of yards shy.

In the waning moments of the first half, Silvertown drove to midfield and were forced to punt and got a new lease as a roughing the kicker fine against Rick Hefley put the ball at the Mustang 36. Hefley made up for the fine and got a big assist from Willie George as they came up with a big defensive play on the 28 when they downed Martin for a loss of nine.

A pass from Martin to Strange got 7 of the yards back and Self tried a field goal on fourth down that sailed far short and to the right of the uprights. Six seconds remained in the half when Terry Bomar fell on a fumble by Cole at the Mustang 19 but Hefley downed Strange for a four yard loss as the half ended. Wheeler came out in the second half and carried the battle to the Owls only to see an apparent victory slip from their grasp.

The Mustangs moved out to their 44 after receiving the second half kickoff and Rodney Weatherly booted the ball to Roger Younger at the Owl 25 and he returned to the 31. On the second play, Strange was hit hard by the aroused Mustangs and lost the ball and Hefley pounced on it at the Silvertown 34. Gary Fischer was injured in the second quarter and Weatherly was at the helm

Barring upsets, Friday night's battle at Nicholson Field between the Wheeler Mustangs and the McLean Tigers will be for second place in District 2-A and will bring down the curtain on the 1970 football campaign.

Silvertown used the rest of the quarter moving to the Wheeler 35. A bad snap on the punt left the ball rolling free and Self attempted to recover the bobble as a horde of white shirted Mustangs bore down on him. Hefley knocked him down as he attempted to fall on the ball and Bill Tucker was the first to get to the loose pigskin and the Mustangs were on their way to the tying touchdown. Facing fourth down needing four, Weatherly broke free from the Owl pursuers and

tossed complete to Stevens at the Silvertown 28 for a big first down. Chick got the call 8 straight times and responded by getting the Mustangs final tally on a first down effort from the Owl 3. Fischer came in to hold on the big extra point try but fumbled the snap and couldn't regain control before being swarmed under by Owls leaving the game deadlocked. Martin's fumble came five plays after the Mustangs tied the game and the break looked real big for Mustang partisans. Chick got the first down by a measurement on fourth down at the Owl 42 after it appeared that Cole had the necessary yardage and then some on third down as he gauged out 5 big yards up the middle but his forward progress was judged to be only four yards gained. The ill fated fumble came two plays later and with it Mustang hopes for the night.

