to wheat pastures. The average family in Russia spends 1/2 of his disposable income for food. In the United States, only 161/2 percent of a person's disposable income is spent for food. Our farmers now receive nine cents less out of every dollar than he got 20 years ago. Only one out of 20 Americans live on a farm. We as consumers are fortunate that the agricultural segment of our economy has increased in efficiency so that the five percent who live in rural America can provide the other 95% benefits unsurpassed anywhere. The Week of November 20-26 is Farm City Week. This week see if you can increase public understanding of the strong interests shared by rural and urban Americans.

. Every now and then we get questions from homeowners on how they can control a light infestation of insects such as aphids or mealybugs on one or two house plants. This can be done rather easily with a swab made from a small thin stick and a tuft of cotton that has been dipped in rubbing alcohol. Lightly rubbing the swab over the leaves will remove the insects. Washing with soapy water and a soft brush or cloth may also be effective. Spraying a broadleaved plant with lukewarm water is a good way to remove aphids, mealybugs; thripe and spidermites.
