He entered the Army in August 1969 and completed basic training at Ft. Lewis, Washington.

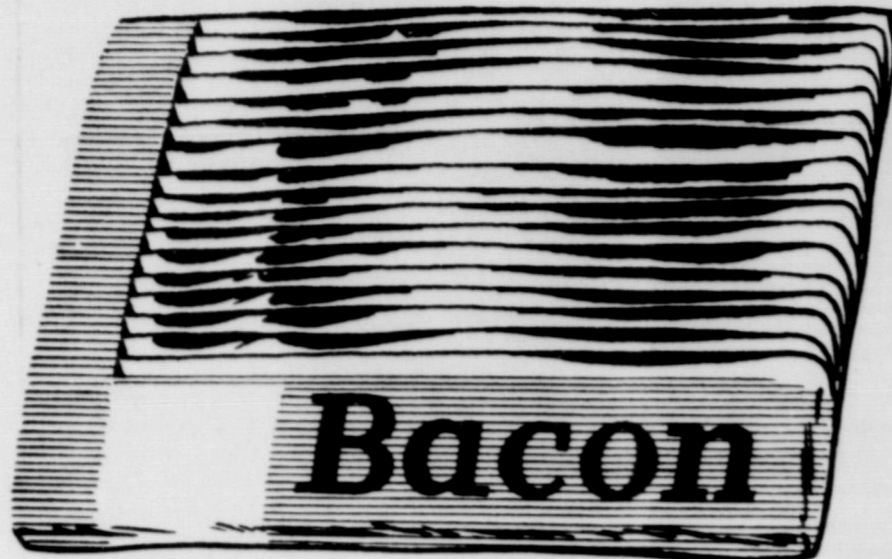

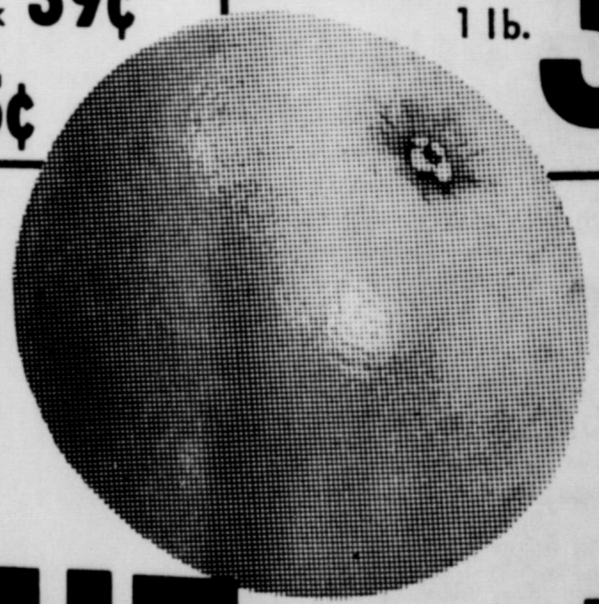

WHAT'S PARAGRAPHS

Patricia A. Palmer, Home Demonstration Agent, enjoyed the Thanksgiving days with my family as well as I did mine. Almost the season

to be jolly and many of you home sewers are busy preparing for holiday activities by creating fashionable, super-feminine styles in velvet. Most velvets are made of rayon, but nylon, acetate and silk are also used. Here

are a few hints to make sewing with velvet a breeze! Be sure when buying velvet to look for yardage requirements under the listing "with nap", otherwise add three-eighths to three-fourths yards for cutting the fabric one way. Cutting in one direction is important since direction of pile effects the color.

Velvets have a tendency to crawl and curl when cutting. Solve this problem by using an old sheet on the cutting surface to keep velvet from sliding, then stay-stitch immediately to stabilize the fabric.

For seams, carefully baste to keep velvet from shifting when stitching. Slipstitch seams to backing so the material will remain flat and not roll. If the velvet ravel badly, finish the seam edge with a zigzag stitch or bind with a sheer bias strip. When stitching velvet, set the stitch regulator to 12 to 15 stitches per inch and use a round hole throat plate on your machine or use a gummed tape over oval hole. Also adjust to a loose thread tension and decrease pressure on pressure foot. Use a size 11 needle for fine velvet and a size 14 needle for medium weight velvets. These adjustments to your machine will prevent an imbedded stitch line in the pile.

Choose interfacing of light or medium weight and underlinings that compliment but don't change the natural characteristics of the velvet. Choose linings of medium weight crepes, taffetas or satin.

The pressing technique for velvet is very important if you want it to look its best. Press velvet on a velvet board and not on a flat sur-

Here's a recipe for a fruit cake that you can use when you want one that is quick to make.

Easy-Day Fruitcake
 1/2 cups flour
 1/2 cup sugar
 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1/2 cup shortening
 3 eggs
 2 cups mixed candied fruit
 1 cup white raisins
 1 cup slivered almonds
 1/2 cup candied pineapple chunks
 1/2 cup red candied cherries

Over 300 degrees
 Makes 1 Loaf Cake
 Grease bottom of 9x5x3 inch pan. In large mixer bowl, combine flour, sugar, baking powder, salt, shortening and eggs. Mix at low speed of mixer until well blended. Stir in remaining ingredients. Pour into pan. Bake at 300 degrees for 1 1/2 to 2 hours until tester inserted into center of cake comes out clean. Cool 10 minutes. Remove from pan; cool. Wrap cooled cake in foil to keep moist.