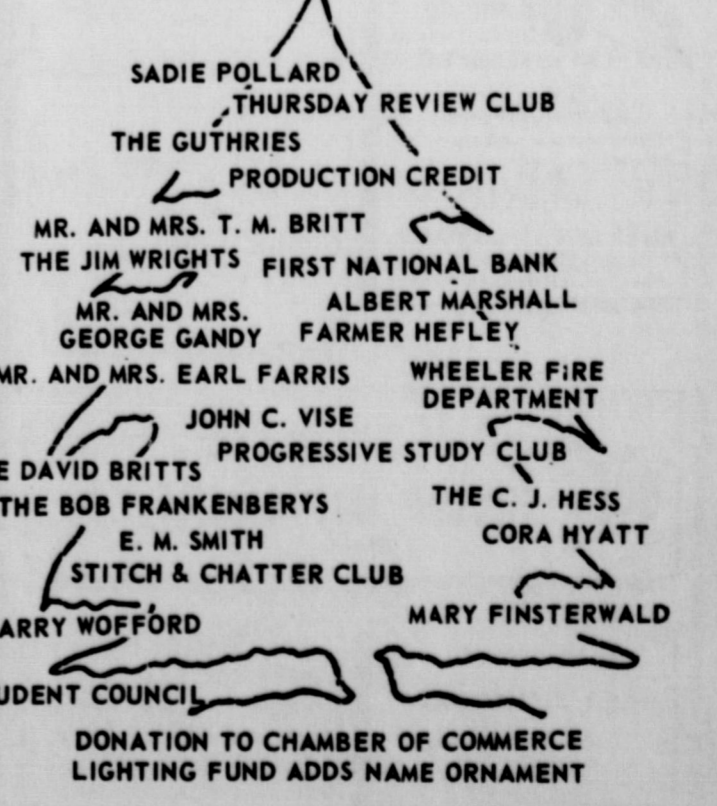

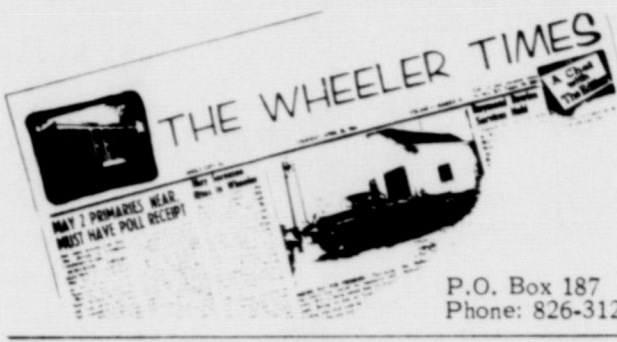

Across the Fence

Smile, cotton farmer, Smile.

Cotton is coming to the gins now. Very few bales of cotton that have gone into the loan have stayed there. And there is very little cotton on hand that is one inch or shorter for sale. The demand is good for most qualities in current ginnings and offerings are moving readily into trade channels according to the cotton division of the USDA Merchants and mills needing cotton for immediate and near by requirements have been active buyers. Domestic mill inquiries for cotton for forward shipment have been numerous. The cotton demand situation has improved. In September, U. S. Mills consumed 760,291 bales. This is a daily rate of consumption of 30,412 bales. Rayon and acetate staple were consumed at the rate of 2,010,000 pounds per day, down 24% from 12 months earlier. Non-cellulosic staple, at 3,212,000 pounds daily was down 6% from one year ago.

Income Tax Seminar-This Thursday, November 12 at 10:00 a.m. at Furr's Cafeteria in Pampa is the date of the Southeastern Panhandle's Income Tax Seminar. On the program will be Frank Daugherty, Internal Revenue Service Agent, Hazel Lockhart, Tax Practitioner, Jim Mallett, Farm Management Specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and many others. Subjects to be discussed include: "Heads I Win, Tails You Lose", "Casualty Losses and Conversion", "Changes in Tax Regulations for 70 and Thereafter" and "Importance of and Type Required for Tax Management".

Some 40,000 Texas ranchers and farmers, including a representative number from Wheeler County, will be involved in the 1970 state livestock survey. During the last half of November survey questionnaires were mailed to the selected livestock producers by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Each should fill out the questionnaire as soon as possible and return it in the enclosed envelope.

The reports will be used by the state statistician in making an accurate estimate of the cattle, hogs and chickens on the farms and ranches of Texas.

There are many uses, both in and out of Texas, for this information. We use it here in the county in connection with our program building activities and in conducting educational programs involving livestock.

The more questionnaires returned, the more accurate will be the estimates; therefore, it is important that each producer in Wheeler County who receives a questionnaire, complete and return it immediately.

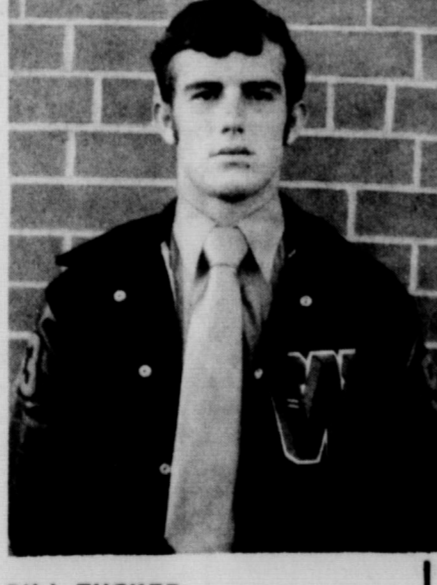

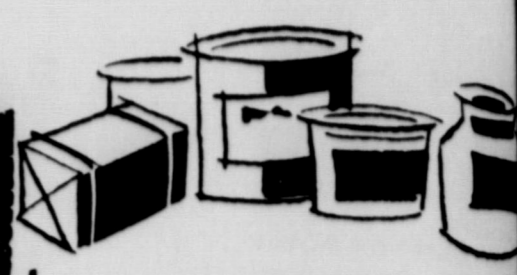
